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Whipping cream doubles in volume when whipped. If you need two cups of whipped cream, start out with 1 cup or 1/2 pint of cream.

Bike engineers make third attempt

It's the third round for a bike path along Powell Blvd. west of Gresham.

Two systems of marking have been tried and abandoned. A third try is now being made.

The "bike bill" passed by the last legislature decreed that 1 per cent of state highway money shall be spent for bike paths along highways.

The purpose was to encourage the bike as an alternate to transportation by car. George Baldwin, highway administrator, said this week that so far "we have been unable to engineer compatibility between cars and bicycles."

The stretch of Powell west of Gresham first had bike paths designated by posts along both sides of the roadway. Within a matter of hours motorists had knocked most of them down.

Tape deck gone

A stereo tape deck and tapes valued at \$168 were reported stolen May 19, from a car at Barlow High School.

Sheriff's reports said the thieves slipped the right front door lock of a vehicle owned by Duane Grimm, a construction man at the school.

Next a trail was made with shorter plastic posts. These had a brief existence.
