City park development needs public input

Public input is being sought by the city in the planning for the 9.5 acre city park in Sandy. The city will spend \$6,600 during the next year on improving the park located directly behind the city hall on Main St.

Under the direction of Olin Bignall and Joe Astleford of the city planning commission a presentation on what can be done with the park will be presented to organizations and groups in the Sandy area.

In the planning commission meeting Wednesday night it was announced that Robert

Perron Landscape Architects of Portland is the firm which will help the planning commission in planning the park development.

According to Astleford, a slide show on what is available at the park now and what some of the possible uses of the park could be is being developed.

This slide show will be presented for the first time this Tuesday at the Chamber of Commerce meeting at noon at T.J.'s.

The planning commission with the help of the Perron firm will draw up a master plan

after hearing from the people of Sandy what they want in the park.

Tentative plans call for the first construction to be ready to go on July 1. Of the first \$6,600 funds to be spent on the park \$3,300 will be returned to the city through matching funds.

The planning commission is anxious to hear from different groups in the area as to what is needed in the city park. Also the slide show is available to anyone who wishes to have it presented.

Police car is awarded

Carlson Chevrolet of Sandy had the low bid for the new police car for the city police.

The bid was \$3,385.52. The car when it arrives will be converted to propane.

The results of the bidding and the ordering of the car took place in a special city council meeting held Wednesday night before the city planning commission meeting.

In the planning meeting an annexation request by Mrs. Alice Olson was granted.

In the hearing on the request, several neighbors in the area along Bluff Rd. stated their interest in benefits and the cost of annexing to the city.

The problem of obtaining the access to a road right-of-way in the area was discussed and left to the people in the neighborhood since it was outside the present city limits.

More power is needed

At the Chamber of Commerce meeting Tuesday, Neil Jackson from Portland General Electric told members the need for the new utility poles was due to population growth east of Sandy.

Jackson responded to questions from the Chamber members stating that the firm needed the new poles to handle the cable for the new substation PGE is building at Welches.

He stated the new poles are much taller than the old ones but they will not have cross bars on them. The old poles also will come down, he stated.

It was stated that PGE would help the city if possible in the future beautification plans for the city.

No cuts are made

High school budget vote set for May 28

The Sandy high school budget which lost on May 3 will be re-submitted to the voters on Friday, May 28.

The budget committee in its meeting Monday night voted to return the budget to the voters a second time rather than cut anything from it.

The budget lost 291 yes votes to 305 no votes in the May 3 election. The committee felt that the budget defeat had a lot to do with "yes" voters staying home.

At the meeting no one spoke against the budget, while several spoke in favor of it. The

committee in re-submitting the budget noted that they felt it was a workable budget and if it was cut then the educational programs at the high school would suffer.

Superintendent Charles Croston stated that the budget had been screened by the budget committee before the first election and he felt that the committee had cut everything it could from the budget without hurting the educational program at the school.

There was quite a lot of discussion concerning more than one polling place for the

budget. It was stated by several committee members that if a polling place was established in each feeder grade school more voters would vote.

It was pointed out by school board member Earl Meier, that only 596 persons voted on the high school budget on May 3 while 1,179 voted in all the grade school elections on that day.

But after the discussion it was decided to keep the one poll at the high school for this election because of the additional cost factor if they set up polls at the grade schools. The cost would be over \$300 total, according to school officials.

The Sandy high Dad's Club and the Teachers Association volunteered to conduct a drive to get more voters out for the Friday, May 28 election.

The two groups will conduct a phone call campaign to remind voters to vote and also they indicated that they would possibly have transportation for persons to the polls available.

In setting the date, the committee noted that the day was the beginning of the Memorial Day weekend but if it was not held then the vote would not be able to be held until sometime in June. They felt the May 28 date was the best time and with the help of the phone campaign a good turnout should be had.

Absentee ballots are available at the school and must be returned before the polls close on May 28. A written request is needed to obtain an absentee ballot.

Approval sought for interchange

The Oregon State Highway Commission is taking another step to solve the problem of the Boring interchange on the Mt. Hood Highway 26, known as Blood Alley to local residents.

