Robbing Peter to Pay Paul

Every American, particularly the American taxpayer, loves to save money and, at first glance, a 1-1/2% limitation on property taxes seemed like a good way to do it.

Fortunately, most people are taking a second glance and discovering anew that you can't get something for nothing.

Since the 1-1/2% limitation is tied to assessed valuation which Not limited as to the amount it can increase without approval of the taxpayer your property taxes, after the first year, could rise annually as property valuation increased and you could do nothing about it.

In the meantime, if you think you will be one of those who will save on property taxes under the 1-1/2% limitation, where do you think the money to pay for running our schools, police departments, fire districts, water districts, etc., is going to come from? Your fairy godmother?

Not on your life, prince charming! You're going to pay it -- right through your nice nose. As you save a few cents in your property tax pocket, you'll be reaching deep into your personal and individual income pockets to pay for essential services.

Protect what you have now and vote NO on Measure No. 7.

Vote No on No. 8

Ballot Measure No. 8 would not only prohibit all Clackamas County zoning without referral, it would repeal ALL present zoning (with the exception of that in incorporated cities and a few existing zoning districts).

Passage of this measure would be a blow from which the county might never recover. It would open the door to businesses not acceptable in neighboring zoned counties and permit noisy, smelly, and otherwise offensive operations to establish themselves overnight and they could not be ousted by the future zoning.

The county's interim zoning ordinance and its administration by the planning commission was, admittedly, not perfect, but even at its worst was far better than none at all. Most

original inequities have now been adjusted and to abolish county zoning now would be foolhardy.

Unplanned and unzoned location of homes and industry could create a tax burden for the entire county and create a land pollution that would destroy present and future land values . . . as it already had in some areas even before interim zoning was implemented by the county commissioners.

Present county zoning fines the property owner, farmer and businessman knowledge that his home, farm or business will continue to exist in the environment he anticipated and protects not only the investment of the owner but that of his neighbors throughout the county. Vote a determined NO on Measure 8.

Edna Oster, whereby you are notifying Mrs. Oster she has by your action been removed as a member of the election board of precinct #353 Molalla. You state in your letter as reason for doing so, quote: "Your continued attempts to subvert the use of voting machine does not lend itself well to the or-

derly functions of this office. As a private citizen I feel you have every right to disclaim their use, carry petitions and do whatever else you feel right and proper. But as a member of the County election board I do not feel you should give your name and efforts to such a project." end of quote.

To correct the first of one of your many errors, Precinct #353 is not Molalla, it is Marquam. Now, lets look at this woman whose character, honesty and integrity you see fit to question.

She is a Past Noble Grand of the Oak Rebekahs #159 of Molalla.

She is a Past State President of the Rebekah Assembly of Oregon.

She is at this time Residential Chairman for the 1968 United Neighbors Campaign for South Clackamas County.

