Sandy District No. 72

Nov. 8, 6:29 p.m. First aid Highway 26 at east end of Pioneer Way. Toyoto pickup driven by Harry Furnish, Rt. 1, Sandy. Taken to Gresham hospital by Ambulance 72.

The Sandy Rural Fire District Board met in regular session Monday night. The new election law was studied and it was found that only one director is to be elected this year. This will be for a four year term.

Nov. 1-2:24 a.m. Received report of a two car wreck on Hwy. 26 at Brown Rd. Rescue Unit and one Engine responded. Four persons injured.

Nov. 1-4:54 a.m. Barn fire at Rt. 4 Box 1850 Boring (Hoffmeister Rd. between Regner and Hogan Rd.) DELAYED ALARM. A man and his wife driving from Sandy saw the glow of the fire and drove to it to watch the fire fighting activities. But, when they arrived NO FIRE TRUCKS. He then called the Fire Dept. The barn and 40 ton of hay were a total loss. Fireman were on the scene for 5½ hours. Mutual Aid from Clackamas and Happy Valley Fire Depts. NOTE No. 1.

Nov. 1-10:41 a.m. House fire at Rt. 3, Box 275-C, Gresham on Rugg Rd. near Hogan. The garage was fully involved when first unit arrived. Fire had not yet penetrated into the living areas, but smoke was thick throughout house. Fire was extinguished in minutes and smoke ejected from the house. Cause under investigation. LOSS: Approx. \$6,000.00 to the \$30,000.00 home. NOTE No. 2.

Nov. 1-11:44 a.m. Received report of a Home First Aid on Deep Creek Rd. A small boy had received major cuts to his foot from a rotary lawnmower. The parents transported him to the hospital after First Aid was given by the Rescue Crew.

Nov. 1-11:29 p.m. Car accident on Mkt. Rd. 30 at Borges Rd. Rescue crew stood by and directed traffic until police arrived. No injuries.

Nov. 2-9:24 p.m. Received report of brush fire at Winston and Foster Rd. Honest mistake, was a land clearing permit.

Nov. 4-11:01 a.m. Car accident at Jari Rd. and Hwy. 26. Use of a Porta Power was needed. The Porta-Power (Rescue Hydraulic Ram for prying trapped persons from crushed cars) sheared during

New Boring Fire Station Boasts Complete Facilities

Boring Fire District 59 moved to its new \$204,000 station east of town last week. They fight fires differently in rural areas. Firefighting equipment there must carry its own water to the fire. There are no fire hydrants in Boring or any of the district.

The new station has complete facilities including kitchen, eating room, sleeping room, showers plus offices and recreation facilities.

It sounds expensive. But the tax rate per \$1,000 property value rose from \$2.09 to \$2.12 cents this year. The reason was the increased property values in the district.

There was another bonus. Funds from the sale of bonds were invested until needed and the interest money was used to buy a large 42,000 gallon tanker which adds to the firefighting capacity.

Patrick Sahli On Vietnam Duty

Marine Lance Corporal Patrick G. Sahli, son of Mr. G. J. Sahli of Route 2, Boring, is serving with Headquarters and Service Battalion, Marine Force Logistic Command, in Vietnam.

The battalion forms the nucleus of the headquarters section for the 10,000-man command. It is responsible for conducting Marine air delivery efforts within Vietnam's northern fighting zone.

FLC is the largest supply, service and maintenance support organization in the Marine Corps. It serves all Marine and Republic of South Korea forces operating in northern South Vietnam.

dispatchers, Hazel Hite, Clar Belangy and Mike Murray, who man the board around the clock with the help of volunteers on Thursday and Friday night.

Volunteers who take night shifts are paid, but the money goes to a volunteer fund. The money is used to buy additional equipment. Most of the cost of the first aid car came from the fund.

The district now has six pieces of equipment at the Boring station. Delivery is expected on a new truck in February.

District 59 covers 64 square miles with substations in Damascus and Eagle Creek. These stations house a truck and the firemen are called by a monitor in their homes then must drive to the station. The alarm comes from the dispatch office in Boring.

An average of about 175 calls are answered each year. These include first aid calls, many of which are for accidents on Highway 26 to Mt. Hood.

The department now has an active roster of 25 volunteers. Since moving to the new station a "sleeper" has been hired to stay at the station. He is a Mt. Hood Community College student, Ron Becker.

Paid personnel includes Chief Matt Shields, Capt. Bob Rykken, Fireman Eric Peterson, plus three
