Coming Trips to the Polls

Starting early next month, Oregon voters will be making some important trips to the polls.

First off comes the special election on the state's cigarette tax. That's scheduled for Jan. 18. Then follow the various school and special district elections, then the May primary and finally the November general election.

A vote to change the method of computing state income tax in effect, unifying state from federal returns—is slated for the May primary.

The cigarette tax, referred to the voters via a signature campaign, asks

voter approval to increase the per-package tax from 4 to 9c. Somewhere between \$12 and \$15 million annually in state funds is involved.

Depending upon how many Democratic presidential candidates actually appear, Oregon's May primary could have major impact. Little excitement is likely on the Republican side.

The proposal on the income tax, referred to the voters by the recent special legislative session, could further snarl the state's fiscal picture.

The beleaguered voter is going to have a busy year.

Sewing industry seeks new home in Sandy

A new industry which could employ up to 100 persons in the area is thinking about moving to Sandy.

According to Howard Berger of the Sandy Industrial Development Corporation, a fabric sewing company is looking to the Sandy area as one possible site for locating. The company is also looking at several other sites in the Portland area including Gresham and Woodburn.

Norman Dversdal, a former Sandy resident, is the head of the group seeking to find a home for the new industry. He currently is employed at a similar company in Bend and was a former employee of Janzen Knitting Mills.

The company during the next few weeks will be advertising in the classified section of the Post for names of persons who would be interested in working in such a plant. Check the classified for a form to be

mailed to the firm.

According to Berger, the company is planning to locate its fabric sewing industry where the best local employment market is available.

Berger stated that the local development corp. is working with this clean air industry hoping to find it a home in Sandy.

According to Dversdal, the industry is hoping to be in its new home within six months.

I am happy to support improvements in the community

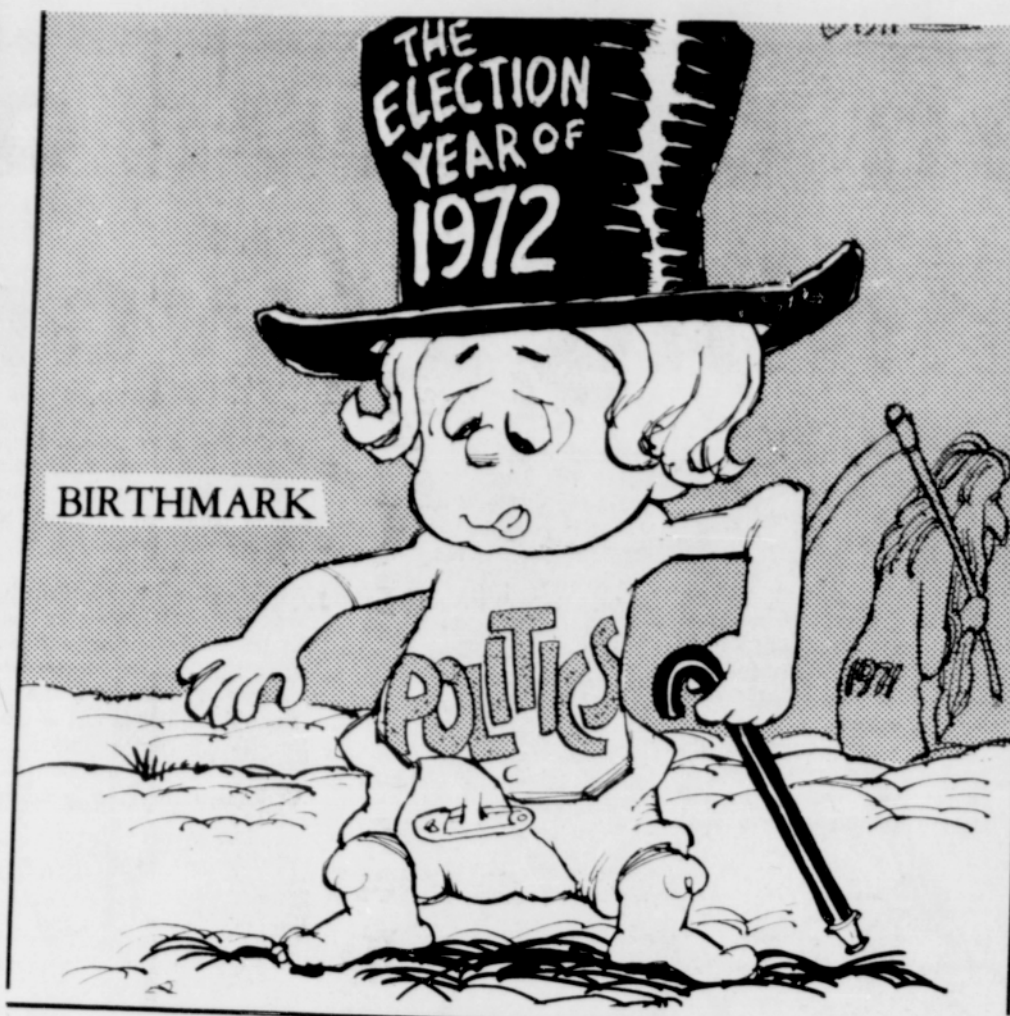
that will benefit the most and that we can afford and good water is one necessity that I can not afford to be without.

