Advisory Committee Examines SUHS Vocational Curriculum

Since January 1967 Sandy Union High School has had a Vocational Advisory Committee. This committee has been examining the pre-vocational curriculum that the school now offers and what it feels should be offered in the future.

Under the leadership of Chairman Ralph Richardson, it has accomplished much already in regards to suggestions about existing pre-vocational curriculum and has high hopes for future developments.

In the months since the organization of this committee, several changes have occurred in its membership but the Sandy Union High School Board of Education wishes to thank all those who have participated on this Vocational Advisory Committee. They are: Ralph Richardson, Chairman, Lance Staab, Al Morner, Duane Knapp, Al Gantenbein, Neal Jackson, Keith Schneider, Mrs. Jerry Donham, Glen Schaeffer, Olin Bignall, John Metzger, Charles Frasier, Mrs. Betty Myers, secretary; and Charles Croston.

In January this year the committee recommended to the Sandy Union High School Board that the following items be accomplished by Sept. 1, 1969.

1. That a building be built and proper tools and equipment be purchased for the following courses:

a. Power Mechanics Course
b. Electricity and Electronics Course
c. Metals Course that would include welding, sheet metal, machine shop, foundry, heat treat and others.

2. To provide money for a detailed course of study in metals, electricity and power mechanics.
3. To hire qualified persons to teach metals, electricity, and power mechanics.

In February the Sandy Union High School Board voted that the report of the Vocational Advisory Committee be accepted and that plans be made to implement the recommendations.

After consideration of several different architectural firms, the firm of Travers Johnston was retained to design a vocational building to meet the needs of the students at Sandy Union High School.

Early this month the architects submitted a preliminary schematic design of their interpretation of the recom-

mendations of the Vocational Advisory Committee and the School Board.

The School Board with the Vocational Advisory Committee representatives present held two meetings on August 12 and August 14 and arrived at the following decision.

1. That it would be unwise to try and rush this suggested Bond Issue vote through before the November 5, General Election, although the one and one-half per cent property tax limitation will appear on the ballot. It was the feeling of the group that to hold an election on this Vocational Project before November 5 would not give an opportunity to fully inform the voters of this school district of proposed plans.

2. If the one and one-half per cent property tax limitation is approved, the high school district would be unable to raise 27.5% or \$192,526 of its 1967-68 budget figure, \$145,932 of this would be Sandy Union High School District loss, while \$46,594 would be Intermediate Education District loss.

These figures rather vividly illustrate that it would be almost impossible to continue the length of school year and services as now exist without adding an additional bond issue to further complicate the situation.

The one and one-half per cent Property Tax Limitation shall not apply to any tax levy when submitted to the voters on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of any year. If the vote is approved by a majority of the voters, therein which majority must also be not less than 20% of the registered voters entitled to vote thereon at such election.

This would seem to indicate it would be extremely difficult if not almost impossible to pass future bond issues under this proposed law without a vast increase in registered voter participation in future elections.

The Sandy Union High School Board suggests that the passage of the one and one-half per cent property tax limitation would be unwise without additional sources of revenue that do not exist at this time.

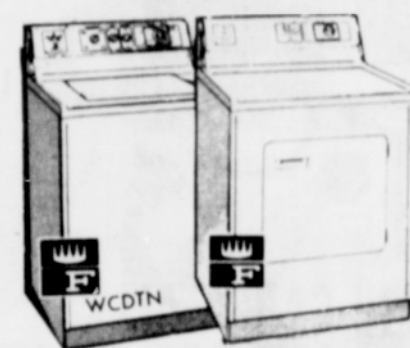
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
