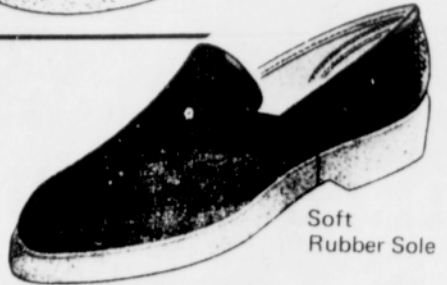


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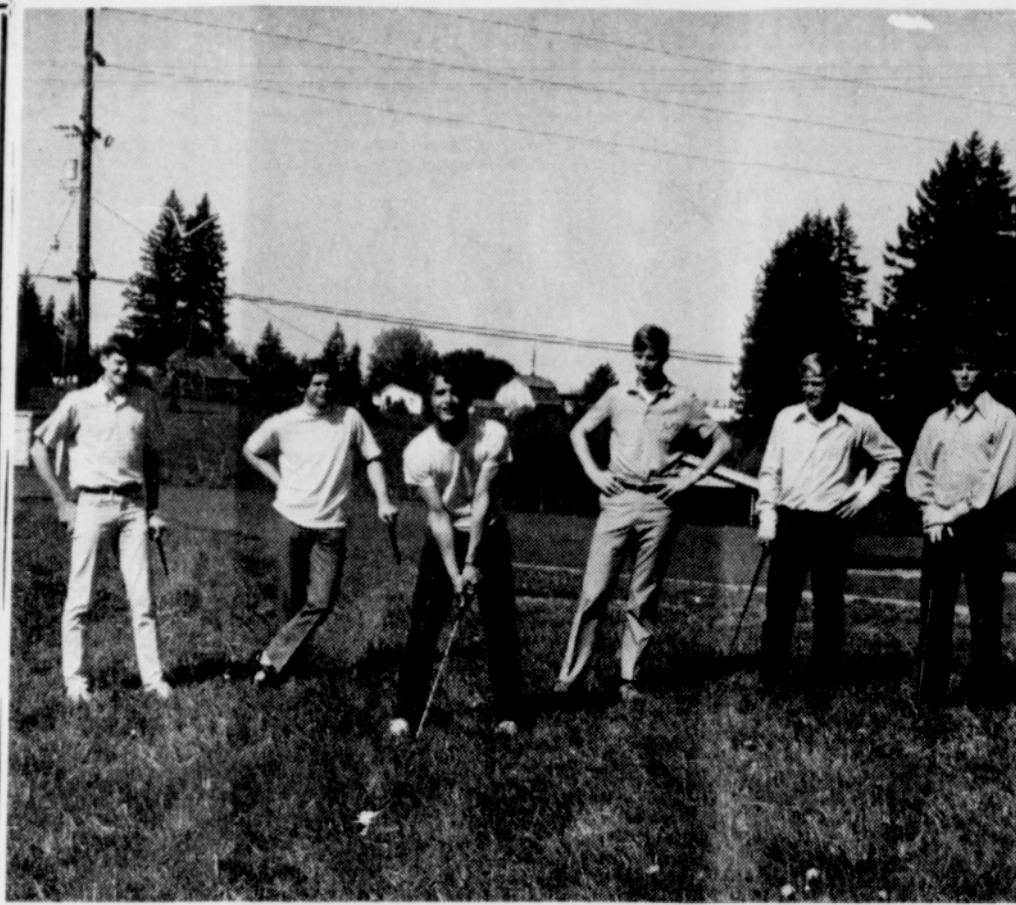

Runners from Sandy, Welches gain first places in meet

Sandy and Welches grade schools competed recently with Estacada in a three-way track meet. Both boys and girls competed in the meet.

Lone winner for Welches in the A team competition was Doug Dougherty in the 50 yard dash.

In the B team competition Sandy winners were: Steve Blakeley in the 70 yard hurdles; Randy Keller in the 400 yard run; and Dennis Dechenne in the pole vault.

Welches had winners in the B team action in Mark Covey in the 75 yard dash; and Ken Williams in the standing broad jump.

The Sandy runners swept the first three places in the 70 yard hurdles in the C team competition with Clayton Wright leading the way. Other Sandy winners were Ron Lamm in the 100 yard dash, Clayton Wright in the 440 yard dash, Carl Neuenfeldt in the 880 yard run; Mike Simon in the discus; Ron Lamm in the long jump; Clayton Wright in the shot put.

