The college, located east of Oregon City, is the fourth largest community college in Oregon. Presently there are 900 full time students and many part time students enrolled at the college.

"Clackamas Community College will continue to emphasize the initiation and development of new occupational programs," Dr. Hakanson said after his appointment.

Hoodland Man Dies in Wreck

A one-car accident Tuesday morning on Highway 26 near ZigZag took the life of William Donald Lake, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Lake of Rhododendron.

Lake, 23, who was employed at a ski resort at Government Camp, was a passenger in a sports car driven by a fellow employee, Steven Ash, 23. Ash, seriously injured in the wreck, was taken to Gresham hospital where his condition was listed as good Wednesday afternoon.

According to reports from the Clackamas County sheriff's office, the accident occurred shortly after 2 a.m. when the car traveling at high speed went out of control and skidded off the road into trees and brush.

Bill was born on April 30, 1945 in Portland. He attended school at Welches grade and Sandy high. Bill lived all of his life in the mountain area, and worked as a ski area supervisor. He was employed by the Multnomah ski area.

Surviving are his parents; and two brothers, Charles and John Jr. both at home.

Services will be Friday, March 14 at 2 p.m. in Chapel of Carroll Funeral Home, with private interment in the Sandy cemetery. All ski facilities at Multnomah and Ski Bowl will be shut down for the day.

Grape Boycott Stand Hit By Farm Bureau Leaders

"The recent stand of the state board of higher education supporting the University of Oregon's giving in to the demands of a student minority on the grape boycott issue is just going to open the way for continuing disturbances," Claude Williams, Prineville, president of the Oregon Farm Bureau federation, charged at a recent meeting in Salem of county Farm Bureau presidents and legislative chairmen.

The group of Farm Bureau leaders, meeting Monday and Tuesday at the Holiday Inn for a leadership conference and legislative workshop with Oregon Farm Bureau federation officials and staff personnel, expressed indignation at the tolerance of college and university officials for the wishes of minorities of student activists; and at the same time gave full support to the administration of state-supported institutions of higher learning to deal firmly with minorities of trouble-makers.

Williams said the group was unanimous in its support of Farm Bureau policy on respect for law, which states: "Our campuses must be returned to their traditional role as centers of reason and intellectual pursuit. Student activists, non-student extremists, and the faculty members who support them in lawlessness or interference with the orderly operation of educational

institutions have forfeited any right to remain in the educational community.

They should be summarily expelled and dismissed and if necessary be put under peace bond not to return. Any who demonstrate in sympathy with those who have been removed should be suspended or expelled depending on their actions.

"We condemn the acts of those who incite or participate in riots, defile the flag or burn draft cards. We recognize the right of citizens to dissent, but protests and demonstrations should not interfere with the rights of others and must not be permitted to deteriorate into civil disorder and anarchy. Each individual should be held liable for his acts when participating in or inciting such disorders.

"It has become evident that permissive attitudes will with out question lead "into civil disorder and anarchy," Williams stated.

"We support Coach Dee Andros in his firm stand at Oregon State university on the matter of all athletes adhering to the same regulations. This move on the part of a minority of students at OSU is all part of the same nationwide attempt to break down administrative control of our

institutions of higher learning.

"Our board of directors and county leaders back 100 per cent the policy of the Farm Bureau in respect of law. This policy statement, like all Farm Bureau policies, was determined by grass roots participation of farmers throughout the entire United States. Everyone is concerned about what is going on in our colleges and universities," Williams concluded.

He said that letters are being sent to each of the heads of Oregon's state-supported schools expressing concern about recent campus disturbances and pledging Farm Bureau's support to those administrators who take a firm stand against such disturbances. He added that copies were sent to members of the state board of higher education and to the chancellor of the state system of higher education, Roy Lieualen.

We are concerned about the U of O's support of the grape boycott because of the direct effect this boycott is having on agriculture and the effect it can very well have on any Oregon crop. Grapes are only the symbol of what can be ahead for agriculture in Oregon and in other parts of the country," Williams declared.

Medals Awarded Sandy Soldier

Two medals for heroism, and the Purple Heart were awarded posthumously Saturday to Specialist Four Paul M. Moore, Sandy soldier who was killed in Vietnam last Oct. 25.

Specialist Moore, 20, a 1966 Sandy high school graduate, entered the Army in 1967 and celebrated his 20th birthday while home on leave before being sent to Vietnam in February, 1968.

Citations for the awards to Moore of the Bronze Star and Army Commendation Medal were read by Master Sergeant Walter Purcell in a ceremony at the Sandy Baptist Chapel witnessed by 50 friends of the family.

Army Captain Robert K. Christensen then presented the medals to the soldier's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Errett Moore.

The Rev. Dwight Kinman, chaplain at the University of Oregon Medical School, was the speaker at the awards presentation. The closing prayer was given by the Rev. M. Chadfield, professor at Western Conservative Baptist Seminary.

The citations follow: BRONZE STAR MEDAL SP/4 Paul M. Moore United States Army, who distinguished himself by outstandingly meritorious service in connection with military operations against a hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam.

During the period 21 February 1968 to 25 October 1968 he consistently manifested exemplary professionalism and initiative in obtaining outstanding results. His rapid assessment and solution of numerous problems inherent in a counterinsurgency environment greatly enhanced the allied effectiveness against a determined and aggressive enemy.

Despite many adversities, he invariably performed his duties in a resolute and efficient manner. Energetically applying his sound judgement and extensive knowledge, he has contributed materially to the successful accomplishment of the United States mission in the Republic of Vietnam.

His loyalty, diligence and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit

upon himself and the United States Army."

ARMY COMMENDATION MEDAL

"Specialist Four Moore distinguished himself by heroic actions on 25 October 1968, while serving as the RTO with Company C, 4th Battalion, 9th Infantry in the Republic of Vietnam.

"While on a reconnaissance in force mission, Company C came under an intense hostile attack. With complete disregard for his own safety, Specialist Moore exposed himself to a heavy volume of hostile fire as he killed two insurgents who assaulted the command post. While placing effective fire on the hostile force, Specialist Moore was fatally wounded.

"His valorous actions contributed immeasurably to

the success of the mission and defeat of the enemy force. Specialist Moore's personal bravery, aggressiveness, and devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the 25th Infantry Division."
