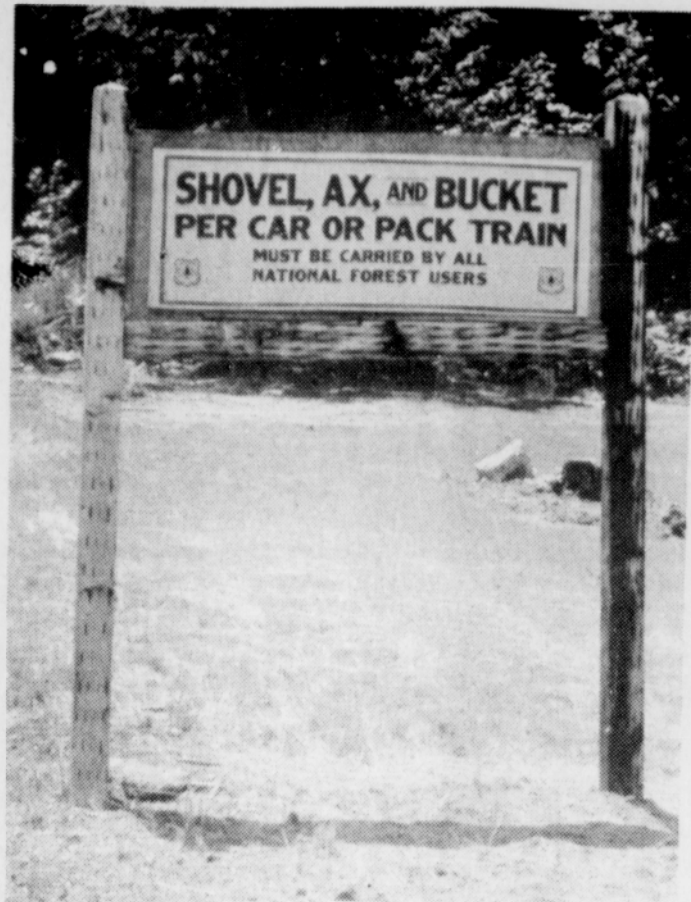




WITH THE WARM weather finally arriving in the Sandy-Hoodland area the familiar forestry signs have started to appear again.

County fair opens at Canby August 10

The Clackamas County Fair will open for its 65th annual run at the county fairgrounds in Canby Tuesday, August 10. It will continue through Saturday, August 14, according to fair manager Don Schmeiser.

This year's theme is "Our International Friends" with emphasis directed toward the ever-expanding world market for Clackamas County's agricultural output. "Back near the turn of the century when our County Fair was in its infancy, the farmers of the region were concerned mainly with drying their produce to Portland retail and wholesale outlets," says Robert H. Beatie, president of the Clackamas County Fair Board.

"Now," he adds, "we ship to all the markets of the world and look to growing export for a more stable farm economy." The International theme, Beatie says, is designed to stress the area's gradual evolution from a provincial to a cosmopolitan point of view.

The free rodeo will once again be a Clackamas County Fair highlight, with performances every evening, Tuesday through Saturday. This fast-moving rodeo, which annually attracts some 300 hard-riding participants, is a Pacific Northwest favorite and late-comers frequently find the grandstand filled to capacity. "If you want to see the rodeo, come early!" is the advice of Bob McKay of Eagle Creek, rodeo superintendent.

This year's rodeo, McKay says, will be getting its stock (some 50 horses, 20 bulls, 20 cows, and 20 calves) from a new outfit — the "Flying 5" of Davenport, Wash. Howard Johnson of Condon, who has supplied the Clackamas County Fair with its stock for the past 14 years, has retired from the business.

CITIZENS COLLEGE FORUM

News and Views About
Mt. Hood Community College

A few weeks ago we talked about citizen advisory committees and their role in the development of Mt. Hood Community College. A citizen advisory committee researched and recommended to President Klapstein and the Board of Education that a program in cosmetology be offered at MHCC. The Board acted upon the recommendation and the program has been approved by the State Board of Education.

MHCC will offer a two-year program in cosmetology this fall term. The curriculum is designed to provide students interested in a career in cosmetology with the opportunity to earn an associate of arts degree and to meet basic licensing requirements.

A maximum enrollment of 24 students is planned for the 1971 initial class. The deadline for registration is Sept. 15.

Along with receiving an AA degree, students will gain the specific skills needed in the industry, gain the education needed for licensing and learn tips on marketing their service, as well as receiving training in general business skills.

The cosmetology curriculum at MHCC is intended to prepare students for unlimited opportunities in all phases of beauty culture. Upon the completion of a minimum 2,500 clock hour course, required by Oregon Law, a student may take the examination leading to beautician status in the State.

The MHCC cosmetology program will consist of 2,526 actual class hours, which includes 36 college credit hours in general education and business courses. To be eligible for licensing as a cosmetologist and to receive an AA degree, students must attend class approximately six hours a day for two MHCC academic years and one summer session.

It is the philosophy at MHCC to provide meaningful vocational-technical programs for our students that will benefit them and our community. We hope cosmetology will be another MHCC program that will prove to be a good contribution to business and industry in our area.
