

Indians Top Pioneers In Final Wilco Battle

Joe Martin's 48-yard touch-down pass from Butch Wilson in the final period Friday, at Molalla, lifted the Indians to a 12-7 victory over Sandy for the Indian's third victory of the year, and dropped the Pioneers to a final season record of 2-7.



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The Pioneers built a 7-0 lead in the third quarter on a spectacular 87-yard pass interception by Frontiersmen speed merchant Brent Peterson, who hi-jacked Wilson's pass on his own 13 and raced down the gridiron untouched. Peterson also booted the extra point.

The sixth place Indians, who ran their final season record to 3-6, were held scoreless through most of the first three quarters by an inspired Pioneer defense. But late in the third period Mike Moore plunged over from the one to cut the margin to 7-6 as Molalla's two-point try for extra points was stymied. Much of the final period was scoreless until Wilson hit Martin on the winning 48-yard bomb.

The Pioneer's chances for comeback were terminated when the Indians picked off a Red and Black aerial to end the threat.

For Peterson, the long sprint into the end zone was his 104th point of his career and the PAT made it 105. It's broken down like this: 15 touchdowns, 13 one-point conversions, and one-two-point conversion.

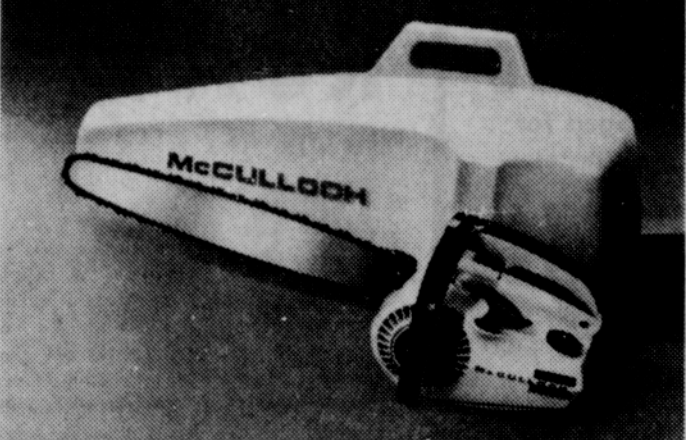
This year his touchdowns have been on 20, and 78-yard runs from scrimmage, a 92-yard kick-off return and an 87-yard runback of an interception.

5 Pioneer Tankers Win State Berths

In the District No. 2 swimming and diving competition at Reynolds pool Friday and Saturday, five members of the Pioneer team qualified for berths in the State Championships to be held at Eugene this week end.

In the competition against ten other teams in the District meet to qualify for the State meet it was necessary for divers to place first, second or third, and for swimmers to place first or second.

Rob Bignall cinched his ticket for State with his fine

first place performance on the diving board.

Others qualifying for the State meet were Laurie Samsel, second in the 100 yd freestyle; Kay Cousins, second in the 100 yd breaststroke; Ron Kipp, second in the 200 individual medley; and John Johnson, with another second in the 100 yd butterfly.

In an election held by their team mates, Laurie Samsel was voted the most valuable girl swimmer and Dave Lindsey the most valuable boy swimmer. Names as the most improved, were Kathy Batchelor, a diver, and John Zipprich.

Sandy Man Awarded Coast Guard Medal

Fireman Larry G. Little, 20, son of Mr. & Mrs. Jerrold L. Little of Rt. 3, Sandy, was awarded the Coast Guard Commendation Medal in ceremonies at the U.S. Coast Guard Station in Everett, Wash. recently.

The award was, in the words

of the citation: "For meritorious achievement in the performance of duty while serving aboard the Coast Guard Cutter 40425 on 9 June 1969 when the Kingston Ferry Terminal became engulfed by flames. Fireman Little skillfully maintained the P-60 fire pump in operating condition, though it became flooded by fire hoses.

"Although hampered by heavy creosote smoke, extreme heat, falling debris and water flooding the pump, it was kept operational resulting in the fire being brought quickly under control and safeguarding the hoseman whose safety depended on having constant water pressure to his hose. His timely actions under extremely trying conditions saved a valuable and essential community service and brought great credit on the Coast Guard.

"His highly professional seamanship, sound judgement and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Coast Guard."

Little graduated from Sandy Union High School in 1967. Slightly more than a year later he entered the Coast Guard. His first assignment was aboard the Coast Guard Cutter Pt. Countess in Port Angeles, Wash. Here he became involved in search-and-rescue work in the Straits of Juan De Fuca and Puget Sound. In September of 1968 he was transferred to his present station at Everett.

Little is married to the former Deborah Ann Quimby of Sandy. They reside in Everett.
