

Sandy students set recycling program

The Sandy area will get a recycling program within the next two weeks. The program is sponsored by the Sandy High students to help improve the local environment.

For those of you who have read about the other communities and their environment programs, here is your chance to help make Sandy's successful, said Joyce Boston spokesman for the students.

During the fall, Gary Berger, Dan Plumbadore and instructor Charles Frazier planned, designed and constructed three wooden bins. They were designed to hold recyclable materials. One will store newspapers, one brown glass and the other will be separated into two departments for storing clear glass and green glass, according to Miss Boston.

Some of the problems other communities have had with their programs have caused a lot of extra work and expense. Listed below are instructions that will help the program in Sandy avoid some of these problems:

1. The newspapers should be bundled

and tied with string.

2. No magazines are allowed. (We are uncertain whether notebook paper, stationary and other various household papers are acceptable. We will in a future publication let you know.)

3. The glass must be separated according to color. The students would appreciate it if you would do this before you came to the school.

4. All metal has to be removed from bottles, jars, etc. If there are metal rings, lids, or pop bottle caps remove them as you use them.

It is hoped through this program that the student government of Sandy High School will earn money to fund other projects and that the environment of the area will be made cleaner, according to Miss Boston.

The bins are scheduled to be installed within the next two weeks on the high school grounds. A suitable location has not been set yet, but will be by next week.

The students urge local residents to use the recycling program when it starts in two weeks.

High school salary talks continuing

Salary talks between the Sandy High School District school board and the district teachers are now at the fact finding stage.

Recently a state appointed mediator Ronald Thaheld, met with representatives of both groups at Sandy and listed five areas of disagreement as: (1.) binding arbitration in the grievance procedure; (2.) teacher's salary schedule; (3.) amount and method of computing administrator's salary; (4.) amount and

method of computing pay for extra duty and (5.) type of items to be included in written agreement.

Clyde Deal will be the fact finder for the local high school district. He is responsible for writing a recommendation for a reasonable basis for a settlement of the disagreement and submitting it to both the school board and the teachers after investigating the situation in the district. This must be done by Jan. 14.

Informational drug programs set

A three part drug information program has been set for the Sandy area during the month of January.

The program sponsored by the Sandy-Hoodland Jaycees and the Sandy Grade School PTA will be held on Jan. 11, 18 and 25. The programs will begin at 7 p.m. and last about one hour. They will be held in the old gym at Sandy Grade School.

According to spokesmen for both groups the idea behind these programs will be to inform parents and youngsters in the area on the problems with drugs.

The three part program has been developed to discuss the drug problem, talk about the medical effects and to hold an open forum for the public to ask questions concerning drugs.

In the first program next Tuesday, a representative from the Clackamas County Sheriff's department will present a program. This program and a film to be shown along with it will place special emphasis on marijuana.

A short discussion period open to the public will be held at the end of this program and it is hoped by the Jaycees and the PTA that a large turnout of interested persons will be on hand to take part.

The second program set for Jan. 18 will feature a discussion of the medical problems associated with drugs. Guest speakers are planned who are authorities in this area.

According to Dan Christensen, Jaycee chairman of the programs, it is hoped that a former drug addict will be available for one of the programs to talk with persons attending the meeting.

The third program in the series will be directed towards the open forum style with a panel available to answer questions from the public.

"These programs are free and meant to be informational for those attending," stated Christensen.

First increase in 22 years

Council adopts sewer ordinance

Starting Feb. 1 the city of Sandy will start charging a new sewer fee monthly charge. This action was taken by the Sandy city council Monday night.

The council approved the new sewer ordinance which provides for connection fees and service charges for the use of the city sewer system.

The new fee schedule marks the first increase in charges in 22 years, according to city officials.

United Contractors were approved.

In other business, the council discussed the setting up of a meeting with State Highway officials and the Sandy Chamber of Commerce to discuss the future completion of Proctor Ave.

The council is currently trying to set up such a meeting either on Jan. 10 or Jan. 17 at the city hall.

Councilman Ed Perren, head of the roads committee, stated that he had talked with the Chamber officials and that they were in agreement with the city in asking that the state place the Proctor Ave.

The following is from the new ordinance giving the new fee scheduling per month.

Section 4. Rates.

A. Type of Connection	Monthly Service Charge

Trailer Parks	\$3.00 per unit
Apartment Houses	\$1.50 per bed

Churches	\$3.00 per unit
Service or Community Clubs	\$3.00 per unit
Restaurants and Taverns 10 seats per unit	\$4.50 per unit
Service Stations and Garages	\$1.00 per machine
Self Service Laundry	\$5.00 per machine
Laundries Dry Cleaners	\$25.00
12 hour shift	
All other businesses or commercial (except Drive-Ins)	\$4.00 per unit
Drive-Ins	\$4.00 per unit plus \$10.00 for garbage disposal

Elementary and High Schools: 25 persons per unit on 12 month basis \$3.00 per unit.

For all of all of the above categories being served by the sewer system of the City of Sandy which are located outside the City limits, the sewer charge shall be double the rates above listed.

B. Industry. Commercial or industrial establishments, that discharge process wastes to

the sewerage system shall be charged for the discharge of said process wastes at rates established by special agreement between the City and Industry.

C. The City Council shall have the right to enlarge or amend the number and classifications set forth above, provided that no occupant shall be billed for less than one unit and that unit charges shall be uniform within a class.

