**Gun Registration Procedures Told**

Detailed procedures for registering machine gun, sawed-off shotgun, sawed-off rifle, silencer, deactivated war trophy and other destructive devices were announced today by A. G. Erickson, District Director of Internal Revenue for Oregon.

The Gun Control Act of 1968 requires that weapons and devices of this type must be registered with the Internal Revenue Service by December 1.

Erickson said that copies of registration Form 4467 are available at Alcohol & Tobacco Tax and other IRS offices.

The forms are prepared in three copies, two of which should be mailed to the Director, Alcohol & Tobacco Tax Division, Internal Revenue Service, Washington D.C., 20224. The third copy may be kept by the owner of the firearm or destructive device.

Firearms or destructive devices should not be brought to an IRS office to be registered, Erickson said.

Under the new law all firearms and destructive devices requiring registration must be identified by a serial number. If a firearm or device does not have a serial number, the owner should phone, visit, or write the nearest Alcohol & Tobacco Tax office and a number will be assigned.

After obtaining the number, the owner is responsible for affixing it to the firearm or device before completing the registration form. Additional information may be obtained by contacting the nearest Alcohol & Tobacco Tax or other IRS office.

Since this is National Book Week, we wish to call to the attention of adults and children that reading habits acquired at an early age result in a lifetime of pleasant recreation and education. Your library has many Award and new children's books. Books of poems for children are also a fascinating new world of words to be explored. As an example, here is an excerpt from Eleanor Farjeon's "Poems for Children,"

**POETRY**  
 "What is poetry: Who knows?  
 Not a rose, but the scent of the rose;  
 Not the sky, but the light in the sky;  
 Not the sea, but the sound of the sea;  
 Not myself, but what makes me  
 See, hear, and feel something that prose  
 Cannot: and what it is, who knows?"

Another book of poems, clever enough to be enjoyed, also, by adults is "A Snails Failure Socially" by Kaye Starbird. Here is part of one poem,

"A snail's a failure socially,  
 Which means you very seldom see  
 A crowd of happy, laughing snails  
 Collected all at once.  
 The reason's this: when asked to dine  
 A snail could answer "Yes" or "Ane,"  
 But if he lived a field away  
 The trip would take him months."

How many times this year will it call you downstairs?
