

Exciting women enticed to share ideas on work

"Rich woman, poor woman, beggar woman... doctor, lawyer, merchant..."

So might go the old jump rope jingle little girls chant on spring days after the women's equality movement attains some of its objectives.

One of those objectives, equal opportunity for women in business and profession, is the subject of the day-long conference planned for Friday, April 28, at Mt. Hood Community College.

Entitled "Women: Choices Unlimited," the conference planning committee has invited some two dozen "exciting women" to be speakers and resource people for the day.

These include women from business, communications media, community services, education, entertainment, government, homemaking, labor and politics.

Some of the speakers wear several hats. They are:

Representatives of the business world include Sylvia Posedel who established and operates two restaurants bearing her name. She also has been seen and heard in community theater productions.

An active interest in politics long has been an avocation of Elizabeth Giles, a successful East County business woman. State Senator Betty Roberts went into the Oregon Legislature as a secondary school teacher. She has earned a law degree and is an instructor at Mt. Hood Community College.

A published cookbook author, Nancy Strobe has a radio show in Bend.

Sometimes politician Gracie Hansen came from the denizens of the PTA to become

an impresario with her Roaring Twenties show at the Hoyt Hotel.

At 23, Joyce Yarbrough already has filled her life with many adventures. She talks freely about her days as a drug addict and prostitute. Her lifestyle has done a dramatic about-face, and she operates Freedom House, a halfway center for others coming out from the drug scene. Also, she mothers her four children.

Motherhood also holds a dominant position in the life of Mrs. Bob Duncan of Gresham. She has seven children. Government and politics are other areas in which she is at home as the wife of a candidate.

Single and successful, Charlotte Schwartz manages Kelly Girl, a division of Kelly Services that provides temporary help to employers.

Another young woman who will speak as a career girl — and a black woman — is Angie Davis of Pacific Northwest Bell.

Education from the viewpoints of a professional and a volunteer will be discussed by two women who have achieved results in the field. Dr. Irene Place of the School of Business Administration at Portland State University represents the former while Mrs. Robert Wiener, a member of the Portland School Board, portrays the latter.

A profession conspicuous for its absence of women is architecture. Marjorie Wintermute pursues that profession.

Irene Young of the Channel 6 Hi Neighbor show will share her world within a television studio.

The appointment of Senator George Eivers (R) Clackamas County to the Advisory Committee to the State Land Board was announced today by John D. Burns, Senate President. Eivers is a holdover member of the Senate from Clackamas County.

His appointment fills the vacancy caused by the resignation of Sen. Earl Haas (D) Portland, now a candidate for Multnomah County District Attorney.

The Advisory Committee is concerned with conflicting claims of ownership between the state and riparian title holders on the beds and banks of Oregon's navigable waterways including lakes, bays and estuaries. Revenues received from leases of beds and banks of navigable waterways accrue to the Common School Fund.
