The Vote in Oregon

Voters strongly rejected the controversial 1-1/2 per cent tax limitation measure but it would be most dangerous, we think, for anyone to read into this voter approval of our present tax structure.

The voters turned down the 1-1/2 per cent measure because it was a bad one, poorly drawn. They were not, we're positive, turning their backs on tax relief for property owners.

The legislature would be making a most grievous error to interpret the results any other way. They still must come up with a workable plan for tax relief for property owners.

But all told, the Republicans have our state pretty well under control.

It was a good year for the Republicans in Oregon.

Not only did they deliver the state to Nixon but Bob Packwood apparently unseated Wayne Morse in the U.S. Senate race.

In the Statehouse, the Democrats were just about blanked. Clay Myers was re-elected secretary of state and Lee Johnson wrested the attorney-general's job away from Bob Thornton.

Only treasurer Bob Straub gave the Democrats anything to cheer about.

At present writing, Democrats retain control of the State Senate and Republicans the House. But the Statehouse is definitely Republican.

Tokyo

To the Editor
Sandy Post

We now have all our visas. What a difference in embassies! Indonesia took 48 hours-Australia - 8 hours, -- China -- 1 hr, New Zealand - 20 minutes.

With so much rain, and bad forecast, and Jack has a cold--we canceled our Sapporo trip. Plan to go to Yokohama today. Have reservations for Okinawa via Japan Air Lines Monday a.m.

To Ueno Park Zoo yesterday. Very nice, and loaded with school children. Every place we go there are large groups every day.

Lunch at the Park. Jack had hotdog and coke 100 yen (27¢). I had Tempura, rice and tea, 165 yen (45¢). Very good.

Observations on Japan: The people are clean, industrious, and ambitious, but they are just developing a stable, middle class society and there is a certain lack of confidence in themselves. Surprising the great Chinese influence in so many things.

One can eat safely in any restaurant, and most of food is delicious, although some require an oriental taste. Many places have plastic displays of dishes served with names and prices. But we are unable to order, many times, if there is no English menu and no one speaks English.

Taxi rates run 100 yen (27¢) and up, but are very reasonable. We rode for 40 minutes yesterday for 85¢.

Many business men and diplomats have impressive cars with chauffeur. Mostly Mercedes-Benz. Have seen 2 Chryslers and 1 Cadillac. All other cars are compacts of Japanese make. Toyota, Datsun, Nissan, etc. There are no old jalopies, and no used car lots. Must melt the old ones down every year.

Outside the hotels and travel bureaus we find practically no one speaks any English, even taxi drivers.

Jack couldn't buy a sport coat. They just didn't have large sizes. Finally found a McGregor zipper jacket.

Jack thinks the taxi drivers are frustrated kamikaze pilots who survived. To take a cab to any destination, we get a note from the hotel desk in Japanese. Haven't the slightest idea what they say, but we usually get close.

P.M. -- Had a nice trip to Yokohama via taxi and expressway -- about 20 miles. Much less smog in Yokohama. What a relief. Smog is much worse here than in Portland. Sure glad Hoodland is still smog free.

Sunday -- Slept in and took a walk around the downtown area. Offices are closed, streets are less crowded, but all the building construction jobs are working. (Note to Don, Jerry, and Bob -- This is a plumbers nightmare. Most drainage and sewer lines are plastic and aluminum -- no vents.)

Took an afternoon tour of the Japanese Diet. Bldg. (Congress), the Meiji Shrine, and the Olympic swim and gym area of 1964. Had a delicious Kobe steak dinner at the Ginza shopping area.

We have been told there are 720,000 cabs in Tokyo. Also 180,000 cars per month are added to Japan traffic.

Monday, Oct. 28 -- Left Tokyo for a 2 1/2 hour ride via Japan Air Line to Naha, Okinawa. This is the capital of the Ryukyu Islands, which are under U.S. military jurisdiction. 75% of the economy is U.S. military from ten service bases.

It is sure nice to see sunshine and ocean beaches again. Us small town boys are glad to be away from big cities and smog. The island is a series of typical run-down sea shore towns. We are at the Grace Hotel in Koza. Prices are very reasonable, food is good, and we use the U.S. dollar.

Had a Korean bar-b-que dinner with Kobe beef, and it is the best in the world.

Spent a couple of lazy days driving around the island looking at ancient Okinawan ruins of shrines and castles. Spent some time on these tropical sunny beaches in the sun. Great after the rain and smog of Tokyo. Also have military TV at the hotel -- in English and no commercials.

Wednesday, Oct. 20 -- Left Okinawa for a hour flight via Japan Air Line for Taipei, Taiwan (Formosa - Nationalist China) Taipei - a large, dirty, city of 1,600,000 people. Much

more and better English spoken here than in Japan.

Surprise note! The Chinese are much less formal in dress, manners, and culture than the Japanese.

Bye until next week. We go from here to Manila in a few days.
