

Spring turkey hunt date established

A spring gobbler hunt for wild turkeys will take place May 1-9, according to an announcement from the Oregon State Game Commission.

Only 250 tags will be issued for the hunt and interested shotguns have until Feb. 17 to submit their applications. A drawing to pick successful applicants will be held Feb. 26.

Applications must be made on the controlled season application form available at all license agencies and one or two individuals may apply on a single application.

Hunters whose names are picked in the drawing will be charged a \$2 tag fee. Do not submit the fee with the application.

The same area which was open to turkey hunting last fall will be open in this controlled shoot, generally east of the Cascade summit and north of Highway 26.

The bag limit is one male turkey and the use of dogs is prohibited. Interested hunters

should check upland bird regulations for further information.

Meadow's racers earn rest after ski wins

Racers from Mt. Hood Meadows Ski Club continued to fight it out among themselves for top spot in weekend races at White Pass, Wash. and Mt. Hood Meadows.

At the Schwaegler Cup, a class A and expert race, Jenny Carson and Carol Carter set the standard for the rest of the field. In the women's slalom, Jenny out raced teammate Carol for first place. Carol, a fraction of a second slower, assured a win for the team with a good second place finish.

In the women's giant slalom, Carol showed consistency in another second place effort while Jenny salvaged fourth despite a fall during her run.

Meanwhile, Carol's husband Tim was hard at work on the men's course. In a field of 40 racers, Tim placed 7th in the slalom and 13th in the giant slalom.

Nearer to home, in

intermediate and novice teams put on a fine performance in the Meadows Slalom hosted by the Meadows Ski Club. The race drew more than 150 racers from various Washington and Oregon areas.

This time it was the men who set the pace for the rest of the teams with another one-two win in the 45 gate slalom. At the end of the first run Mark Purdy edged teammate Ryan Rooper into a three-way tie for third. Purdy's time was good enough for 2nd. Although a day long rain may have dampened the racers, it apparently did not extinguish the determination of either racer in the second run. Delayed by the large number of novices who ran before them, the intermediate boys did not begin their second run until darkness began to close.

Rooper rocketed through the artificially lit second run a full second faster than the other racers. His combined time would prove to be good enough to capture first. Mark having run the first run as an unseeded racer had to run at the end of the reversed starting order for the second run. In a tremendous show of determination, Mark turned in a second run fast enough to assure an overall second place prize.

On the girls course Linda McGee, another Meadows racer put together two good runs and finished with a combined time fast enough for second.

The novice racers were limited to one run only and in that race, 10-year-old Billy Johnson out ran the rest of the sixty racers for second place. Loren Shumway's solid run earned him 4th.

Mark Purdy will wear the team's "Black Hat" for his persistence and tremendous effort in the slalom.

All the teams will be returning to the Meadows this coming weekend for training and some relaxation before leaving again the following weekend for races at Spokane.
