What's Cooking?

EL GRANDO

1 1/2 lbs ground chuck
1 pkg. chili mix
1 can tomatoes
2 small pkgs. yellow rice
Chopped onions
Chopped olives
Chopped tomatoes
Shredded lettuce
Chopped pecans
Brown meat; add chili mix and tomatoes and simmer. Cook rice according to directions. Make layer of well-cooked rice and layer of meat sauce.

Serve the following in small bowls: Onions, olives, tomatoes, shredded lettuce and chopped pecans.

Top meat and rice mixture with onions, olives, tomatoes, shredded lettuce and chopped pecans, then top with the following sauce.

SAUCE: 1 can of cheddar cheese soup, 1-3 cup milk. Combine ingredients. Mix well and heat but do not boil.

CRUNCHY MEXICAN CORN BREAD

1 1/2 cups cornmeal mix
1 cup cream-style corn
1/2 cup grated onion
1 cup grated sharp cheese
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
3 eggs

1/2 cup heated oil
1/2 cup sweet milk
1 teaspoon red pepper
Mix ingredients in order listed. Pour in 13x8 in. pan.

ASPARAGUS (OR GREEN BEANS OR BROCCOLI)

AND HAM CASSEROLE
1 large can asparagus
1 cup cooked ham, chopped
1 Tablespoon parsley, chopped
2 Tablespoons green pepper, chopped
2 hard boiled eggs, chopped
1/4 cup American cheese, grated

1 teaspoon onion, chopped
4 teaspoons lemon juice
1 1/2 cups light cream sauce
1 cup buttered bread crumbs
Cut asparagus into 1-inch pieces and place in buttered casserole. Combine ham with parsley, green pepper, eggs, cheese, onion and lemon juice. Cover asparagus with ham mixture. Top with cream sauce made by melting 1 Tablespoon butter or margarine, adding 1 Tablespoon flour and blending. Then add 1 cup milk and cook until it thickens. Add 1/4 teaspoon salt. After topping with cream sauce sprinkle buttered crumbs on top. Bake in 350 degree oven for 20 minutes.

Green beans or broccoli may be substituted for asparagus, fresh or frozen. Serves 6.—From the files of Mrs. O. A. Davis, Gadsden, Alabama. This casserole is a delightful way to use left-over ham. BRIDGE BIT CASSEROLE

8 slices white bread, crusts removed
2 cans tuna, chicken or crabmeat
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1 medium onion, grated
1 green pepper, chopped
1 cup chopped celery
3 cups milk
4 eggs
1 can mushroom soup
1 lb. cheddar cheese, grated
Cube four slices of bread or lay whole if preferred like

sandwiches). Place in greased shallow baking dish. Mix tuna, onion, mayonnaise, green pepper and celery and spread over bread. Arrange other 4 slices of bread on top. Beat eggs and add milk. Pour over casserole and refrigerate over night.

Remove from refrigerator one hour before baking. Bake 15 minutes at 400 degrees. Remove from oven, spread soup over top, sprinkle with cheese and bake 1 hr. at 325 degrees.—From the files of Mrs. R. F. Robertson, Signal Mtn., Tenn.

SNOWY DATE BARS

2 eggs
3/4 cup packed brown sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 Tablespoons melted butter
1/2 cup sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1 cup nuts
1 1/2 cups chopped dates

Beat eggs until foamy, add sugar, vanilla and butter. Sift flour, baking powder, salt and cinnamon. Add to mixture, also add the nuts and dates. Turn into floured 9-in. pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes. Cut pieces may be rolled in powdered sugar, or when removed from oven, pour melted marshmallows over top. Put paper over top so they will melt faster. Then put melted sweet chocolate, or a thin chocolate frosting over marshmallows.—From the files of Mrs. Stella Blythe, Bellingham, Washington.

Wampler first candidate to file for county offices

Robert H. Wampler has filed his candidacy for the Republican nomination for Clackamas County sheriff.

It was the first filing for any of the five county races that will be up for election this year.

Wampler, owner of a local cleaning establishment, has twice run for sheriff and in 1970 was on the Republican ticket as a candidate for governor against Tom McCall.

Besides the sheriff's job, other positions to be filled by election this year in the county are those of assessor, district attorney and two places on the county commission.

County Clerk George Poppen said that although the filing period for the county offices has been open for several weeks, candidates for these jobs usually wait until the first of the year to have their names put on the ballot.

Wampler, who lives at Rt. 1, Beaver Creek, said he would announce the names of his

committee chairman and others to assist in his campaign at a later date.

The Bureau of Land Management's timber sale offerings for the next fiscal year have been allocated to BLM's five western Oregon districts, according to State Director Archie D. Craft.

The largest volume, 280 million board feet, goes to Medford District, followed by: Salem, 269 million; Coos Bay, 245 million; Eugene, 219 million; and Roseburg, 212 million.

The total volume of 1,225 million board feet comprises the level prescribed recently by Interior Secretary Rogers C.B. Morton for timber sales from western Oregon timberlands managed by BLM.
