What's Cooking?

REUBEN SANDWICH

For 6 sandwiches:
12 slices rye bread
3 Tablespoons prepared mustard

1/4 cup kraut
12 slices corned beef
12 slices Swiss cheese
1/4 cup butter, melted
Spread 6 slices bread with mustard, allowing 1/2 tablespoon for each. Cover each with 2 tablespoons of kraut. Arrange 2 slices corned beef and 2 slices Swiss cheese on each. Top each with a slice of bread. Brush both outer sides of each sandwich with melted butter. Grill until cheese begins to melt.

FOR VARIETY: Substitute mayonnaise for mustard or a combination of mayonnaise and chili sauce. Dairy sour cream, flavored with chili sauce and prepared horseradish is another variation.—From the files of Mrs. Howard W. Berger, Sandy.

QUICK 'N EASY COBBLER

Prepare by using the following ingredients:

Melt one stick of margarine in an average size dish. Add 1 cup of sweet milk to 1 cup of self-rising flour and 1 cup of sugar. Mix these 3 ingredients thoroughly and add to the melted margarine. Add 4 cups of fresh fruit (sweetened to taste). (3/4 cup to 1 cup suggested). Do not stir. Bake at 375 degrees for approximately 40 minutes or until browning is noted. This is excellent served while warm. For extra flavor, top with whipped cream or vanilla ice cream.

NOTE: Canned or frozen fruit may be substituted for fresh. If plain flour is used, add 2 teaspoons of baking powder.—From the files of Miss Ola Newberry, Gadsden, Ala.

RED VELVET CAKE

1/2 Cup Crisco
1 1/2 Cups Sugar
2 1/4 Cups Flour
2 Eggs
1 Cup Buttermilk
1 Tbls. Cocoa
1 Tsp. Salt
1 Tsp. Soda (heaping) (I use good rounded one)

1 Tsp. Vanilla
1 Tbls. Vinegar
3 Bottles (1/2 oz. ea.) red food coloring

Cream crisco and sugar. Add eggs one at a time, continue beating. Add cocoa and coloring. Sift flour and salt together and add flour and buttermilk alternately to mixture and beat until blended real good. Add vanilla. Remove beaters and sprinkle soda and vinegar over batter and fold in gently. Bake in preheated oven 350 degrees - 25 to 30 mins. Makes 2 - 9" layers.

FROSTING

1 Cup Sugar
2 heaping Tbls. Cornstarch
2 sticks butter or oleo
1 cup water
1 tsp vanilla

Cook cornstarch in water over low heat until thick. Set aside to cool. Cream sugar and butter until fluffy. Add cornstarch mixture and beat until like whipped cream. Add vanilla.—From the files of Mrs. Don Gilliland, Chattanooga, Tenn.

The following are recipes for two beautiful, delicious and exotic jellies which can be made from vegetables which are plentiful now.

BEET JELLY

6 large raw beets
4 cups beet juice
1/2 cup lemon juice
Water to cover
1 pkg. powdered pectin
6 cups sugar
Peel raw beets and slice thin. Cover with water and cook until tender. Drain liquid. Mix 4 cups beet juice with lemon juice and pectin. Bring to a good boil. Add 6 cups sugar and bring to full rolling boil. Boil 3 minutes. Pour into jelly glasses and cover with paraffin.—From the files of Mrs. LaVerne Boyles, Cottrell, Ore.

GREEN PEPPER JELLY

6 large green peppers (grind fine)
1 1/2 cup cider vinegar
1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper
6 cups sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 bottle Certo

Throw away juice from ground peppers. Mix first five ingredients in a sauce pan, add Certo, boil until it thickens when dropped from a spoon. Add a few drops of green food coloring. Pour into sterilized jars and seal.—From the files of Mrs. Suzanne McDonald, Sandy.
