

Republican candidate forum scheduled

A Candidates Night for all Republican candidates is being held April 21 at Sandy Union High School.

Candidates will arrive at 7 to meet informally with the public. At 7:30 candidates will present a three minute speech on their qualifications for the office they seek. At 8:30 they will again be stationed at tables around the room to meet informally with the public.

People of the Estacada and Boring-Damascus area are urged to attend as their State Representative and State Senate areas will be represented at this meeting. With the forming of the new districts the public is not familiar with who now

represents their areas. Sandy is divided so it includes three State Representative Districts.

The event is the effort of Mrs. Ginny Brewster, Area Republican Chairman. She is quoted as saying, "This is the best way to give people of our area the opportunity to meet the candidates personally. We have an obligation to elect the best possible candidate for the general election. This is not possible if the public has no idea about who they vote for. The best way to learn about a candidate is to meet him. Too many people vote blind." The public will be encouraged to talk with the candidates before and after the program.

The response to the invitations to candidates has been very positive. Although President Nixon is not expected to attend, he will be represented by a delegate from his state campaign headquarters. A list of those attending should be available by press time next week.

Federal funds help forest fire prevention

Plans for increased federal funding for Oregon forest fire prevention and fire suppression next year were released by Sen. Mark O. Hatfield.

The Bureau of Land Management plans an increase of \$315,000 for fire protection in Eastern Oregon, and \$181,000 for Western Oregon. The Forest Service fire protection funding will be increased by \$82,000.

"Forest fire protection is where an ounce of prevention far outweighs pounds and pounds of cure," said Hatfield. "Oregon's severe forest fires have crippled the state in the past. While no amount of money can guarantee prevention of forest fires, these increases will help minimize the chances for devastating fires. Greater recreational use of Oregon's forests calls for renewed attention to the preventative tools of forest fire protection."

Hatfield had requested the detailed plans from the Bureau of Land Management and the Forest Service in recent Senate Appropriations Committee hearings.

Hatfield said Oregon's increase in Forest Service appropriations will climb from \$2,611,000 in fiscal 1972 to \$2,693,000 in fiscal year 1973. "While the overall Forest Service fire fighting funding will drop by \$833,000, I am pleased that the Oregon amount reflects this \$82,000 increase," said Hatfield.

The Oregon Senator said also

the BLM budget represents \$134,000 for fire protection in Eastern Oregon, and \$181,000 for Western Oregon. The Eastern Oregon increase includes additions of \$70,000 for "pre-suppression funds" above last year's total of \$376,000 and will provide for purchase of new equipment and temporary personnel. It also includes funds for construction of a new \$27,000 communications center in Lakeview, and \$37,000 for planning for new fire control stations and lookouts in Malheur, Baker, Deschutes and Lake Counties.

Hatfield said BLM fire protection in Western Oregon is funded from O&C monies. Although there is an overall projected decrease in the O&C

fund in fiscal year 1973, funding allocated for fire prevention will be increased by \$181,000, bringing it to a \$1 million total for the 2.4 million acres of O&C and public domain forest lands in Western Oregon.

STORM DAMAGE
