One team which did not let the weather interfere with their meet was the frosh track team. They finished with 62 points in a three way meet with Molalla and Estacada.

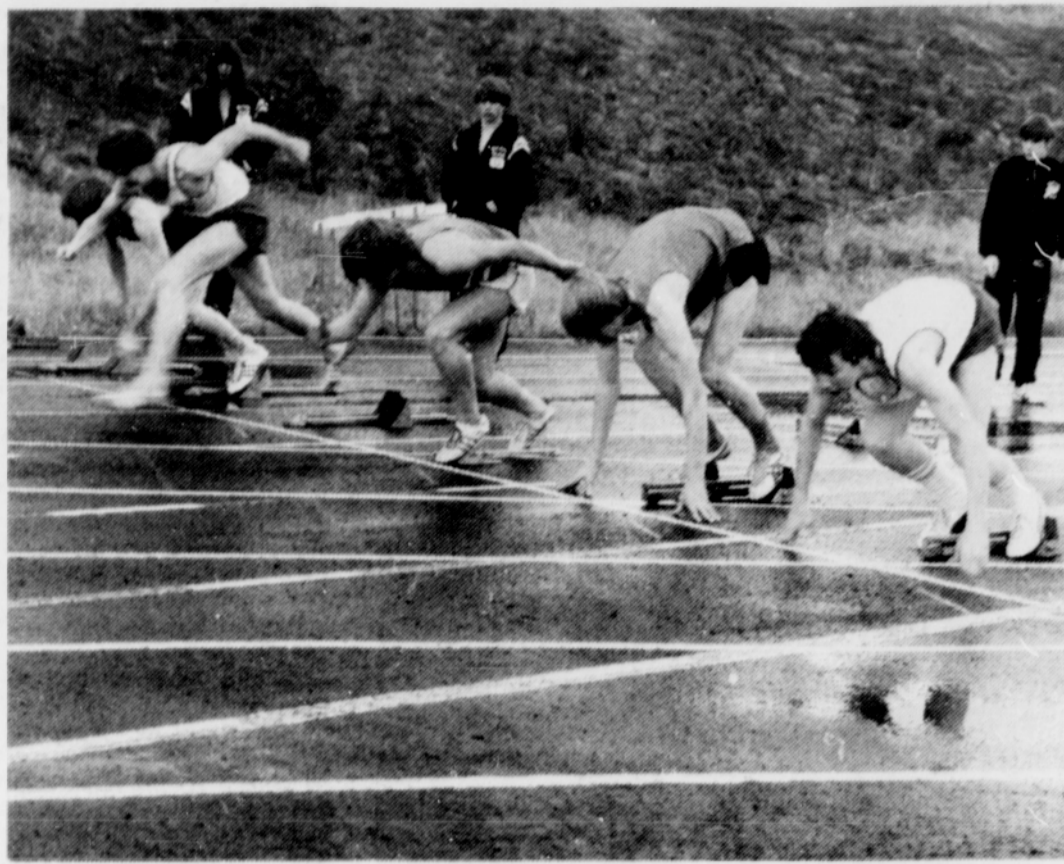
Molalla won the meet with 70 points and Estacada had 36. The meet was held at Sandy Monday afternoon.

Other top finishers for Sandy were: Adamson 2nd in 440; Davenport 3rd in low hurdles; Opperman 3rd in 220; Marsh 3rd in 880; Davenport and Zimmerman tied for 2nd in high jump; Covey 2nd in long jump; Richards 2nd in discus; Boyko 2nd in javelin; Marsh 2nd in two mile; and Timm third in two mile.

The Pioneer relay team finished second behind Molalla in the mile relay.

Cascade skiers dominate

A lean redhead, Greg Wiley, led the strong Cascade Ski Club's Mt. Hood Racing Team to a near-sweep of first places in the annual running of the Trollhaugen Ski Shop's Giant Slalom Championships in the Ski Bowl at Government Camp.

Wiley was closed through a 20-gate course in 40.9 seconds, finishing a full second in front of teammate Bill Polits, who was runnerup in the 10-to-12 year division.

Fastest of the girls was Deanne Woodring. The Cascader was clocked in 44.9 seconds over the same course the boys ran. Pam Ausman, Cascade, was second, six-tenths of a second behind Deanne.

In the small-fry competition, Mark Pledger brought Cascade's racing team a third blue ribbon and himself a

magnificent trophy from the Government Camp sports shop, the sponsoring Trollhaugen. Mark led the six-to-nine year boys in 46.2 seconds.

The lone break in Cascade's dominance of the top finishes came in the girls six-to-nine with Lisa Norman of Meadows Ski Club first in 51.8 seconds, two full seconds ahead of Britt-Marie Pearson of Government Camp and Meadows.

Nearly 100 racers took part in the competition with the top runner, Wiley, having his name engraved on a large permanent trophy.

In a unique "turnabout", members of the Mt. Hood Racing Team's junior ranks, led by Lee Englesby, Sandy high senior and son of Trollhaugen operators Joe and Mary Ellen Englesby, set the race course and handled nearly

all of the details in the race for members of the Mitey Mite ranks.

Dairy goat field day

A dairy goat field day for 4-H members, leaders and parents is scheduled for Saturday, April 22, at the Douglas county fairgrounds in Roseburg, according to R.G. McCarty, Clackamas county extension agent.

The field day, sponsored by the Oregon State Dairy Council in cooperation with the Oregon State University Cooperative Extension Service, will begin at 10 a.m.

The field day is just one of the ways by which the Dairy Goat Council has supported the 4-H dairy goat program, explains Scott Clevenger, Oregon State University extension 4-H and youth specialist.

The 4-H project has grown steadily over the past several years to the point where about 300 young men and women are now enrolled on a state-wide basis.

During the day-long program, 4-H members and leaders will hear discussions of such topics as animal health, anatomy and judging. They will also see demonstrations of hoof trimming, disbudding and showmanship.

Instructors during the field day will include Clevenger, Dr. Guy Reynolds, OSU extension veterinarian; Dr. Don Bailey, Roseburg veterinarian; Paul Dierks, North Bend, and Andy and Ida Purcella, Coquille.

Women take 2nd

Mt. Hood track women fought ankle-deep water and strong gusts Saturday, to place second in a five-way meet at Corvallis.

Coach Dorian Harris' group compiled 80 points behind winner OSU and beat out a strong Portland State University team who placed third with 71½ points.

Standouts in the multi-team affair were Jean Anderson who took first in the javelin with a toss of 111-0. She was followed by teammates Marilyn Coats and ex-Gresham cinderette Ann Taylor in third and sixth places.

Kathy Berke earned a third in her first high jump competition, took a second in the long jump, was fifth in her first-ever 220-yd. dash and helped her 440-yd. relay team place second.

Sue Eder was another Saint point-getter, taking third in the 220, fourth in the 100-yd. dash and also running a leg of the quarter mile relay.

"This is exactly what they needed," said Harris Tuesday. "They were somewhat unsure of themselves before we entered the meet, but did an outstanding job."

The MHCC team was slated to meet Oregon College of Education and PSU at Monmouth Tuesday and Miss Harris said "Things could be tougher this time... we don't have those other teams splitting up the first few places."
