4-H'ers Prepare
For County Fair

Clackamas County 4-H Club members are busy making preparations for the Clackamas County Fair, at Canby, Aug. 13-17. Approximately 1,400 members in the county are expected to participate, according to Harold Black and Georgene Dershon, County 4-H Extension Agents.

Members will be exhibiting work which they have done in a wide variety of projects, including all phases of home economics, natural science, creative arts, flowers, vegetables, and general projects such as leathercraft and photography. Except for livestock and horticulture, exhibits come in nearly so that they can be judged and the ribbons in place when the Fair opens.

Members are busy getting their livestock properly fitted and trained for the Fair. Beef, dairy, sheep, swine and dairy goats will be on exhibit during the entire Fair. Different types of livestock will be shown each day. A highlight of the livestock judging is the showmanship contests which are held in each type of livestock. Members are judged on their ability to fit and show their animal.

The 4-H horse show has been divided this year because of the increasing number of entries in the horse division each year. Over 300 4-H members are expected to show their horses in horsemanship, showmanship, trail horse, ground training and owner trained classes. Juniors and seniors will be judged on Tuesday and Wednesday and intermediates on Thursday and Friday.

In addition to exhibiting, many members will participate in special contests. These include style revue, demonstrations, cake baking, bread baking, meal preparation, mufin making, and knitting and clothing contests.
