

Pioneers wait games after Astoria loss

The snowy weather has forced the cancellation of the game between Sandy and Molalla basketball teams on Tuesday and Wednesday nights and according to coach Jim Kitchen of Sandy the game will be made up hopefully either Wednesday or Thursday of next week if not tonight depending on the weather.

Meanwhile the Pioneers are ready for either Molalla or to meet Sweet Home on Friday night. Both games are to be played here or to meet St. Helens there on Tuesday night.

The Pioneers are coming off another game which saw them fold in the closing minutes of the final period and drop a 76-57 game to the visiting Astoria Fishermen.

The loss dropped the Pioneers to a one win and five loss mark for the season.

In the Astoria game led by the sharp-shooting of Steve Buhler and the rebounding of Rick Zimmerman the Sandy five moved to a first quarter lead of 18-15 as the visiting Fishermen had problems

finding the range. But in the second quarter the visitors got a couple of easy baskets and the Pioneers seemed to lose some of their defensive skill as the Fishermen moved to a halftime lead of 34-31.

During halftime talks Sandy coach Jim Kitchen must have put a charge under his team as the Pioneers came back onto the court and moved to tie the score and then go ahead by one point midway through the third stanza.

The Astoria team then ran off three straight points at the end of the period to regain their three point halftime lead 50-47 going into the final period.

Then like the team did in the Silverton game last week the Pioneers seemed to run out of gas in the final period and let the visitors get several easy buckets and they themselves were unable to put the ball into the hoop.

Astoria outscored Sandy 26-10 in this fatal fourth period as Sandy seemed unable to even stop the substitutes late in the

game. Buhler led the game in scoring with 21 points and was followed in the Sandy scoring by center Zimmerman with 14 points.

Astoria got 18 points from Ihlande and 18 points from Lebrhck.

Sandy shot 43 per cent from the field and 65 per cent from the free throw lane, which according to Kitchen should have been good enough to win

most high school games, but the visitors hit 47 per cent from the field and caused the Pioneers to turn the ball over on errors 26 times with many of these coming in the final period.

Other scorers for Sandy in the game were Randy Ackers 3, Mike Leary 3, Terry 5, Ray Perkins 2, Dean Dickinson.

The Pioneer JV's fell before the visiting Astoria team 68-39 before the varsity game.

Trail contract awarded

Mt. Hood National Forest has awarded a contract for the reconstruction of one mile of the Larch Mountain Trail near Multnomah Falls.

Ralph Company, Inc., Kenmore, Wash., was awarded the contract for over \$49,500. Work has begun and is scheduled for completion June 1.

Reconstruction will include restoration of the trail tread, installing rock retaining walls, paving and construction of an observation platform at the top of the 620-foot falls.

