*"Making the Sandy Scene"*

"This is the next year you expected so much from last year!" Don't worry too much if you've already broken your New Year's resolution; you can always remake it next year—after all, most New Year's resolutions go in one year and out the other!

A few weeks ago The Sandy Post carried a front-page news item on the newly-formed Mt. Hood Community College "Citizen Advisory Committee on Special Enrichment and Refresher Courses". I feel the Committee's formation is an exciting addition to the Sandy-Hoodland scene, and should be of great interest to everyone in the area.

Too many people only think about the college in terms of taxes,—forgetting the word "Community" in the college title. This is one of the reasons the Committee was formed—to advise the College of the interests and educational needs of the Sandy community—meaning Sandy and Hoodland. The Committee is made up of area residents who meet with college representatives and discuss the possibilities of

scheduling evening courses of interest in Sandy and on the Mountain.

The possibilities are almost unlimited. A glance through the "After Six" brochure received in last week's mail gives some indication of classes that could be brought to Sandy. Courses now available at (for example) David Douglas High School include Adult Basic Education (for adults who have not completed the 8th grade), Astrology, The Bible as Literature, Bridge, Communication with the Deaf, Dancing, German, Golf, Red Cross (First Aid), Slimnastics, Speedreading, Swimming and even a course on navigation and safe boat handling entitled Power Squadron!

There are business classes of typing, shorthand, bookkeeping and other office skills; classes in sewing, cake decorating, knitting, candy-making; classes in ceramics, oil painting, toile painting, candle-making; and technical courses in machine shop procedures, small gas engines, welding and woodshop. These are suggestions of classes that could be taught at Sandy, if sufficient interest was shown.

Mt. Hood College evening classes have started this week at Sandy High School for Basic Bishop Sewing, Cake Decorating, Graphoanalysis (understanding personality through handwriting), Lettering 1 (Calligraphy), Basic Engine Tune-up and Diagnosis, Welding, Personal Shorthand and Beginning Typing 2. There is a no-tuition course designed to prepare adults to take the General Education Development test for the purpose of receiving a high school equivalency certificate. This class is of special interest as each student works at his own pace and at his own educational level; there is no class competition. For many adults, this is their opportunity to get the equivalent of a high school diploma—a requirement in many occupations today. Wilbur "Pete" Sulzbach of Sandy teaches this course. Two college transfer courses are now available at Sandy High—General Psychology and English Composition.

Some courses suggested by the Committee at its initial meeting were: Basic Engine for Women, Judo, Basic First Aid, Small Carpentry Problems, Fire Safety in the Home, Toile Painting, Motorcycle Tune-Up and Repair, a Babysitting Clinic, a Drug Education series, Slimnastics, Speedreading, and possibly a series on Understanding your Teenager. The possibility of scheduling education courses for area teachers working on masters degrees, was also discussed.

The College wishes to meet the needs of the community—it is up to the community to advise the College on courses of interest and need in our area. The next meeting of the Advisory Committee is scheduled for Jan. 13. You can help by contacting members of the Committee and telling them what classes you would like to see brought out to Sandy and Hoodland.

Members of the Committee are Elsie Kithill—Zig Zag (community service representative from the College), Earl Covey—Welches, Dixie McKannay—Rhododendron; and from Sandy: Brother Andrew SSP, Fred Proett, Tom Day, Mel Lamm, Charles Croston, Tony Bryant, and myself.

Give the idea of adult education and evening courses in Sandy some serious thoughts—what would you like to see taught in the Sandy-Hoodland area—fly-tying? self-defense? chinese cooking? TV repair? Let the Committee know—classes begin with 12 interested people, a teacher, and a suitable location for such a class... All kinds of possibilities are open...

Will close this week with an amusing incident that happened over the holidays. A local businessman went into an area grocery and, as a greeting, raised his hand with the sign of "Peace". The grocery clerk wasn't quite on the same wave length; before she realized what he meant, she asked helpfully: "Two of what...?" Another example of lack of communication in today's contemporary world!
