To The Editor,

A Hoodland action organization known as the Hoodland Planning Group has been active in studying the area's needs for a master plan to guide future growth in the mountain corridor. It is felt that without a plan to define how commercial, residential, recreational, water and sewerage patterns should occur to best harmonize with Hoodland's environment, that quality of life which we now enjoy may be destroyed.

One of the problems that exists prior to the implementation of the land use plan is that development now in progress, or due to begin soon, can jeopardize the land use plan by predetermining growth patterns which may be undesirable. A halt to all new building until the land use plan is adopted is unrealistic; it penalizes new property owners by having them defer their plans, and it represents an unfair embargo on wages of local builders and real estate firms.

But while a halt to a new building is not practical, perhaps a freeze on all zoning changes is not unfair to anyone. The Director of the Clackamas County Planning Dept. has publicly favored such a move as in the best interests of the

mountain corridor. It remains now to convince the County Commissioners that this is a proper course of action until such time as a land use plan is implemented.

The County Commissioners are responsive to the public's desires. But too often all they hear are the sappy requests of sub-dividers with no one from the other side to represent private citizens. Hoodlanders who care about maintaining their quality of life in the face of tremendous growth demands over the next several years must convince the County Commissioners that Hoodland is not the same as Milwaukie, and that Route 26 is not the same as Route 99E. If we don't convince the County of this, then the current County thinking of "build-build-for the increase in tax revenues" will continue.

The County Commissioners have a meeting on Feb. 24, Wednesday, at 10 a.m. in the Oregon City Courthouse at which this subject will be discussed. If you care about the future of Hoodland, please attend the meeting. Free transportation may be had by calling the writer at 622-3306.

Denny said the school is wanting to grow to meet the needs of people in the area which means a campus in Sandy. At present the school is busy looking for a campus site and have looked at some 11 sites in the Sandy area. The Sandy branch will house up to 5,000 students by 1990.

mission members stated in meetings last week that the problem of water for Sandy is critical not only to meet present needs but if the city plans to grow and develop.

This spring the city is replacing the old five inch water line coming down from Cedar Creek with a new six inch line which will help in the immediate future for providing quicker refill of the tanks during heavy use times.

The \$10,000 needed for this project has already been budgeted in the 1969-70 and the 1970-71 budget, according to Duff.

During all the conversation the last few weeks by city officials it looks like they believe that when the new Bull Run line is completed it will be the answer to the water problems of Sandy, but in the meantime they must find solutions for the needs now.

The meeting on Wednesday night Feb. 17 could supply some of the answers according to city officials.

planned move by the college into the Sandy area.

Denny said the schools educational growth was in the areas of vocational, lower division transfer courses and enrichment courses.

At present MHCC is developing small neighborhood campuses in the district to help promote employment by training students in certain work areas.

He said the situation at Hood River is bad because the need for the school to help train area residents is needed right now because Dow and Harvey Aluminum plants are in the need for trained employees this summer.

Denny also stated that the school is busy planning the 40 acres below the present campus site in Gresham. He said that this area will be used in a joint effort with groups such as OMSI who wants to establish an east area site.

He stated that MHCC has grown in the last four years from 300 full time students to 4,000 full time students on their Gresham campus.

The Sandy campus will be built on 300 to 500 acres, according to Denny.

SEMINARS CONTINUE

Two seminar classes continue to operate weekly on the Mt. Hood campus.

The first, concerning environmental problems on the national and local level, meets each Monday at 7 p.m. Next Monday, Bob Delf of the Public Health Service will discuss the causes and effects of venereal disease.

In the other class, Practical Management for Small Business, Richard Haeder, an attorney with Birch & Haeder, will explain franchising.

Pollution staff busy

Field investigations made by the Columbia-Willamette Air Pollution Authority staff totaled 309 for the month of January with 220 public complaints received and checked. Complaints on black smoke lead the list for a total of 114.

Public complaints against open burning rose to a high of 77 as citizens registered their dissatisfaction with burning of Christmas tree refuse by their neighbors.

Ringelmann or black smoke emissions drew citations for 10 violators, all located in Multnomah County. Citations for violation of the open burning ban were also issued to several persons. The open burning violations were scattered throughout the region.

Notice of construction involving control equipment to the sum of \$40,800 was given by 7 firms of which 6 were approved.

Expenditures totalling \$28,650 were made by 11 commercial and industrial firms in pollution control measures which will remove an estimated 500 tons of pollutants from the atmosphere annually. Eight locations now using incinerators were converted to haul-away or baler operation of waste disposal, among which were St. Thomas More School, Ainsworth Food Center, Glenn King, Inc., Frey Meyer Stores at Rockwood, Division and Tigard, the Cedar Hills Shopping Center, Girods Market, Tigard. The Hollywood Fred Meyer Store has converted from an incinerator to an improved incinerator with a scrubber. The Volney Felt Mill has installed an approved method of collection involving a cyclone and bag filter, while the Clatskanie Timber Products has phased out its wigwam burner and installed hogger bins to dispose of waste.

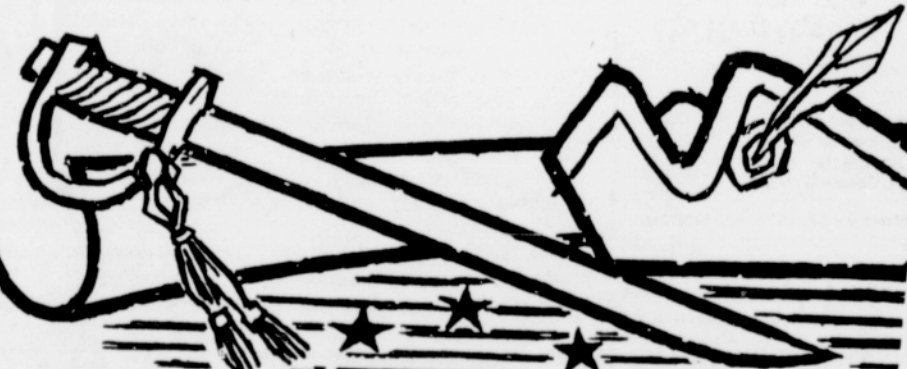

Two counties seek college annexation

Petitions for annexation to the Mt. Hood Community College district will be presented by representatives of Wasco and Hood River counties Thursday night.

The move had been long anticipated since efforts to form a Mid-Columbia Community College district fell through.

Technically, the MHCC board will take the matter under advisement Thursday night. Ultimately, the State Board of Education will hold a hearing and make a recommendation.

If there is a sufficient remonstrance to this recommendation, an election will be held. Wasco and Hood River counties would vote first. If they approve, then the matter would be put to MHCC voters.

A small part of Hood River county (in the Cascade Locks area) already is in the Mt. Hood district. The annexation petitions involve the balance of Hood River county plus all of Wasco.

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
