Assisted the Hoodland Planning Group with a Flood Hazard Study of the Sandy River and its tributaries. Provided a detail soil map with land use interpretations.

Since the soil survey is a physical inventory based on morphological features of the soil itself and such environmental factors as slope, flooding and the presents of large stones or boulders, it is a basis for many kinds of interpretations.

Considerable effort has been directed toward the Resource Conservation and Development program, and the Johnson Creek watershed project. These two worthy projects have considerable public interest and need.

Recommendation given to the State Soil and Water Commission on several gravel removal and stream channel developments.

Farming is still an active enterprise and contributes jobs and added wealth to the area. Farmers are improving their land by drainage, cover cropping, improved hay and pasture seedings, fertilizing and erosion control methods.

The small woodland owner has been slow to respond to modern forest management. There are opportunities to sell many products from the woods today.

Provides assistances to home owners to avoid or correct soil and water problems.

OUTSTANDING COOPERATOR - 1971

Trees and more trees have been the livelihood for Clyde and Dorothy Undergrave at Route 2, Box 1160 Sandy, Oregon. Their 110 acres consist of 20 acres in Xmas trees and 90 acres of fast growing timber trees. The Outstanding Cooperator is selected as a part of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co., awards program. District supervisors selected this operation because of the conservation practices used. Strip-cropping for erosion control, a water storage pond for irrigation, uses improved method of tree harvesting. In 1966 they received the County Woodland Farmer award, and in 1967 the Tree Farmer of the Year award. The family included two boys one is now logging and the other is a cabinet maker. The daughter is employed by the Oregon Game commission. The Undergraves enjoy fishing and hunting east of the mountains.



Tile drainage characteristics of soils are extremely important in areas undergoing development. This is especially true in area which are not served by public sewers.
