Storm stops Mt. Hood climb by Sandy youth

"I can believe what these guys must be going through," said Dave Whitlock of Sandy when he heard about the two Eugene climbers, Dr. Latham Flanagan, Jr., and Dale Moon, who were being hunted on Mt. Hood.

The 21-year-old Sandy youth is a veteran of "at least 25 climbs" of Mt. Hood and had just had his fifth annual New Year's climb of the mountain cut short by the same storm which gripped the mountain and delayed searchers from reaching the two Eugene climbers.

Whitlock who lives at Rt. 3 Box 798 when he is at home in Sandy with his parents said that the climb this year is the last one he will make during this time of year.

"I started climbing the mountain and spending New Year's night on it during my senior year at Sandy High School and during the past few years including this one I have had the companionship of Daniel Reid a student at Mt. Hood Community College," stated Whitlock.

This year the two set off on Saturday Dec. 26 spending the first night at Silcox hut on the mountain before running into the snow storm and a night of "little sleep and a fight for air," said Whitlock.

The Sandy youth and his friend had no problems on Saturday reaching the hut but on Sunday when they started out they ran into white-outs and thick clouds giving limited vision.

"We stopped about 3 p.m. Sunday to make camp because the storm was getting bad. It took us about three hours to

complete our camp which consisted of a well being dug 3½ feet deep, six feet wide and 10 feet long in the snow," said Whitlock.

Just as they got their little camp finished the storm "hit us with high winds and a lot of snow blowing," he said.

He and Dan were prepared to spend several days on the mountain and had with them enough food to last about 10 days.

"The storm that night dropped about 18 inches of snow and we had to keep digging out the entrance of the tunnel-cave we were in order to let the air flow or else we would have died for lack of air," stated Whitlock.

The two did not sleep much because every hour one of them would have to clear the entrance of snow. "I did a lot of thinking up there that night but never was I really worried about making it out alive as the two Eugene men must be after several days on the mountain," he said.

When Sunday came, the day the two Eugene climbers decided after their one night that the storm was getting too rough and that they had better abandon their New Year's climb.

Originally they had planned to weather out any storm for as long as three or four days according to Dave "but this storm did not seem to be getting any better, rather worse so we decided to leave."

They had problems coming down the mountain due to white outs which made them see things which were not there.

"Often a climber in a white out will see people or houses or something else which are not there and we were having this problem. I saw houses and skiers, but nothing was really there," said Dave.

When they finally made it down the mountain the two split to celebrate the New Year's apart.

"We were both glad to get down and to be able to enjoy the rest of our vacation from school," stated Dave.
