Pete was born, bred, and is firmly rooted in New Orleans, birthplace of Jazz, and has rightfully earned the title of "Mr. New Orleans" with his driving, jaunty, bittersweet sound that only he can squeeze from a clarinet.

He calls his music New Orleans Jazz, and continually strives for "that sound of diamonds falling out of a velvet bag." He was the most popular performer on the Lawrence Welk Show for two years, and is a winner of coveted awards from Playboy and Downbeat magazines, including the 1970-71 award.

Pete's appearance at the Fair offers a rare chance to see and hear this gifted genius with a clarinet. The Pete Fountain Revue appears Saturday, Aug. 28, and Sunday, Aug. 29, on the Grandstand stage at 7:30 and at the Armory auditorium at 9:30.

The All Oregon Revue will present top professional Oregon talent, an array of great entertainers, on the Grandstand stage, Friday, Sept. 3, at 8 p.m.

Freddie Henshaw Jr., director of the All Oregon Talent Show will emcee the Revue and open it with the Freddie Henshaw Band.

Among the acts are the Cooper Mountain Boys, Western singer Jimmy Patton, a production number by the Rose City Chapter of Sweet Adelines, comedian banjo-playing Ken Card, a trampoline troupe, the Bounding Olympians, Duval the Magician, Clown Denny Cameron, and a jug band. The Revue is free to fairgoers.

Also free on the Grandstand stage on the last weekend of the Fair, Sept. 4, 5, at 8 p.m. and Sept. 6 at 10:30 a.m. is the Polack Bros.
