## Planning Needed

The fact that the Sandy area has no comprehensive planning became very apparent Tuesday at the Chamber of Commerce meeting.

Dr. Cliff Denny from Mt. Hood Community College stated that the college has plans to locate a second campus in the Sandy area, but the lack of planning in the area could very well move the college to locate the campus elsewhere (Parkrose area).

Good communications are now needed from the citizens of Sandy and from the college to solve the question of does Sandy want the campus.

If the answer is yes, then city officials and the citizens of Sandy had better get going on their comprehensive planning.

We have stated several times in recent months that the lack of comprehensive planning in the area is hurting the area. This is a prime example.

The citizens of Sandy must support our city officials in allocating funds in next year's budget to get the planning for the area going. If we fail to have comprehensive planning in the area we will not have control on our growth to help better our community.

## Edith Decides To Opt Out

We're really quite happy that Edith Green decided to stay in the House, rather than try to move up to the U.S. Senate.

After months of uncertainty, Mrs. Green announced last Friday that she would pass up the Senate race. There is some evidence that she was undecided right up until the last what her decision should be.

Furthermore, we're sure that the pressures on her in the Senate would

Gov. Tom McCall has drawn a lot of attention with his suggestion for a state lottery. He's also raised a few ruffles.

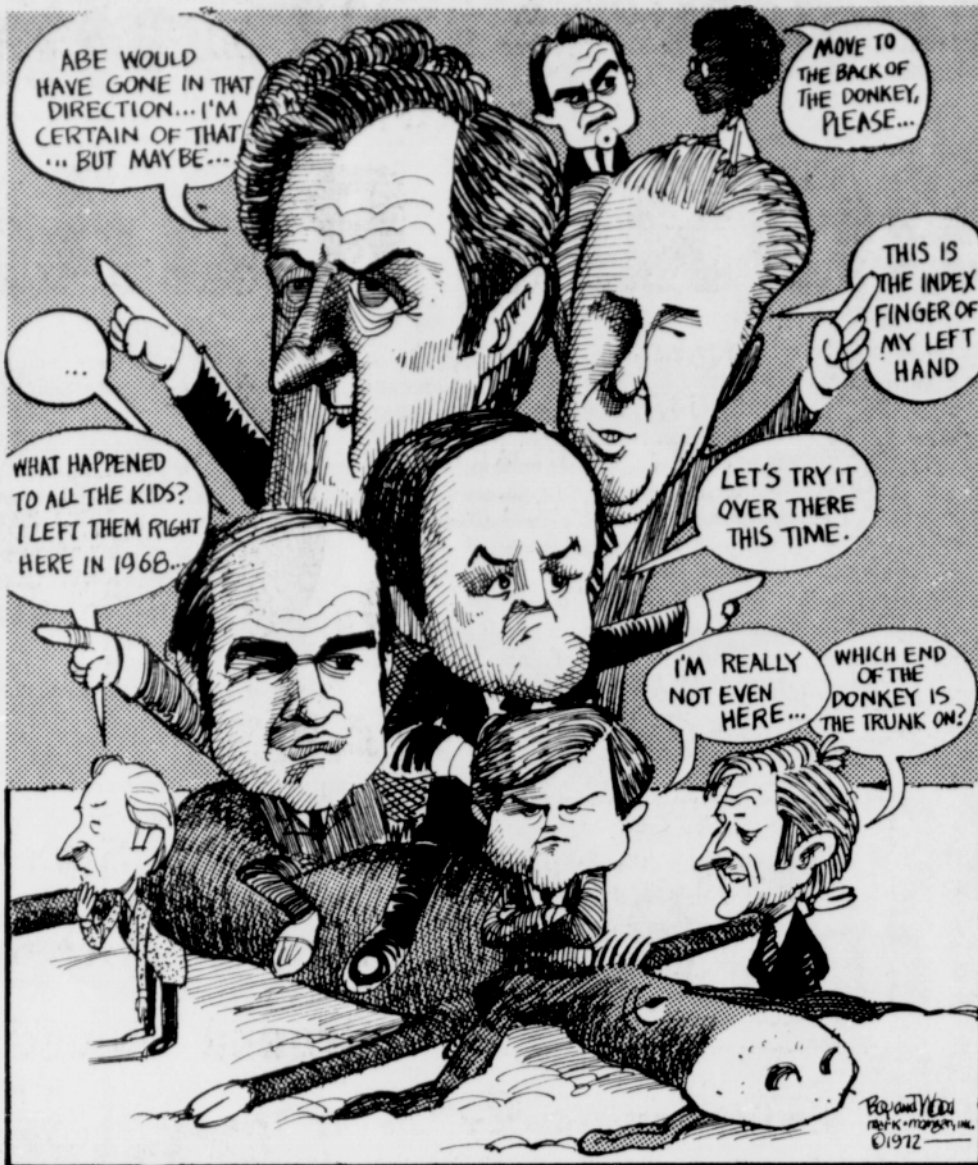
Legalized lotteries are used by a few states as a source of revenue and are an admitted success. A financial success, that is; the accompanying social problems involved are much less clear.