In general, the new fee schedule calls for a \$1 increase on household and business users and a unit charge according to capacity for restaurants and schools. Before the new ordinance, restaurants and schools were charged a flat fee.

According to city recorder Ruth Loundree, the new fee scheduling will bring added revenues to the city which is currently expanding its sewer system and building a new treatment plant. She was unable to give an estimate of the amount of added funds at the meeting.

The new fee scheduling calls for \$3 to be charged per family unit including both homes, motels and trailer courts per month. Before the increase the fee was \$2.

In other action by the council Monday night, it was approved to hire Tom Day to fill the vacancy on the city crew. Day is a local resident and was selected from several persons who applied for the job. He was hired with a salary of \$540 a month on a six month probation period.

In hiring Day, the council said that at a later date they will determine if another employee would be hired or whether one of the present city employees will be trained to run the new sewer treatment plant being built by the city.

The new sewer system is expected to be in operation by next fall, according to city officials. At the meeting the contracts for the treatment plant construction with

completion on its 1973 work budget.

It was reported that more investigation of the correct route of S. Bluff Rd. was needed.

The city is also seeking storage space for the city's holiday decorations. Several councilmen stated that they felt the present lighting of the decorations made them too hard to read and that something be done to improve them for next year.

The council is preparing to enter its budget talks for the next year and several freeholders are yet to be appointed. Each councilman appoints a freeholder from the city to help in determining the final budget to be approved before it goes to the voters this spring.

In looking at the new city sewer ordinance, city engineer advisor Martin Boatwright stated that he felt the ordinance was good and it gave the city enough power to deal with problems when they happen.

According to Sandy police chief Fred Punzel, the accident happened in the east bound lane. He said that no citations had been issued and that the investigation into the cause of the accident was still being conducted.

Injured were Lori Nicolopoulos, 28, Boring; Kathy Jones, 29, Boring; Richard Browne, 24, Boring; and Lonnie Scott, 24, of Sandy.

Scott was alone in his car when the accident happened, while Miss Nicolopoulos was driving the other car and

Miss Jones and Browne were passengers in the car she was driving, according to the police report.

Scott and Miss Nicolopoulos were taken to Gresham Community Hospital and Miss Jones and Browne were taken to Woodland Park Hospital.

Police chief Punzel said that it has been determined that the car driven by Miss Nicolopoulos was headed east and the car driven by Scott was headed west.

Police have been hampered in their investigation of the accident due to the serious condition of the victims. Chief Punzel stated that as of Wednesday only one of the victims has been able to talk with the police about the accident.

Local girl awaits new kidney

Brother gives transplant

Judy Hellman of Sandy will receive a new kidney soon. The donor of the kidney is her brother Forrest.

Judy has been hospitalized since August and had her kidneys removed after Thanksgiving. Since then she has been living through the aid of one of the artificial kidney machines and is one of 24 patients in the state currently on the machines.

According to her mother May Hellman, Judy will be able to return home in about two months following the transplant operation if everything goes well. Doctors are waiting for her to get over a fever

before going ahead with the transplant operation.

Judy entered the University of Oregon Hospital in August just before she was to start her senior year at Sandy High School. She is the third child in the Hellman family to suffer from the kidney disease known as nephritis.

The family has had one son and one daughter die from the disease, according to Mrs. Hellman.

She stated that her other children died because the kidney machines were not in use when they were stricken by the disease.

Judy, 18, is looking forward to returning to the family home at Rt. 3 Box 70 in Sandy and getting back to school, according to her mother.

"She really misses not being at home, but due to some problems in her ability to be connected to the kidney machine the doctors have not let her come home," said Mrs. Hellman.

Mrs. Hellman currently goes to see her daughter every morning and also is looking forward to having Judy come home.

Forrest, 28, who will donate one of his kidneys to his younger sister works for a lumber company in Estacada.

He is expected to be in the hospital about two weeks following the operation and will be off work for about two months it is expected.

Mrs. Hellman stated that her daughter will use about 12 units of blood while she is

in the hospital. Persons who wish to donate blood to Judy can do so through the Red Cross.

Currently the annual statewide fundraising drive for the Kidney Association of Oregon is starting its third year. It is through this Assn. that Judy has been able to use the kidney machine which is keeping her alive until she can receive the transplant.

The theme of this year's drive is "Your

Gift Means Life." Donations can be made to the Assn. at P.O. Box 14 in Oregon City.

Presently there are 23 other patients besides Judy on the kidney machines throughout the state with a least one new patient each month being added to the list.

Chuck Foster, Executive Director of the Kidney Association, declared that, "Most people faced with death because of kidney failure, cannot afford the extremely high costs of kidney machines, training, treatment on the machine in their homes and the cost of necessary medical supplies."

Foster pointed out that the cost of training, equipment and home supplies for each new KAO patient is about \$10,000. After this period, the cost per day of maintaining the life of each patient on an artificial kidney machine is \$12 or an average of approximately \$4,000 per year.

The function of the Kidney Association of Oregon is to raise funds in order that patients may continue treatment, which will allow them to work, raise families and be useful people.

Foster emphasized that, "We have the medical know-how to save the lives of kidney failure victims and to rehabilitate them. There is no shortage of artificial kidney machines. The only shortage we have," he said, "is money!"

When Judy Hellman receives her transplant from her brother, she then will be able to live without the aid of the kidney machine. Something she is looking forward to.
