High lake fishing good

The high lakes are opening up with some fine reports. A few trails still have some pretty deep snowbanks on north slopes but generally packed enough to hike over. Some lakes at higher elevations are still tough to get to and a few access roads to trail heads remain blocked.

However, high lake fishing is for those anglers who like to rough it a bit. You will find trout fishing by almost any method very productive. There is one item in your pack that you don't want to forget—mosquito repellent. These nuisance insects seem to hatch right out of the snowbanks and the high mountain meadows will be swarming with them.

With the two to three weeks delay in the break-up this year, those high mountain lake trout will be that much hungrier. Flies, lures, and baits should produce.

Fast-moving entertainment scheduled at county fair

Talent from throughout the tri-county area will provide a continuous variety of fast-moving entertainment for those attending the Clackamas County Fair at the Canby fairgrounds Tuesday through Saturday, August 10-14, reports Audri Cotton, program director.

Stressing the theme of this year's fair, "Your International Friends" will be a repeat performance by the popular International Dancers who are billed for Friday evening at 8 p.m. Also scheduled is a group of old-time dancers from Portland, as well as 4-H square-dance teams from the Clackamas County area.

Fair-goers, too, will have an opportunity to watch petite Toni Davidson, one of the state's outstanding acrobatic dancers, perform on the open-air stage. Toni placed first in the state beam and vaulting competition at the Junior Olympics in June and recently won the outstanding achievement award in gymnastics from the prestigious Mr. Reznos of Chicago.

A throaty folk-singer from Clackamas, Linda Wiles who has won wide-spread attention from professionals while performing as soloist for the Clackamas High School Choir, is also billed for the open-air stage. Several dance studios from various parts of the region will be bringing talent to the fair and entertainment is being tailored to please all age groups, Mrs. Cotton says.

Featured at 4 each afternoon will be the Country Rebels, a five-piece western music band, and their Go-Go "Kissin' Kuzzins", two young ladies who promise to give the whole concept of dance a bouncy new dimension.

A highlight of the five-day

entertainment program will be the appearance of a group of old-time fiddlers Friday and Saturday. They will play on the open-air stage in the afternoons and entertain the rodeo audience prior to the big evening arena event the last two days of the fair.

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
