CHARLES CLINTON BOGART, 38, Springfield, died Friday, Nov. 15 from injuries sustained in an automobile accident on Interstate 5 near Central Point.

Bogart was born Sept. 28, 1930, in Coquille and had resided in Springfield most of his life. He was a veteran of the Korean War.

He was married in Albany May, 8, 1954 to Helen Fisher. General Telephone serves some 18,000 telephones in Clackamas and Multnomah Counties.

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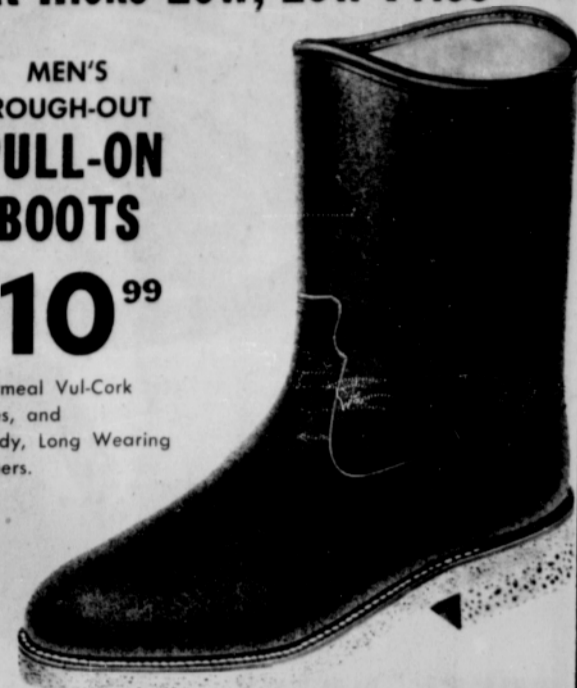
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