The state has requested the approval of the Federal Highway Administration so that the right-of-way acquisition and construction of the Boring Road Interchange Section on the Mt. Hood Highway (26) can start.

The request comes following the state highway commission's study of the

testimony received at the March 2 hearing held in Sandy.

Local residents have been requesting that something be done to the dangerous intersection ever since several fatal accidents have happened there since the highway was completed.

By taking the action on Tuesday the State Highway Commission is asking the federal agency to approve the location-design of the proposed project to provide for a full interchange.

Three accidents are reported east of Sandy

Three accidents east of Sandy on Highway 26 happened during the past week.

The first accident was on May 6 when Claudia Goodell, Rt. 1 Box 672, Sandy, was injured when her car was rolled 1.3 miles east of Sandy.

The police report showed a blowout was the suspected cause for the accident.

She was taken to Gresham hospital with cuts to the head and an injured leg.

Another accident which happened early that same day in nearly the same spot involved four vehicles. Two cars heading west and two trucks working on the new electric poles. No injuries were reported.

According to the police report the car driven by Laydon Gordon of Gladstone was totaled in the accident.

The other car driven by Jack M. Schrum, Jr. of Portland was driven from the scene of the accident.

Gordon's car and one of the trucks went over the bank when the accident occurred.

The accident happened when one of the cars tried to move to the inside line because the outside line was blocked due to construction. The two cars then struck each other and one of the cars collided with the trucks.

A motorcycle accident east of Sandy on Sunday sent one person to Gresham hospital.

Water reservoir plan is approved

The Boring Water District No. 24 received approval on a conditional use permit last week to construct a water reservoir as part of the construction of their new water system.

This action along with the letting of contracts last week enabled work to begin last week.

The reservoir will be constructed on the north side of Highway 212 near the Haley Road intersection in the Boring area. Approval for the reservoir came from the county Board of Adjustment with the requirement that the county Planning Dept. must approve the landscaping plans of the facility.

In other action last week by the Board of Adjustment, a temporary permit request by W.A. Burk was continued to the first meeting in June. The move was made to allow Burk to obtain a building permit. He had requested use of a mobile home as a temporary residence while clearing a land and building a house on his property between Sylvan Way and Highway 26 in the Alder Creek area.

A request by Theresia Bauach to use a mobile home as a residence at a home for the aged was denied. She had

requested use of the mobile home so she could live near the patients. The request was for property east of Langensand Road, approximately one-half mile south of Sandy.

Toll free calls are sought

Over 400 names have been collected in the petition drive to get toll free phone calls to Gresham, Sandy and Portland from the Hoodland area.

The petitions will be gathered and mailed to the Hoodland telephone company, Western Valley Telephone Co., on May 14 and it is hoped that over 600 phone subscribers in the mountain area will have signed it by then.

At present petitions are now located for signing in the Clackamas County Bank, Zig Zag Inn, Sentry Grocery Store at Rhododendron, Zig Zag Store, Hoodland Park Pharmacy, the Mobil service station at Brightwood and at the liquor store in Rhododendron.

The petition states, "We the undersigned telephone subscribers of Hoodland Telephone Company wish to request that Hoodland Telephone Co.

Vote set on budget

Voters in the Pleasant Valley school district will go to the polls again Wednesday, June 2, to decide on the 1971-72 school budget.

The amount asked is \$221,893, the same amount turned down by the voters, 138-129, earlier this month. The district has no tax base, hence must vote on the entire levy annually.

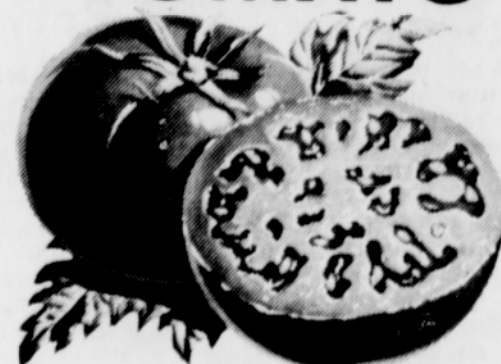
