Education bill passes Senate

This week, the Oregon Legislature was highlighted by two distinguished visitors, major decisions in both Houses and significant committee action on key pieces of legislation.

Oregon's and the United States representative to the table tennis tournament in China visited the Oregon Legislature this week. Miss Judy Bochinski, the 15-year-old Eugene sophomore, visited the House and Senate and played a game of table tennis with Governor Tom McCall. As could be expected, Judy firmly and soundly defeated the Governor.

On the following day, Apollo 14 astronaut, Stewart Roosa, visited the Capitol and presented Governor McCall with an Oregon flag which had been taken to the moon. He also spoke to both the house and the

senate. Roosa was the Apollo 14 astronaut that orbited the moon while his two companions walked on the lunar surface.

The Senate passed House Bill 1239 which was passed earlier by the House. The bill would do away with the doctrine that there is fault in divorce cases and would allow divorce when it can be shown that there are irreconcilable differences that lead to a breakdown in a marriage. This law is similar to one in effect in Iowa and California eliminating the requirement that one party in a divorce be proven at fault on one or several grounds such as adultery or cruelty.

The Senate has also approved a teacher tenure bill in the Senate Education Committee. It now goes to the Senate for discussion and debate this next week. An important change in the bill is the establishment and evaluation record for every public school teacher in Oregon.

Nothing in the file will be kept secret from the teacher and his reply or reaction to the evaluation will automatically become part of the file itself. Secondly, every teacher, in what are now tenure districts, will have the right to a fair hearing before dismissal in as short a time as possible.

After a teacher learns that he is dismissed, his case can be reviewed by a professional review committee. If the school board still votes for dismissal, the teacher can appeal the decision to a newly created panel, four persons appointed by the Governor, known as the Fair Dismissal Appeals Board. If the bill would pass, it would take effect immediately. Fair dismissal procedures would be extended to all public school districts in the state on July 1 of 1973.

In the Senate State and Federal Affairs Committee, the Department of Human Resources bill has been approved. The bill was passed by the House but the Senate committee has made some extensive amendments. It will now be returned to the lower chamber if it gains Senate approval.

The newly created Department of Human Resources would combine the present Division's Vocational Rehabilitation, Welfare, Employment, Corrections and Mental Health, along with the program on aging and the State Economic Opportunity office.

As passed by the House, the bill also included the Blind Commission, but this was dropped by the Senate committee.

In the House Committee on State and Federal Affairs, two significant pieces of legislation were sent to the House floor this week. House Bill 1057 which would create a new Department of Natural Resources is another part of the government reorganization taking place in the session this year.

House Bill 1057 would combine the State Board of Forestry and Water Resources Board, the Soil and Water Conservation Board, the State Department of Geology and Mineral Industries and the State Fish and Game Commission.

House Bill 1048 which was also approved this week and sent to the House floor is designed to provide a single code for new construction in Oregon, thus controlling construction costs, permitting mass production and enhancing the adoption of new materials and building technology.

Oregon has a state plumbing code administered by the Board of Health and an electrical code administered by the Bureau of Labor. Both are supplemented by local jurisdiction, thus they vary greatly. The key word in House

Trails open, fire season starts

Campground maintenance of the Forest Service are making some headway; campgrounds open with water on now include Camp Creek, Tollgate, Riley and McNeil. Green Canyon is open, but as yet does not have water on.

With all the warm weather the snow level is rising and opening up a few more miles of trail. Still Creek and Flag Mountain Trails are now open, along with about 5 or 6 miles of Salmon River Trail. The Ramona Falls Loop will not be open until after May 15. The snow should be about gone by then.

Since the weather is warming and many people will be wanting to do some burning, especially among our recreation residence permittees, we would like to give you a bit of information about burning permits in the area.

Burning permits will be issued with a 3-day limitation. Permittees must check with the Ranger Station to see if it is a burning day. We generally have this information by 8:15 a.m.

We are into fire season. No fires must be allowed to burn unattended. Fires may not burn deep but they will travel through light fuels and could spot against the structures in the area. We have had 4 such fires in the last 2 weeks.

Yard cleanup and burning should be accomplished before the early summer months bring dry weather and send the fire danger soaring.
