

Welches teacher receives fellowship

Nancy Dougherty has been awarded a Fellowship for the 1971-72 Experienced Teacher Fellowship Program. The program will begin with the coming 1971 summer session at the University of Oregon and continue until conclusion of spring term 1972.

Only ten teachers through out the State of Oregon have been selected to participate in this program that is truly unique and the only project of its kind in the United States.

The two primary needs with which this project will be concerned are: (1) The urgent need for regular elementary teachers who can work more effectively with socially, emotionally and or culturally handicapped children in rural or urban schools in the State of Oregon. (2) The need to modify existing teacher preparation programs to successfully teach emotionally and culturally disadvantaged children.

The program is designed to demonstrate that teachers can be prepared to cope successfully, in the regular classroom, with a large percentage of children with behavioral and learning problems that are presently routinely referred to specialists and are currently considered unresolvable within the regular classroom.

Four major areas will be covered (1) Theory (2) Field Experiences with Disadvantaged (3) Classroom Management (4) Academic Diagnosis and Correction.

Because the variations and intensiveness of the training are so extensive and comprehensive in nature that a full description at this time would be an injustice to the program, the participant, and the reader. The school district will however, give a more in-

teresting and descriptive account as Mrs. Dougherty progresses through the program.

Dr. Hotchkiss, director of this program stressed that one of the major factors contributing to Welches having representation in this unusual program was evidence of the district's ability and willingness to cooperate in an innovative

educational adventure.

Mrs. Nancy Dougherty is under contract to return to the district upon her completion of the program which should result in her receiving her M.S. degree in Education, along with her being well equipped to assist students who for one reason or another are experiencing problems in learning.
