COLUMN COMMENTS

Plastic is all about - the pen I am writing this story with, the desk top, even the chair I am sitting on has plastic as a part of it.

Agriculture also is finding broader uses for plastic, with new uses and ideas uncovered every day.

Representatives of plastic industry met recently at Colorado University to discuss new uses of plastic in agriculture. Researchers came to the meeting from all parts of the United States and many other countries and the ideas presented were just as diverse.

In Italy they are experimenting with use of plastic (PVC) pipe to grow tomatoes. The idea uses hydroponics principle of plant production. (Hydroponics is a system whereby plants are grown in water as carrier of nutrients to plants root system). The Italian idea is more efficient than most hydroponics systems because they are limited to one plant. The Italian installation uses about 30 miles of P.V.C. pipe at several different levels. Holes were cut in the pipe for tomatoes to grow and nutrient solution pumped through the miles of pipes which would also be where tomato plants root system grows.

A plastic product called Polystyrene is being formed into lugs, trays, and boxes to ship vegetables and fruits to market. Everything from artichokes to pears are being packaged and shipped in these new containers. The saving in weight is an important consideration to shippers, particularly where air freight is involved.

The changes that plastic and its products have already made in agriculture are enormous.

State Seeks Gravel Bids

Bids will be received until 2 p.m. that day. No bid of less than 15 cents per cu. yd. will be considered nor will anything less than a minimum annual removal of 5,000 cu. yds. be considered.

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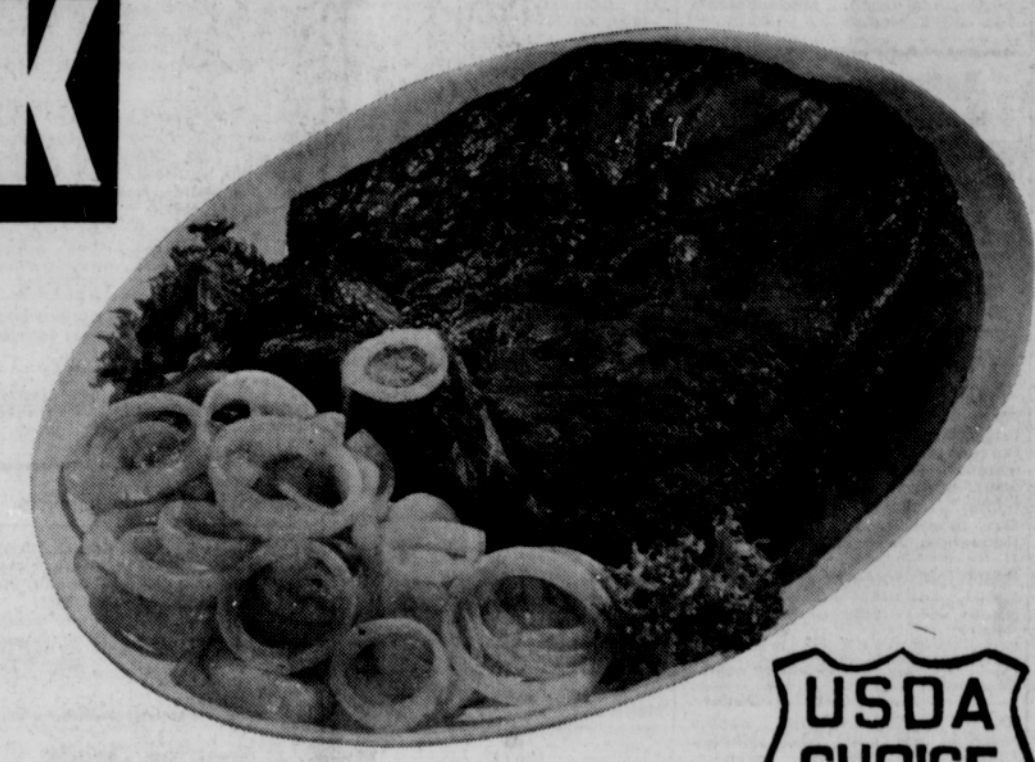
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
