Sandy grange hears county agent

Sandy Grange 392 met in regular session Saturday, July 10, at 8 p.m., following a potluck dinner at 6:30 p.m.

Master David Ludi opened the meeting. Reports were given by agriculture chairman, Anton Malar, and legislative chairman, Victor Bodley. Mr. Bodley discussed recent legislative action and, in particular, the recently vetoed farm bill.

Women's activity chairman, Edna Amstad, reminded members to turn in MJB coffee seals, Flavor-Pac labels and all types of glass (with the exception of pyrex or window glass). She suggested that glass contributions be brought to the August meeting.

In the absence of the education chairman, master David Ludi read excerpts from a report on education given at the recent state Grange convention at Roseburg. He reminded members to vote on the SUHS budget.

Special guest speaker for the evening was a County Extension Agent from Oregon City who spoke on farm safety. He advised that two people, at

least, die from tractor accidents in Clackamas County each year, and read an account of a recent incident in Estacada.

Since tractor accidents are primarily due to the vehicle turning over, he suggested farm tractors be equipped with roll bars, safety belts, and reinforced cabs. He advised of equipment available for older model tractors.

His speech also covered pesticides, their varieties and uses. He reminded members of the danger of having pesticides within a child's reach. He felt that when pesticides weren't effective, it was likely that they were misused or misapplied.

Problems confronting local farmers were then discussed. The Extension Agent reminded members of the county fair, and stated booklets on tips for exhibiting at the fair were available from the County Extension Office in Oregon City.

Grange master David Ludi then reported on the activities at the recent state Grange meeting in Roseburg, and advised of resolutions proposed by the youth committee of which he was a member. Thereafter John Ludi reported on general resolutions proposed at state Grange and other Grange matters. Five members from the Sandy Grange attended state Grange this year.

The next regular meeting of the Sandy Grange will be on Saturday, August 14, at 8 p.m. Members are invited to join in the potluck dinner at 6:30 prior to the meeting. The program will be provided by the Women's Activities Committee.

Surprise Meatballs

Mix the following and shape into 16 patties:

1 1/2 lbs. ground beef
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/4 cup cream

Dressing:
2 cups bread crumbs
1 small onion

1 Tablespoon parsley
3 Tablespoons salad oil
Mix well.

1/4 teaspoon salt
Dash of pepper
1 teaspoon poultry seasoning
1/4 cup water

Put 8 of the beef patties on board. Put dressing on top of each to near edge. Then put other eight patties on top of dressing. Shape into balls.

Brown. Put into covered casserole with 1 can cream of mushroom soup diluted with 1/2 can water. Bake at 350 for 1 hour.

1 can lima beans, drained
1 can kidney beans, drained
1 can white navy beans, drained

3 onions, chopped fine
1 clove garlic
3 Tablespoons bacon fat
1/2 cup catsup

3 Tablespoons brown sugar
3 Tablespoons vinegar
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon dry mustard
1/4 teaspoon black pepper

Combine all ingredients in pan, mix well. Cover and place on barbeque for about 1 hour.

Date-Nut Rocks

Preheat oven to 350 F.

Combine in bowl, 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar, 3/4 cup softened butter; beat till creamy. Beat in 2 eggs, one at a time. Stir in 1 Tablespoon milk.

Sift together and gradually blend in, 2 cups sifted flour, 1/2 teaspoon baking soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg. Add one 8-oz. pkg. dates, coarsely chopped (1 1/4 cups), 1 cup chopped nuts, one 6-oz. pkg. (1 cup) semi-sweet chocolate morsels; mix well.

Drop by slightly rounded tablespoons, about 2" apart onto ungreased cookie sheets. Bake at 350 for about 15

minutes. Remove from cookie sheets immediately. Cool. Makes about 3 1/2 dozen 2 1/2" cookies.

Creme de Menthe Pie

Crumb Crust:
1 1/4 cups graham cracker crumbs
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup softened butter or margarine

Combine all ingredients. Press mixture over bottom and sides of 9" pie plate. Bake at 325 for 10 minutes. Cool.

Filling:
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
1/2 cup sugar, divided
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 eggs, separated
1/2 cup cold water
1/4 cup green creme de menthe
1/4 cup white creme de cacao
1 cup heavy cream

Whipped cream for garnish
chopped pistachio nuts
Chopped cherries

Combine gelatin, 1/4 cup sugar and salt in medium saucepan. Beat egg yolks and water together; stir into gelatin mixture. Place over low heat stirring constantly until gelatin dissolves and mixture thickens slightly, 3-to 5 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in creme de menthe and creme de cacao. Chill, stirring occasionally until mixture is consistency of unbeaten egg white. Beat egg whites until stiff, but not dry. Gradually add remaining 1/4 cup sugar; beat until very stiff.

Fold into gelatin mixture. Whip cream, fold in. Turn into crumb crust. Chill until firm. Garnish with wreath of whipped cream, sprinkle with pistachio nuts and cherries.

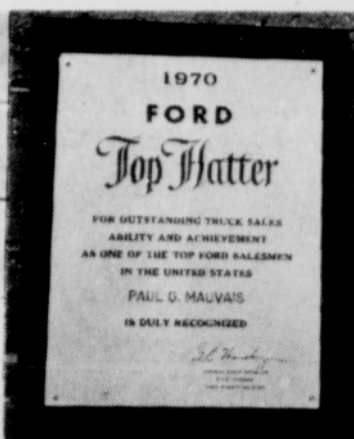

Tax reductions granted by county board

Reductions in taxes were granted to 205 petitioners by the Clackamas County Board of Equalization this past year.

Figures released by the board showed that 661 individual petitions were received and reviewed by the board during the time of May 10 to June 29.

According to County Commissioner Tom Telford, chairman of the Equalization Board, the amount of money reduced in the 205 cases totaled \$1,173,930.

The largest single reduction in the county was \$805,160 to Oregon Portland Cement Company. Telford stated that this reduction was actually done by the state.

The summary shows that the largest single number of reductions were made in the \$1,000 to \$2,000 category where 69 reductions were made.

Other reductions made were: 46 in the \$250 to \$1,000 category; 32 in the \$2,000 to \$3,000; 11 in the \$3,000 to \$4,000; 12 in the

\$4,000 to \$5,000; 15 in the \$5,000 to \$10,000; 7 in the \$10,000 to \$20,000; 8 in the \$20,000 to \$30,000; and one each of \$35,000; \$65,000; \$68,000; \$76,000;
