Mt. Hood Community College

A common criticism of higher education at the major university, or four-year institution, is that professors are to often unresponsive and/or unattuned to the needs of the student - that instructors concern themselves primarily with research and-or publication.

This complaint is not often leveled at community college faculty - the belief being that the latter instructors are more concerned with teaching and learning. A smaller student-faculty ratio and a greater general responsiveness to students is often cited as the rationale for this dedication. Whether or not this is actually the case, some focus on "responsiveness" is presented in a recent doctoral dissertation by Jennis Joseph (Jay) Bapst, Dean of Extension Services at Mt. Hood.

In pursuing his Ph.D. in Higher Education at the University of Washington, Bapst wrote his dissertation on "The Effect of Systematic Student Response Upon Teaching Behavior." In short, Bapst considered the contention that the reception of feedback from students, by an instructor, would result in a significant improvement in the instructor's classroom behavior. Secondly, it was suggested that this positive change in teaching behavior would result in greater student learning in the particular class(es) in which there had been instituted a student rating system.

Bapst conducted his experiments by initiating a student response system among students taking astronomy at MHCC. Four regular full-time instructors used the system. In general, students were asked to indicate continually how well they felt they were understanding the material being presented.

The results of the investigation indicated that the effect of the systematic student response varied among different instructors; therefore generalizations should be made

with caution. Within this limitation, the results supported the hypothesis that certain instructors improved their classroom teaching, as perceived by their students, when these instructors received in-class feedback through a student response system. There were indications that this improvement in student learning was greater for those instructors whose teaching style, or size of class, did not permit significant verbal in-class feedback from the students.

The hypothesis that student achievement would be higher in classes with the student response system was not supported. The results of Bapst's study would seem to indicate that instructors might well heed the voices of their students.

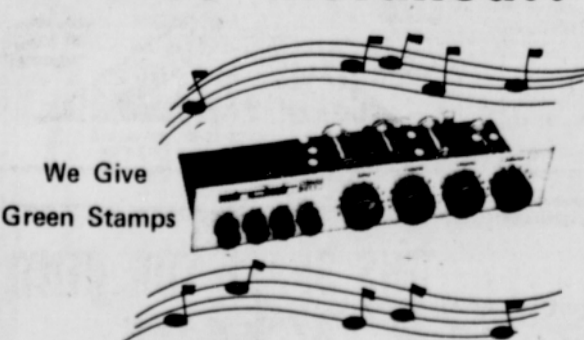
