The talented Peasant Dancers, under the direction of Francis Kies of Portland, have been performing as a group for the past nineteen years. They have entertained five times at

the Portland Rose Festival, regularly at the Mt. Angel Octoberfest, frequently at the summer dance festival in Portland's Washington Park, and at numerous special events throughout the Pacific Northwest. What's Cooking?

At the Pioneer Picnic I had a request to reprint my recipe for pecan pie.

Southern Pecan Pie

1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 cup light or dark corn syrup
1 cup sugar
4 eggs
1 cup pecans
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon salt

Brown butter or margarine lightly for flavor in a sauce pan in which you would like to continue mixing. Remove from burner, add sugar, cool slightly and beat in whole eggs one at a time.

Add syrup and pecan meats, vanilla and salt and mix well. Pour mixture into a large unbaked pie shell (9 or 10 inch). Turn nut meats right side up so they look attractive.

Bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees, about an hour or until crust is brown and custard center leaves a silver knife clean. If baking in a pyrex pie pan, reduce heat to 325 degrees as soon as outer crust begins to get light brown.

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Diseased gladiolus could change color

Gladiolus have a habit of acting like chameleons by changing color.

Puzzled gardeners may find a favorite variety no longer blooms with the same radiance or the color may change altogether depending upon the variety.

The color change takes place before the plant is sick.

Sick gladiolus may change color permanently, while some varieties merely show a spotting or streaking in the florets. The affected area may appear a lighter shade of the basic color or become progressively lighter in color until white or grey.

Total change of color of the florets without visible spots or streaks is not uncommon.

Wilbur W. Burkhardt, explained the color change being due to virus disease infections. Several viruses are thought to be responsible for the permanent color change.

Virus infections are caused by sucking insects feeding on plant leaves and flower spikes.

Once a plant is infected, the corn carries the disease from year to year producing a less vigorous plant and more severe infection until the gladiolus is no longer able to survive.

Control recommendations offered by Burkhardt regular use of spray or dust to prevent insect attacks. If insects are allowed to infest the plants before they are killed, they will

have infected them with the lethal virus.

Once gladiolus have become infected with virus, they must be destroyed to prevent further spread to healthy plants.

Some of the several virus diseases can remain active in the soil on plant residues and re-infect healthy corms planted the next season at the same location.

Gladiolus because of their high degree of susceptibility to many diseases should always be planted in soils that have not grown them for the past two years, Burkhardt added.