Frankly, we wouldn't spend a dime on a state lottery; a lot of other people would. However, we can't agree with those who oppose a lottery on a religious or moral basis.

We can't agree, that is, as long as the state legalizes horse racing and dog racing. If the state legislature, in all its wisdom, has decided that it's perfectly proper to gamble on the dogs and the horses, we can't see a particle of difference as to a lottery.

They're all a form of gambling and you can't legitimize one and not another.

We suspect that the tax crunch being what it is, a state lottery here may be seriously considered. We're not at all certain it would be approved.



## Growing county increases work in county office

The year 1971 was a record year of work for the Clackamas County clerk's office, according to George Poppen, county clerk.

In figures released this week, the clerk's office showed an increase in almost all transactions and activities for the year. Poppen stated that during his past five years in the office he has seen a tremendous increase.

The following are some of the areas where the clerk's office has shown the largest amount of increase in the past five years.

Total cases filed in the Circuit Court (both criminal and civil): 2213 in 1971 compared to 1571 in 1966.

Domestic Relation cases filed in the Circuit Court (divorces, annulments and separations): 850 in 1971 compared to 535 in 1966.

Criminal cases filed in the Circuit Court: in 1971—467 and in 1966—270.

Probate petitions filed in the Circuit Court (estates, guardianships, etc.): 1971—450 and 1966—512.

Mental competency petitions filed: 1971—156 and in 1966—126.

Petitions for adoption: in 1971—160 and in 1966—134.

Active cases where support payments are made through the office of the County Clerk (child support, alimony): in 1966—1254 and in 1971—3476.

Juvenile court petitions filed: in 1966—380 and in 1971—372.

Dog licenses issued by the County Clerk: in 1966—17,050 and in 1971—22,410.

Applications for marriage licenses received: in 1966—864 and in 1971—1,154.

Elections conducted (includes special and district elections): in 1966—150 and in 1971—192.

Total cases filed in the District Court (both civil and criminal): in 1966—12,612

and in 1971—13,592.

Traffic cases processed in the District Court: in 1966—8,939 and in 1971—8,671.

Small claim suits brought in the District Court: in 1966—1,132 and in 1971—1,124.

Criminal cases (other than traffic) filed in the District Court: in 1966—886 and in 1971—1,189.

Civil cases filed in the District Court: in 1966—1,655 and in 1971—2,608.

Documents filed or recorded in the Record Dept. of the Clerk's office (deeds, mortgages, contracts, liens, financing statements, etc.): in 1966—25,348 and in 1971—42,630.

New plats filed in the Recording office: in 1966—54 and in 1971—163.

Clackamas county also saw an increase in the number of registered voters including a large number of 18-year-olds who are now eligible to vote. In 1966 there were 63,917 registered voters while at the end of 1971 the county had 84,078.

The county clerk's office also recorded over \$2 million paid through its office while figures for 1966 were not available.

## Centennial book scheduled here

The next meeting of the Sandy Centennial and Barlow Road Days committee is set for Feb. 1. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. at the city hall in Sandy.

All persons interested in helping out with the Centennial to be celebrated in 1973 are urged to attend.

Currently the committee is working on various projects including the publishing of a Centennial book.

Information and workers are needed to help on the compiling of material for this book.

## River study meeting set

A public meeting will be held at Dexter McCarty school Tuesday, Feb. 29, to discuss the Roaring River Study Area.

The meeting, slated to begin at 7:30 p.m., will see Mt. Hood National Forest personnel discussing the drainage area, located in Eastern Clackamas County.

District Ranger Karl Mecklenburg said, "We want people to look at the land suitability and help us formulate the management assumptions that we will use in determining the best land uses for Roaring River."