Livestock auction is planned

The Clackamas County Stockmen's Association will join forces with the North Clackamas Kiwanis Clubs in sponsoring the 1971 Junior Livestock Auction at the Clackamas County Fair on August 14.

The 4-H and F.F.A. auction advisory committee met with the representatives of the Clackamas County Stockmen's Association and the North Clackamas County Kiwanis Clubs Wednesday evening and accepted their joint sponsorship offer.

It was decided at the meeting that this new enlarged group will be responsible for publicity, promotion and the actual selling of the animals. Contacts will be made with all business men of the area to promote the value of the 4-H program to the community and the part that they can play by participating in the auction.

This is the third annual Junior Livestock Auction held at the Clackamas County Fair. The first two were sponsored by the North Clackamas County Kiwanis Clubs.

4-H leaders and Vocational Agriculture Instructors have indicated that the 1971 auction will be the largest Junior Livestock Auction ever held in Clackamas County with approximately 25 per cent more animals than last year.

Sandy grade baseballers continue winning ways

Mulino was added to the growing list of softball and baseball teams conquered by the Sandy Mountaineers this spring.

The girls with another avalanche of runs won 27 to 10, while the boys, behind the six hit pitching of Dubbie Hayes, won 7 to 5.

Fred Carlson and Frank Dobson provided the offensive fireworks that more than offset a potent Mulino attack that was threatening until the final putout.

Carlson drove in three runs with 3 singles, and Dobson had two rbi's as he continued his hot hitting with a pair of singles

and a booming triple. Rick Deason, David Dillard, and Tim Koepke each had a hit to contribute to the Sandy effort.

Next game for the boys is May 13 when they play host to Estacada, and the victory over Mulino also clinched a district playoff berth May 20.

The girls, with Kay Hashagen's thundering triple the big blow, scored four runs in the first inning and went on to score over 20 runs for the fifth consecutive game.

Coach Ponta's nine continued the offensive fireworks in the second inning, scoring five times as Debbie Stigall, Billie Jean Paluck, Jerri Ellis, and

Vickie Rowell hit singles. 15 big runs came in during the last two innings with Hashagen and Linda Moore hitting doubles, and Barbara Searls, Lynne Wolfe, Cindy Seematter, and Ellis smacking singles.

A defensive highlight was Kay Hashagen's catch of a long drive and throw to Cindy Seematter to double the runner off first.

Billie Jean Paluck and Kay Hashagen shared pitching duties, while Debbie Stigall ably performed the catching chores.

Spring sports near end at Sandy high

The spring sports season at Sandy is nearing an end with sub-district and district meets taking place.

The track team still has a meet to go this Friday at home before they get ready for the district meets.

Runners go into their meet Friday following a 79 to 56 meet win over LaSalle, a 101 to 35 loss to Central and a third place finish at the Canby Invitational.

At LaSalle Sandy winners were led by Weisen who got wins in the high hurdles, long jump, javelin and shotput. Other Sandy winners were Grottett in the mile, Baxter in the 440 yard dash, Peterson in the low hurdles, Holm in the 220 yard dash, Pinkerton in the high jump, and Kerr in the pole vault.

The relay team also posted a victory.

In the loss to Central, coach Ed Hug's charges were short five key persons, Weisen, Kerr, Baxter, Holm, Williams and Lake.

According to Hug, without these men his team did not have much of a chance, especially with Weisen gone. Weisen usually gets 20 points or more for the Pioneers per meet.

Petersen had a good time in the meet of 21.6 in the low hurdles to win at Central and Dan O'Dell won with a good time in the high hurdles.

At the Invitational meet at Canby the team finished third out of six teams.

In this meet the school could only enter one man per event. Sandy won the long jump with a field record of 21 feet 7.8 inches by Weisen and he also won the high hurdles and Petersen won the low hurdles.

Hug took seven men to the meet and all seven placed on the score card.

In baseball the Pioneers are having their problems winning. During the past week they lost to LaSalle 14 to 4, Canby 9 to 5 and they beat Estacada 8 to 7.

Sheriff's reports said the cycle was parked in an open storage shed when the crime occurred.

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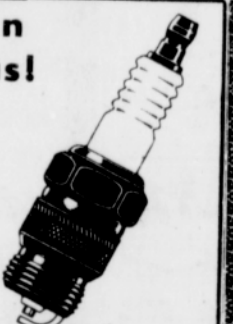
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
