

County 4-Hers hold contest

"Show and tell" will be the activity of the day Saturday, April 3, when Clackamas County 4-H Club members participate in the 4-H Demonstration Contest, reports Mrs. Georgene Southwell, Extension Agent, 4-H and Youth Development.

The contest will be conducted at Gardiner Junior High School, Oregon City, beginning at 9 a.m. 4-H Club members, parents, and friends are invited to come watch others demonstrate. The public is also invited.

Demonstrations will be given by Junior 4-H members (9-11 years) Intermediates (12-14), and Seniors (15 and older) who are enrolled in any 4-H project. Contest divisions include Home Economics and General and Agriculture.

All demonstrations will be judged by an official judge and will be awarded a blue, red, or white ribbon. Blue ribbon winners in the Intermediate and Senior divisions will compete at the Clackamas County Fair in August for special awards and an opportunity to compete at the Oregon State Fair.

The top junior team and individual demonstrator in each division will receive a partial campship to attend 4-H Camp Colton in June.

Demonstrations are an important part of the 4-H Club program. They give 4-H members an opportunity to learn to talk in front of a group while they use their hands to show a useful practice or how to do something. 4-H members also help others learn as they demonstrate.



The spotlight will fall on THE SONS OF THE PIONEERS April 16-17-18 during an entertainment break in the competition at the Pacific Indoor Rodeo. The legendary singing group will be featured in a dramatic presentation of the SAGA OF THE WEST at Memorial Coliseum. Action at the Pacific Indoor Rodeo will feature top nationally ranked professional cowboys including Oregon's own Larry Mahan. The Rodeo begins 8:00 p.m. Friday and Saturday, 2:00 p.m. Sunday.

Cancer Society's campaign set to begin in state

The annual crusade of the American Cancer Society's Oregon division will get underway Thursday, April 1, and continue through the month.

Ken Wright, Springfield, Ore., state crusade chairman,

stressed that the April crusade has a two-fold purpose: to raise funds for the society's research, education and service programs and to acquaint the public with life-saving facts about cancer.

"We are obviously very interested in raising funds," Wright stated, "but we are also vitally interested in alerting the public to the 7 cancer warning signals."

Wright, manager of the Springfield branch of the First National Bank of Oregon, pointed out that the Oregon division of the American Cancer Society sponsors 2 mobile educational units that travel the state year-around, bringing information about cancer to the public.

The mobile educational units, which are equipped with movie projectors, tape recordings and other educational aids, visit schools, county fairs, industries and other areas where people are gathered.

"We want every person in Oregon to learn and remember the 7 warning signals of cancer," Wright stated. "Lives can be saved through early diagnosis and treatment."

April has been designated as Cancer Control month by the U.S. Congress and Oregon's Gov. Tom McCall has urged everyone in the state to learn the warning signals and join in the society's Oregon division.

Gardeners advised to control rust

Rusty leaves and canes in the garden berry patch last summer will be the condition again unless dormant sprays are applied just as the new leaves begin to show advises OSU horticulturists.

The disease is rust and difficult to control unless dormant sprays of lime-sulfur are applied explained Wilbur W. Burkhardt, area extension agent.

At the same time the dormant sprays are applied for rust control, several other diseases are prevented. Weather conditions cannot stand in the way of spray application.

A few hours of rain-free weather will allow spray to be applied and "set" in order to form a barrier against entry of the disease producing spores. Burkhardt suggests early completion of pruning to remove old canes and those not needed for the coming year's crop. Old canes should be promptly taken from the patch but may be left on the ground to catch the excess spray that may fall on them and stop further spore development.

Once the spray job is complete the refuse should be taken from the patch immediately and burned if local regulations permit or the waste material chopped and buried in the compost pile to undergo heating and decomposition.

Garden centers have the approved spray materials for dormant sprays. Dilutions for use on caneberrys are given on the label and must be followed carefully to insure results, Burkhardt added.

Applications are out for 4-H summer school

Applications to attend the 1971 4-H Summer School at Oregon State University, June 14-19, have been mailed to Clackamas county 4-H members, reports Harold Black, county extension agent.

Some 1,800 young people 13 and older are expected to attend the 56th annual event on the Corvallis campus. Clackamas county will be able to send 144 members, a substantial increase over previous years.

Theme of the 1971 session is "Meet Someone Halfway." During the five days, 4-H members will participate in classes, tours and discussions aimed at introducing them to various careers and college life as well as live in college dormitories and hear outstanding speakers, says Cal Monroe, OSU 4-H and youth specialist.

Additional application blanks for Summer School are available from the county extension office for 4-H members who have not received them in the mail, Black said.

Applications are to be completed and returned to 4-H club leaders by April 15. Individual 4-H members may send their applications directly to the county extension office.

Selection of the county's Summer School delegation will be made shortly after May 1. All 4-H members who were 13 before Jan. 1 are eligible to attend with the exception of those who have gone three times already, Black explained. Many organizations in the county have made scholarships available to help offset the \$35 cost.

For Oregonians, an umbrella is more than a fashion accessory. It's a necessity.

Before buying an umbrella, open it and hold it to the light to check the closeness of the weave. And while you have it open, look for pinholes, patches or breaks in the fabric. Also check to see that the fabric is securely fastened at the center of the frame.

If no light shows through, chances are no rain will come through there either. Even though most cover fabrics are treated with a water-repellent finish, a closely woven fabric is one of the best buying cues for keeping dry under an umbrella.

Open and close the umbrella several times to make sure the parts move easily. Look for fluted ribs with a hollowed-out appearance, as a solid rib is apt to break.

The number of ribs in the frame determines the weight and size of the umbrella. They are made with 8, 10 or 16 ribs, the smaller number of ribs being lighter in weight. Check to see that the cover is fastened securely to the frame.

Heyden is awarded Bronze Star