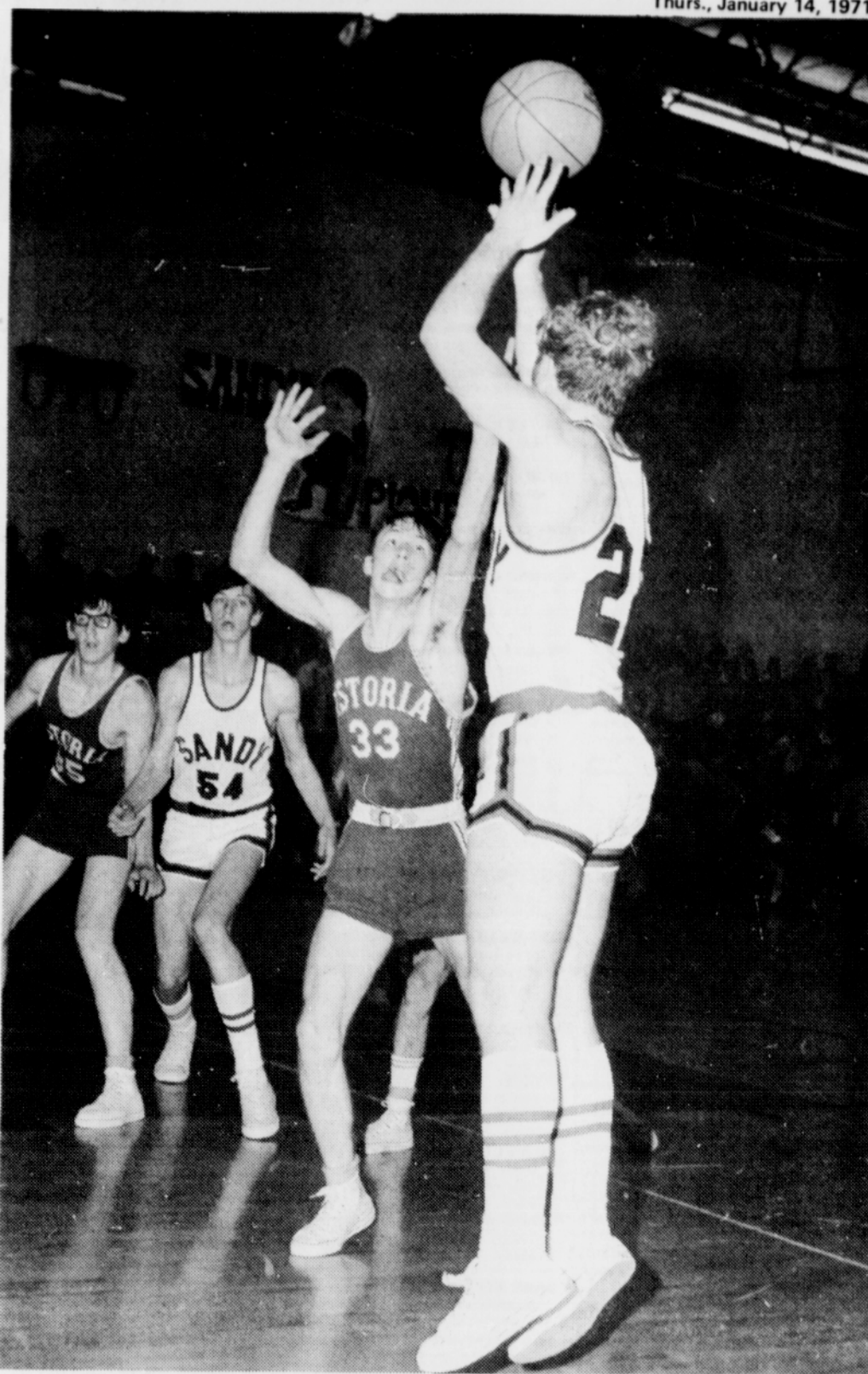
The work is one of a series of

News and Views About Mt. Hood Community College

OUTDOOR ADVENTURE

Mountaineer Luther Jerstad captivated his audience last Monday evening as he described incidents from several famous mountain climbs since 1900. His class, "Outdoor Adventure," is one of the more unusual classes available in the area today.

Jerstad, one of only five Americans to have scaled the world's tallest peak, defines adventure as "doing something out of the ordinary. Adventure is leaving the comfort of our modern American homes to pit oneself against nature."

"Adventure, continues Jerstad, "is living as man lived in the Stone Age, by his own imagination, initiative and ingenuity." In the process of doing all of this Jerstad says, "you get an opportunity to see a little different attitude toward life. Our basic beliefs begin to change and we learn that we don't need all of the accoutrements that we have in our everyday lives."

With this in mind, the class began to plan two outings within the next five or six weeks, depending on the weather. The first outing is an overnight adventure on the slopes of Mt. Hood. The group will learn how to live and survive in the snow, including how to cook, travel and sleep.

The second outing will consist of a white water trip on the Clackamas River. Prior to the outdoor activities, the group will learn some basic techniques in the comfort of the Physical Education building at Mt. Hood. Though the first session has been held, additional students may still take the course. Registration may be completed at the next class session, which begins at 7 p.m. Jan. 18 in the P.E. building.
