The Maternity department is the happiest department of the hospital.

The job of new life is a contagious feeling. The faces of the mothers, new fathers, the nurses and visiting well wishers all reflect the joy associated with the arrival of the infants—some boys, some girls, all precious.

The hospital is closer for the mother when she goes into labor - the need for speed and haste to the downtown hospital is no longer necessary. Chances are that the hospital is closer for the doctors, too. Visitors (not too many) have only a short drive to the hospital. Father appreciates the nearness particularly if he has older children at home to watch. Parking problems, of course, do not exist.

Yes the Maternity department is a happy place. The convenience and reassurance of the always-open general hospital leads to justified confidence. Modern, well appointed rooms with informal, non-institutional decor makes the hospitalization period following birth a restful one.

The staff of Woodland Park Hospital would like to invite expectant mothers (fathers too) to visit the hospital well before the confinement date. Then when the baby's arrival is imminent you will know the route, the correct doors to enter, and in general feel assured about the hospital environment.

What's Cooking?

While we are snowed in and having a holiday from school we who enjoy being creative in the kitchen could bake cookies and breads for current use and for the freezer.

TOLL HOUSE MARBLE SQUARES

1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened
1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons granulated sugar
1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons brown sugar (packed)
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 egg
1 cup all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup coarsely chopped nuts

16-oz. pkg. (1 cup) semi-sweet chocolate morsels
Heat oven to 375 degrees. Grease oblong pan, 13 x 9 x 2". Mix butter, sugars and vanilla thoroughly. Beat in egg. Blend in flour, soda and salt. Mix in walnuts. Spread in prepared pan. Sprinkle chocolate morsels over top of dough. Place in oven 1 minute. Remove from oven and run knife through dough to marbleize. Return to oven; bake 12 to 14 minutes. Cool. Cut into 2" squares. Makes 2 dozen.

When using Self-Rising Flour, omit soda and salt.

OATMEAL CRUNCHIES

1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup shortening
1 egg
1/4 teaspoon vanilla
3/4 cup quick-cooking rolled oats
1/4 cup chopped walnuts

Sift together flour, granulated sugar, baking powder, soda and salt. Add brown sugar, shortening, egg and vanilla; beat well. Stir in rolled oats and walnuts. Form dough into small balls. Dip tops in a little additional granulated sugar. Place on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375 degree) for 10 to 12 minutes. Makes about 3 1/2 dozen cookies.
