All day Saturday, May 1, there will be an art exhibit sponsored by Bob Brown. This display will feature art work of the students plus some of Mr. Brown's artistic ventures. Mr. Slind, metal shop instructor, will be demonstrating casting in his room from 2-4 p.m. At the same time, Mr. Stofko, science instructor, will be showing a display of slides, taxidermy, and various other items, and Mrs. Keller will exhibit some projects of her students and other displays in the Home Economics room. The Folk Festival is running two nights this year because of the tremendous success of last year's program. This year's program will feature music of

the American people, but will also include skits and monologues. Different groups and soloists will be performing along with Estacada's Concert Choir, Stage Band, and Vocal Ensemble. The cost for the Folk Festival is \$1.25 for adults and \$.75 for students. Tickets entitle the purchaser to select the night he wishes to attend, but people are cautioned to arrive early, as seats are not reserved. A

portion of the proceeds will be donated to the A.F.S. fund and the remainder will go the Music Department. Cost for the Kraut Feed will be \$1.50 for adults, \$1.00 for students, and \$.50 for ten-year-olds and under. The menu will be Sauerkraut, smoked sausage, mashed potatoes, black bread, and home-baked desserts. Proceeds of the Kraut Feed will go to the German Club Scholarship Fund.