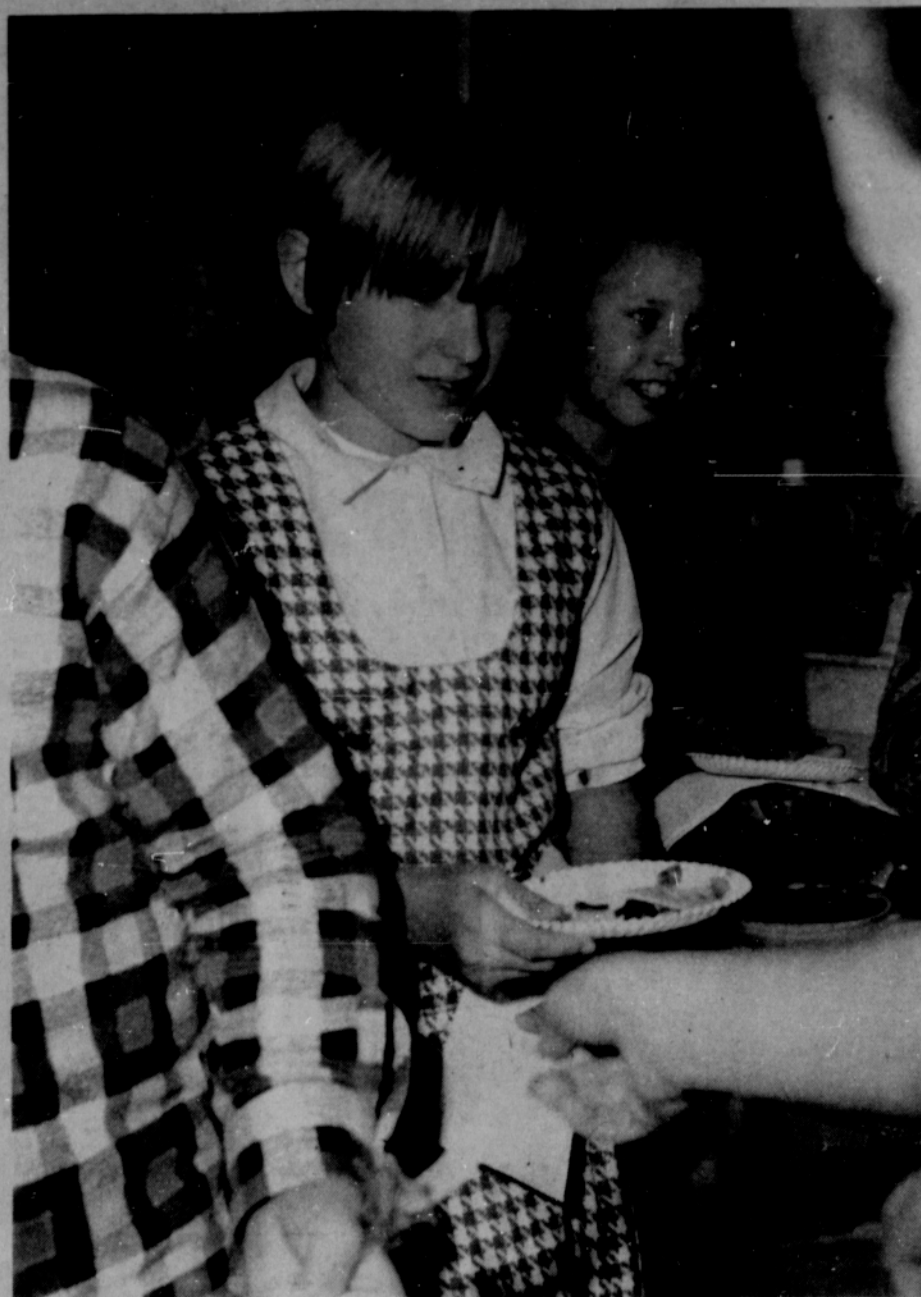

UGN Campaign In Final Week

The 1968 Sandy United Good Neighbors campaign, which until now has been proceeding at a steady leisurely pace, will have to increase in tempo if it is to reach its goal by the Nov. 1 deadline.

Mr. Robert O. Williams, Sandy chairman said:

"We have just six working days left. We still have a lot of money to raise. It's not an impossible task. We have a strong campaign that is showing increases on last year's gifts. So the money is there. But we have to go out and get it. And we have less than a week in which to do it.

The local chairman said the

drive could not succeed without the cooperation of everyone in the Gresham area.

Decrease In Man-Caused Fires Reported in Oregon Forests

Fewer man-caused forest fires were reported in Oregon this year according to the Keep Oregon Green Association.

Of the 823 man-caused fires reported, 256 were caused by smokers and 164 by campers who failed to extinguish their open campfires. Oregon's Fire Season began this year in many parts of the state on May 1. Total number of forest fires in the state was 2,082, with 1,260

being caused by lightning.

By June 21 all of the state came under fire regulations. The general state termination of Oregon's Fire Season became effective Oct. 16.

Early rains in August with general rains near the end of September and the first two weeks in October lessened the forest fire hazard. Last year a total of 1,353 man-caused fires were reported.

Ski Coach Sees Good Season

Chuck Dalich, history instructor at Mt. Hood Community College, will be coaching the college ski team, during the 1968-1969 season.

Dalich, a past NCAA national competitor with the Montana State ski team, is looking to the teams third year of successful competitive skiing for the Saints. The first race for the MHCC team is planned at Mt. Bachelor Dec. 7 and 8, he said.

The 1968-1969 team, consists of two former members of the U.S. Junior National Team, Jim Landwehr and Bob Gordon, Oregonians Marty Allquist, Kevin Roche and Ken Klecker are also members of the Alpine team. Gary Ginter, a returning sophomore from last year's second place conference team, is not sure of his performance

this year due to previous injury, Palich said.
