'October Madness' Period Descends on UGN Campaign

The United Good Neighbors campaign enters the period of "October Madness" this week. Robert O. Williams, United Good Neighbors Chairman for Sandy-Mountain district said: "Someone has referred to the World Series as 'October Madness', and sometimes the annual event does capture the interest

of our workers to the point where we fail to realize our full potential for the week. Also, high school and college football are starting to pick up interest, and contributors and volunteers are tempted to take long week-ends out of town to see some of these games. In other words, there are a lot of activities starting, which can distract our workers and contributors from the most important job of all --- raising our \$ 3,949 goal for the 1968 United Good Neighbors campaign."

The local chairman said the drive is progressing satisfactorily, but added that workers must stay with their project if it is to be the success everyone is hoping it will be. Williams reminded everyone that Wednesday, Oct. 9, the last

phase of the drive begins. This, of course, is the UGN residential campaign. The door-to-door drives will have their kick-offs Wednesday morning with a special television show on KOIN-TV.

Williams urges residential workers to watch the program, which will include a showing of the UGN movie "The Difference is You". The 10 a.m. program also features an explanation of materials in UGN door-to-door solicitor kits, and instructions on how to call on potential UGN contributors.

The 1968 United Good Neighbors campaign, with a tri-county goal of \$4,851,073 for support of 97 health, welfare, character-building, and rehabilitation services, continues through Nov. 1.

Youth Killed; Three Critical

Funeral services were Tuesday for Martin G. Brill, 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. George Brill, Rt. 1, Box 168, Clackamas, who was killed in an automobile accident Friday night in Clackamas County on Ruegg Rd. some three miles north of Boring.

Four passengers in the auto driven by Brill remain hospitalized at Gresham General Hospital. Three are listed as critical including Nancy Erickson, 300 SE 150th Ave., Debby Loughmiller, Troutdale, and Christine Lucky, Gresham.

A fourth girl, Donna Grashorn, Boring, remains in fair condition at the hospital here. Another youth, Clifford G. Coffey, Boring, was treated and released from Gresham General.

A sixth passenger in the Brill auto, Lynn Dittel, Rt. 3, Box 793B, Gresham, was not injured, according to Clackamas County sheriff's deputies.

Brill was born at Portland March 23, 1952, and had attended the first two years of high school at Gresham. He transferred to Sam Barlow High School this year where he had been elected vice president of the student body. He was full-back on the Bruin football team,

and participated in wrestling. Besides his parents, he is survived by a sister, Mrs. Suzanne Murk, New Orleans, La., and grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Conrad Brill and Mrs. Samuel Hill, all of Portland.

Bateman Funeral home was in charge of arrangements. Burial was at Willamette National Cemetery, Portland.

Sheriff's deputies said Tuesday an investigation is continuing into the cause of the accident. Two of the passengers said they believed the car might have been sidwiped by a second car before it ran out of control and into a ditch.

Deputies said fog in the area at the time of the accident was "extremely dense."

COLUMN COMMENTS

Clackamas County is growing, new homes can be found in every part of the county. Also some new industry is occurring with much more removed.

But what effect will such development have on the agriculture industry in Clackamas County? I believe a phenomenal potential for growth of agriculture industry exists.

Often we are misled by the obvious. When a few new homes are built in an area, everyone talks about this great change and how the area is going to be all homes shortly. However, if you stop and consider the land area consumed by these homes, it isn't very much. Thus, in areas such as Boring and Damascus the number of new homes looks impressive, but when you view it from above or consider the land area involved, you realize quickly that an immense acreage still exists for other uses besides housing.

Therefore, even in areas such as Sandy-Boring-Damascus, where new homes are being built on farm land, growers will be able to maintain acreage. In fact, value of crops produced will probably increase due to shift by growers to higher income crops. To maintain agriculture in that area is of vital importance because it provides a use for this land until it is needed for housing. The conversion of land from farming to housing is occurring slowly, certainly out of proportion to increases in land values.

To appreciate the potential that exists for growth of farming in Clackamas County, drive

through the Needy, Marquam and Dryland area. There are thousands and thousands of acres of land in that area well suited to row crop production whose potential hasn't been scratched.

One of the interesting things that happen when housing and industry move into an agricultural area is the evolution or crops. You can see it in the Boring-Damascus area where low value crops are being discarded and growers are seeking out crops with higher income potentials. In Clackamas County growers will have to move from low-value crops to higher income crops during the coming years. This leads

to my favorite subject of water resource development which is absolutely essential before farmers can consider growing higher income crops.

Farmers should look at their situation to determine where they can secure additional water for irrigation. Can water be developed by building farm ponds from ground water, or is there a possibility of developing large storage reservoirs to serve several farms in an area? Wherever the water comes from, it is essential and allows growers to consider a wide diversity of crops. Whereas, the list of crops which can be grown without irrigation is short - and the income produced is even shorter!
