Adventists note religions growth

In reviewing the work of the Adventist church during the past decade, Pastor Larry Kurtz of the local Adventist church notes a 100 per cent increase of the denominations world membership in 16 years time, from 1 million members at the end of 1955 to well over 2 million as of Dec. 31, 1971.

By the end of last year, Adventists were actively working in 193 of the world's 227 countries. In addition to operating 25 large disaster-relief vans here in America, their work includes 45 orphanages and old peoples homes, 138 hospitals, 193 clinics, dispensaries and medical boats.

Their parochial school system, second only to that operated by the Catholic church includes 494 colleges, universities and high schools in addition to 4675 elementary schools around the world.

TOP-OF-THE-STOVE GOULASH

1 1/2 cups macaroni
1 lb ground beef
1/2 onion, chopped
1/4 lb process cheese
1 large can tomatoes
2 teaspoons salt
1 teaspoon chili powder
Cook macaroni according to package directions. Brown ground beef and onions; drain off excess fat. Drain macaroni; stir in cheese until nearly melted. Add hamburger and onions, tomatoes, salt and chili powder, stir. Simmer for 15-20 minutes. Serves 4-5.—From the files of Mrs. Aaron Howard, Sumner, Ia.

TUNA CASSEROLE

1 cup chopped celery
1/4 cup chopped onion (or less)
2 Tablespoons green or red pepper
Sauté in 2 Tablespoons butter
Add sautéed vegetables to 1 can tuna, 1 can mushroom soup diluted with 1/2 cup (or more) milk, and mix.

Forest practices discussed

The Clackamas County Farm Forestry Association's annual meeting is scheduled for Thursday, Jan. 27, 6:30 p.m. at the Molalla Jack Isberg, Molalla.

This year's program will feature a discussion of the proposed Forest Practices Act and how it is likely to affect woodland owners in Clackamas County. Speaking on this subject will be Mr. Ron Smith, State Board of Forestry, Salem; and Bob Madison, Publishers Paper Company, Estacada. Mr. Madison has served on the northwest district committee making recommendations to the State Board of Forestry concerning the content in the new Forest Practices Act. Mr. Smith, representing the State Forestry Department, will be in a position to discuss the history of the proposed legislation and progress to date.

TEN-MINUTE BEEF STROGANOF

1 lb beef tenderloin, sliced 1/4 in. thick
1/2 cup chopped onions
2 cups mushrooms
1 can condensed beef broth
1 cup sour cream
2 1/2 Tablespoons flour
Salt to taste (about 3/4 tsp.)
Fry beef quickly in 1/4 cup butter. Push to one side and add onions and mushrooms. Add beef broth (do not boil). Then add quickly the sour cream, flour and salt which has been stirred together. Heat thoroughly but do not boil. Serve over cooked buttered noodles.—From the files of Mrs. George Howard, Mason City, Ia.

DRIED BEEF-NOODLE CASSEROLE
1/4 lb. chipped beef
1 can mushroom soup
1 cup milk (maybe a little more)
1 cup cheddar cheese (cut fine)
3 Tablespoons onions (chopped)
1 cup uncooked elbow macaroni
4 hard-cooked eggs (sliced)
Mix soup and milk. Add cheese, macaroni and other ingredients. Fold in sliced eggs last.

Put in refrigerator several hours or overnight. Bake in 1 1/2 qt. greased baking dish at 350 degrees for 1 hr. uncovered. About 10 minutes before baking time is up put buttered crumbs on top, brown lightly and serve. Serves 4.—From the files of Mrs. George Howard, Mason City, Ia.

FRUITED CHEESE SALAD
3 cups creamed style cottage cheese
1 qt. frozen whipped dessert topping, thawed
2 (3 oz) pkgs. orange-pineapple flavored gelatin
1 (13 1/2 oz.) can pineapple tidbits, drained
1 (11 oz.) can mandarin orange sections, drained
In mixer bowl, blend together cottage cheese and topping. Beat until blended. Stir in dry gelatin. Fold in pineapple and mandarin oranges. Press into 7

or 8 cup-mold and chill several hours. Unmold onto serving plate. Serves 12-15.—From the files of Mrs. Melva Bahe, Sandy.

FROSTY-TOP CHOCOLATE BARS

1/4 cup butter
1/2 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
1 egg yolk
1 Tablespoon milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup plus 2 teaspoons sifted all-purpose flour
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup quick or regular oatmeal, uncooked
1/2 cup finely chopped dates
1 cup (6 oz. pkg.) semi-sweet chocolate pieces
1/2 cup finely chopped nuts
1 egg white
1/4 cup granulated sugar
In mixing bowl cream butter; gradually add brown sugar and beat until light and fluffy. Add egg yolk, milk and vanilla. Sift together 1/2 cup flour, baking soda and salt; add to creamed mixture. Stir in oatmeal. Spread evenly in buttered 8-in. square baking pan.
Toss dates in 2 teaspoons flour; add to chocolate pieces and nuts. Sprinkle over dough in pan. Bake in 350 oven 20 minutes.

Beat egg white to soft peaks. Gradually beat in 1/4 cup sugar until stiff peaks form. Remove cookies from oven; increase oven temperature to 400 degrees. Spread softened chocolate evenly over cookie base. Spread meringue over chocolate filling. Bake 15 minutes or until meringue is lightly browned. Cool and cut into bars. YUM YUM COOKIES

1 cup margarine or butter (short cup)
1/2 cup white sugar
1/4 cup brown sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 egg, slightly beaten
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup pitted dates, chopped
1/2 cup walnuts, chopped
2 cups crushed frosted cereal flakes
Cream together margarine, white sugar and brown sugar. Add vanilla and egg, beating well. Add flour, soda and salt. Stir in dates and walnuts. Drop dough by teaspoonfuls onto crushed cereal flakes. Place on greased floured cookie sheet and bake in 350 degree oven about 10 minutes. 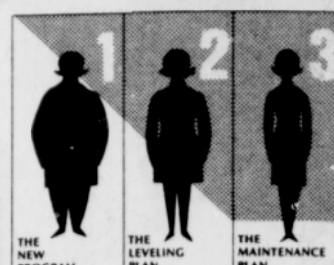
Old time music by Mr. and Mrs. Hewitt and John Mitchell 100 POLICE MURDERED

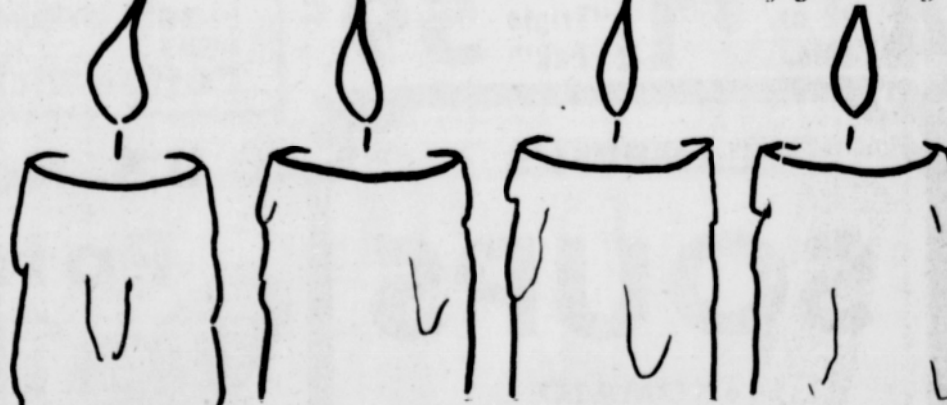
