Education Needs Your Vote

We support the Sandy high school levy which is being voted on today. Yet the feeling we get from the community is that the levy will fail.

We have three major reasons for asking the voters to approve the levy.

1. There is no substitute for good education for our children. To get this education the district must have funds made available each year to improve the quality of education. The current budget has been cut to a point that if it is cut any more we seriously feel it will hurt the educational programs at the high school.

2. We feel that the budget committee which made up this budget has taken the two defeats by voters into consideration and reduced the budget and along with it the amount of taxes to be levied.

3. The budget has the approval of the school board which is the elected body representing the voters in the district.

The major reason we hear from

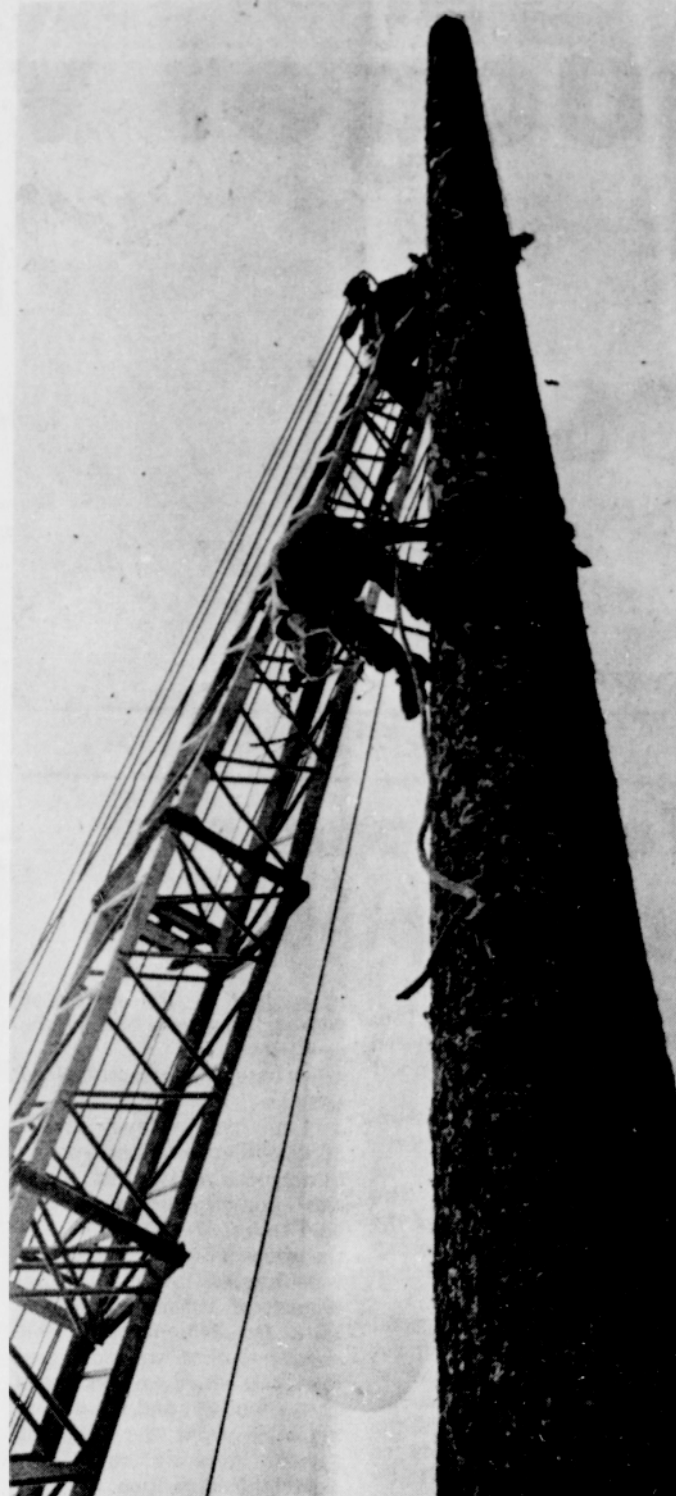
the community for voting against the levy is that they feel the administration is not doing its job.

If so, why are the only members of the community who appear at board meetings usually only the board members themselves and school personnel.

We do not say that the school administration does not need to be improved. What we say is that the best way to improve the administration is by attending school board meetings, talking with our school officials and making sure at election time that good candidates run for the school board.

If the school budget is defeated this time the quality of education will suffer terribly. Let's pass this levy to assure school for next year and at the same time begin to work together to make the adjustments and improvements that are needed in the district.

To The Editor:

The action of Clackamas County Planning Commission denying Strebin Enterprises latest request for a rock crusher site at the mouth of Zig Zag River is commendable. This indicates an understanding and appreciation of the situation in our mountain area, as well as the urgent need to control the activities of certain individuals whose motive has no relation to the present needs or future benefit of the Hoodland Corridor.

In view of this it is difficult to understand why, after two denials, Mr. Salazar was granted permission to build a restaurant on Hwy. 26 between Zig Zag and Rhododendron. The same objections which caused denial of the first two requests certainly must still hold true. I have talked to many people in this vicinity and have yet to find one who is not strongly opposed to this move. The objections are obvious, including sewage disposal, lack of direct access to Hwy. 26 and creation of a very hazardous traffic condition on a stretch of highway that is especially treacherous during winter months.

In addition, was any weight given to the fact that this business with its liquor outlet will be located almost adjacent to the Girl Scout Camp to be established on the old Creighton Homestead? Is anyone so naive to think that Mr. Salazar would risk a venture of this nature without strong assurance of a liquor license, if not at the start, in the near future? In my estimation this fact alone should be enough grounds for denial of this permit.

But the question that "bugs" me and other people in this area is this: The long awaited, much discussed "comprehensive plan" study is apparently now assured and soon to get under way. What is the purpose of this plan is not in part, to designate where commercial establishments shall be located? Then why this sudden O.K. to grant the permit to establish this business on the open highway? The people in this mountain area do not wish to see our scenic highway become a conglomerated "strip" such as we see on the coast and many other localities.

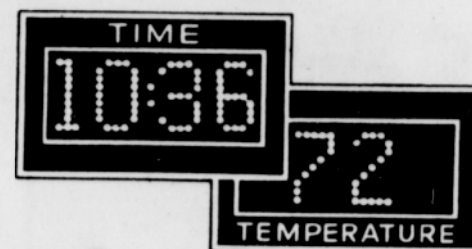
For my part I strongly protest the granting of the permit to Mr. Salazar, and I urge you to reverse your decision on this matter out of consideration to the ecology of

the Hoodland Corridor and the people concerned.
