Farmers set hearing on labor problems

An important meeting for all Oregon farmers who grow perishable crops will be held at the State Fairgrounds on Tuesday, April 25, at 2 p.m. The session, sponsored by the Agri-Business Council, will be held in the Agricultural Exhibit Hall.

"With organized labor problems expected to begin in Oregon with its first hand harvested crops—including strawberries, caneberries and cherries—farmers will learn how to cope with the situation from two experts in the field," said Jim Heater, administrator of the council.

Featured speaker is Leslie V. Hubbard, executive assistant of Western Growers Association, who has dealt with the farm labor situation in California since its beginning. Hubbard, who spent 8 years as farm editor for a daily paper in the San Joaquin Valley and 11 years as executive assistant of the California Council of Growers, will tell from his first hand experience how the union organizers operate, what to watch out for, and what types of precautions Oregon farmers must take to fight—and win—their battle for survival.

Hubbard, who now represents the fresh produce, melon, strawberry and potato industries of California and Arizona, will discuss what happened in California—and what can happen in Oregon. His personal account of the confrontations between farmers and organized farm labor will be of importance to everyone who grows perishable crops in the state.

He will also point out many of the techniques used by the labor organizers to intimidate and harass farmers and farm workers.

Joining Hubbard at the podium will be Kenneth E. Jernstedt, Portland attorney and one of the authors of Oregon's ill-fated Farm Labor Bill, the only bill out of 782 passed by the last session of the legislature that was vetoed by Governor Tom McCall.

Jernstedt, a labor relations and labor law specialist with the firm of McColloch, Dezendorf, Spears & Lubersky, will explain the legal side of the farm labor situation as it applies to Oregon farmers.

Heater said that Oregon's agricultural community is not opposed to fair farm labor practices, but it is against any type of forced labor union activities which do not reflect the wishes of the state's farm workers and farmers. "We cannot permit shutdowns at harvest time, and still survive," he concluded.
