Mt. Hood CC graduates 247

Mt. Hood Community College President Dr. Earl L. Klapstein conferred degrees on a record 247 students in Sunday's commencement exercise at the college.

Mt. Hood's fourth annual commencement saw 82 students earn transfer degrees, 113 students gaining vocational-technical degrees and 52 students receiving vocational-technical certificates.

The 247 graduates, 70 more than in 1970, earned degrees and certificates in 44 different college transfer programs and

45 different vocational-technical programs.

Dr. Dwight C. Baird, past president of the American Association of Junior Colleges, delivered the commencement address. Dr. Baird is presently a professor of Community College Education at Oregon State University. He served as president of Clark College in Vancouver, Washington, for 12 years.

Mt. Hood's first commencement exercise in December of 1966 saw the college graduate eight students.

Father Bozarth celebrates 20th year as clergyman

Canon Rene Bozarth, Vicar of St. Jude's Collegiate Chapel and Rector of The Society of St. Paul, celebrates his 20th anniversary as an Episcopal clergyman this year.

Father Bozarth, is general administrator of St. Jude's Home in Sandy and is editor of the "Mountain Magazine." He was honored at a special parish picnic June 13 at the I.S. Hartman residence where an outdoor communion service was celebrated preceding the festivities.

Following a successful career in radio (he was once program director of Radio Station KWJJ) and journalism (he has written for over half a dozen tri-county area news publications), Father Bozarth entered the Episcopal ministry in 1951.

Ordained to the Diaconate and priesthood of the Episcopal Church by the late Bishop, The Right Reverend Benjamin Dagwell, Father Bozarth was responsible for the founding of St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Gresham.

In 1958 he with the assistance of several area laymen, founded The Society of St. Paul, the only religious order of the Episcopal Church in the Pacific Northwest, and opened St. Jude's Home, then located in Gresham, next to the parish church.

The present St. Jude's Home was purchased by The Society of St. Paul in 1962. The 63 bed facility began serving the area residents and people of the metropolitan community in February of 1963.

The nursing home has provided, since its beginning, a payroll for a staff of approximately 30 full and part time persons. It also contributed to the economy of the area through the purchase of goods and services since its beginning. It is hoped by the Home's operators that the nursing care center will grow with the Sandy area.

In addition to his duties as Vicar of the Episcopal Church mission congregation and administrator of the nursing home, Father Bozarth is active in national and international

church programs. He has been, since 1961, a Canon of the Cathedral of St. George in Windhoek, Southwest Africa, and has developed one of the largest missionary supply programs in the Episcopal Church for Anglican hospitals in Africa, the Middle East, and the Philippines. The Society regularly receives medical supplies and church goods which are forwarded on to needy hospitals under Anglican auspices serving persons of all faiths and denominations.

In 1969 when The Society of St. Paul consolidated its programs, its printing department was moved to Sandy and is now located at 204 Proctor. In addition to publishing "The Mountain

Magazine" monthly, St. Paul's Press also prints a quarterly magazine which circulates over 12,000 copies nationally, and has recently taken over printing for the National Guild of Churchmen of the Episcopal Church. The press will publish several books this year, including the biography of Lige Coalman, popular mountain man of the area, and a Sandy centennial history book.

In 1963 during the building of the Sandy nursing home, Father Bozarth suffered a serious respiratory ailment which has plagued him since. Although often ill due to recurring virus infections which settle in his respiratory tract, Father Bozarth is still active in the community.

Fredrik Anderson

Fredrik Anderson, 85, Rt. 4 Box 1760, Boring, died at a Portland hospital June 13.

Anderson was born in Vasa, Finland and came to the United States with his parents when he was eight years old. He attended school in South Dakota and graduated from the school of mines in Rapid City, S.D.

In 1910 he moved to Oregon and made his home in Boring. He married Nettie H. Bohna Aug. 30 in Portland. After their marriage they returned to South Dakota. He worked as an engineer in the gold mines from 1915 to 1918 when he returned to Portland and worked in the Columbia shipyards during World War I. In 1921 they moved to their Boring home where they had lived since.

Later Anderson was employed as an engineer for the Bull Run Dam project and for building Bonneville Dam. From 1942 until his retirement in 1951, Anderson was with the Army Engineers in the Pittcock Block in Portland. He retired as an associate engineer.

Anderson served for many years as a director of the Union Grade School, District 26. He was also active in the Boring Grange and the Knights of Phthias.

Surviving members include his wife, and two daughters, Mrs. R. (Nettie) Fields and Mrs. D. (Ruth) Adams, Portland. There is one grandchild. Funeral services will be held Thursday, June 17, at 2 p.m. in the Chapel of Carroll Funeral Home, Inc., Gresham. Larry Foster of the Church of Christ, Portland, will officiate.

Private vault interment will follow in the Damascus Pioneer Cemetery.
