Oregon State Fair Parade to kick off

This year the Oregon State Fair will have a most unique Opening Day parade, a first for the Fair, according to Robert L. Stevens, manager.

Starting at 9:30 from Barrick Field, at Pearl and 15th streets, a procession of children, under the direction of Salem Parks and Recreation Agency, will march up 17th street to the Fairgrounds and arrive at 10 p.m. for the Opening Day Ceremonies.

They will decorate their own vehicles—bikes, wagons or floats, all self-propelled, with

the traditional crepe paper and streamers or whatever they may fancy.

Mr. Williams' Youth Band and Salem's own Flamingos, just back from competition at Disneyland, will furnish the marching music. The parade will include the Fair's own Beaver and Bear, and bringing up the rear, an authentic restored old-time fire engine ridden by Lil Punkin—the Fair's symbol—and Miss Punkin.

More than 200 children will participate.

They will be admitted free to the grounds, including one parent each and will receive a participant's award ribbon.

The Oregon State Fair will open Aug. 28 and run through Sept. 6, Labor Day.