Sandy Civil Services again sponsored the annual July 4 fireworks show. This one was the biggest ever and had a record number of persons in attendance. It was estimated that over 5,000 persons viewed the day's activities.

Gardens Dedicated
The Gardens of Enchantment were dedicated at the Oral Hull Foundation Park for the Blind on July 11. The park has become internationally famous with over 35 garden clubs taking part in developing the gardens.

The Sandy Kiwanis held their annual Fly-In Breakfast and it was termed to be the largest ever.

The city received \$135,000 from the federal government towards the construction of the new sewer line and treatment plant.

The county was forced to take over the operation of the Sandy dump site when the firm contracted to run it reported that it was economically unable to continue to run the dump.

Timberline Trailers held their open house on July 25 and hundreds of local residents were guided through the plant. The Sandy Area Chamber of Commerce held a Sidewalk Sales event July 29, 30 and 31.

The city planning commission reported that they were unable to fund a comprehensive plan for the Sandy area during the next year.

The city council continued their work to find long term solution to any future needs in the area of water for the Sandy area.

Levy Defeated

August: Hot weather arrived and local youth took advantage of the weather to crowd local rivers and lakes while the flood plain study of the rivers and streams in the Hoodland area began under the direction of the Soil Conservation Service.

The election procedures for the HPG election were adopted at a Let's Get Together meeting called by the Hoodland Chamber of Commerce.

The special park levy for the county was soundly defeated by a more than 2 to 1 margin.

Meanwhile the city planning

commission announced that the total cost estimate for the planned city park would be \$30,900. This cost would be done in several years and in stages with the first stage to be started next spring.

Marylise Lemmens from Belgium arrived in Sandy to attend school through the foreign exchange program. She is living with the Jim Martin family.

Sandy Grade School District announced plans to hold an election on Oct. 19 for a bond levy for the construction of needed classrooms.

Police Problems
September: The Hoodland area was busy as residents sought answers to the policing problem in the area and a group of citizens in Rhododendron were discussing incorporation into a city.

Forest fires were reported in the Bull Run area, but were brought under control within a day by firefighters.

Schools started in the Sandy-Hoodland area with all schools reporting an increase in enrollment. Sandy Grade School District reported the largest increase with over 100 more students. The total enrollment on registration day for the district was 1,198 students.

The Sandy Post subscription campaign started this month with prizes offered to all the junior salesmen.

October: The top news story of this month was the defeat of the \$863,575 building bond levy proposed by the Sandy Grade School District. The vote was 366 to 355 against the issue in one of the highest voter turnouts ever recorded in the district.

The Kiwanis announced plans for their annual Christmas baskets to help the needy in the community.

November: The economic picture in the area darkened with the announcement that Reynolds Metals in Troutdale would shutdown at the end of the month.

The Sandy Post along with several conservation groups started a campaign to get a 12-mile stretch of the Sandy River protected under the Scenic Rivers Act. Currently the request has gone to the governor with hope that he will have the State Highway Department place it on the list of areas to be studied for possible placement under the Act.

A candidate forum by HPG candidates was set for Nov. 20 with 34 candidates running for election.

The boys high school swim team captured first place in the district meet while the girls' team took second. The team sent 11 swimmers to the state meet. This was the most successful season ever for a Sandy swim team under the direction of Jim Anstine.

The high school football team ended its first year under head coach Forrest Allen and came out with one win and one tie as high points in their season.

The Sandy Grade School dress code came under fire and was revised by the board making a more permissive code.

December: Local school district officials scheduled a meeting to discuss common problems and goals and to discuss the issue of unification. This was the first ever of this type of meeting.

The area got its annual visit from Santa Claus and had many other holiday events take place.

City Gets Grant

The Sheriff's Department received the federal funds to hire 13 persons to the department. This made it possible for the Boring district to be created.

The HPG election was held. The new HPG will hold its first meeting in January of the new year.

The city of Sandy moved to solve its future water problems by filing water rights on streams east of town.

The city learned that it was to receive \$5,000 in federal funding towards the development of a comprehensive plan during the next year.

So as the year 1971 comes to a close, it is ending on a winter storm which has dumped several inches of snow in the area. This is the same way which the year started.

Who knows what the new year holds for the Sandy-Hoodland area? Whatever it is, we know that decisions in the past year will have an influence on 1972 and that decisions to be made in the new year will be important in years to come.

Witness sought

Police are still hunting for the witness to an accident which happened on Sept. 21 on Bradley-Ritchie Rd. near Boring.

Killed in the two car accident was Richard Logan, 24, of Estacada. Also injured in the accident was Mrs. Nancy McSweeney, 27, of Troutdale, a passenger in the second car. Logan was in a car which was disabled when a car driven by Mrs. McSweeney's husband came over a hilltop and collided with the disabled car, according to the police report.

Reportedly a witness told sheriff deputies at the scene of the accident that he had phoned in the report of the accident, but then left before police could question him.
