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The night driving fatality rate is 6.3 per 100,000,000 vehicle miles, compared to 2.3 during daylight.

Clackamas County currently has no funds or financing available for such emergency needs as: emergency dental, heat, lights, transportation costs, housing, etc. Our office has been inundated with calls requesting emergency aid. We must then begin the long, drawn-out process of contacting churches, service clubs, and private citizens. Hopefully some group or some individual will answer our call for help. The saddest part is that the greatest percentage of these calls come from senior citizens living on fixed incomes which are simply not adequate enough to cover emergencies. One senior citizen, after exhausting all other possible avenues, came into our office in tremendous pain. His teeth were actually falling out. Fortunately, a private dentist accepted this man on a voluntary basis.

Children are the greatest problem. Lack of heat and food may be catastrophic to them. Putting parents' personalities aside, children simply must not be punished. Frequently, the parents cannot help the situation they are in. Sudden medical expenses may deplete existing money and as a consequence emergency help is in order.
