Local schools observe national education week

"Help Schools Bridge the Gap" between young people and adults, between Americans of different color and point of view, between rich and poor, and between promise and performance.

In announcing the theme and challenge of this year's American Education Week observance, October 24-30, the Sandy High School teachers urge that we all consider this statement.

In a nation that speaks of inalienable rights, the right to learn must be paramount, yet enormous gaps must be bridged before that right becomes a reality.

In announcing local participation in the observance, the high school teachers call upon the entire community to join in a reassessment of the school's role in light of these gaps.

We must ask ourselves what schools can do to make education more relevant to the present and future lives of students—and further, what full opportunity for quality education requires in the 1970's.

American Education Week, held annually since 1921, is sponsored by the National Education Association, the American Legion, the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, and U.S. Office of Education.

In addition to the traditional emphasis on school visitation by parents, good citizenship, and the need for strengthening and supporting the schools, this year's observance will focus on ways the schools might become more responsive to the needs of students of varied cultural and ethnic backgrounds. But, it is stressed that the focus will also extend to fostering in the individual greater awareness of opportunities to help direct the institutions that serve him.
