Bicycle path causes problems

Oregon's Highway Division, which is the first organization of its type in the country to be faced with the problem, has been experimenting in an effort to develop a bicycle path that is both economical to construct and maintain and yet useful to a large number of people.

George Baldwin, highway administrator, said that one of the major problems has been that backers of the so-called "Bicycle bill" insisted that the trails be constructed in urban areas as an alternate to transportation by car. "So far," he explained, "we have been unable to engineer compatibility between cars and bicyclists. Public education appears to be an essential ingredient to the establishment of this relationship in harmony, but in the meantime paths must be constructed under the provisions of the law."

In an initial effort to separate motorists from bicyclists after a painted line failed, flexible guide posts were installed in several locations. These posts would not deny the lane to the motorist in an emergency but would serve as a reminder that he did not belong on the bike path. The effect of the post was not as anticipated, Baldwin explained, with the result that in one instance an entire installation of posts was knocked out by traffic. In other areas, there has been a heavy loss of posts.

The Highway Division is in the process of removing the flexible guide posts and replacing them with a 12-inch-wide white stripe, except along Powell Valley Road where "dagmar" plastic disks are to be tried experimentally. The white stripe will permit the use of a power broom to clean the trails. There had been criticism that there was an accumulation of debris on some of the trails.

An effort is to be made to widen bike trails around power poles to obtain an effective, full-width trail wherever feasible; however, in some locations there is not sufficient right-of-way. In other areas where existing trails are too rough to be readily usable by bicyclists, resurfacing will be accomplished to improve riding qualities.

Baldwin said that every effort, within reason, was being tried to provide useful trails because the eyes of the country are on Oregon and its efforts to build bike trails statewide.

These areas are open to all residents, both adult and juniors and classes include hand spun, machine knitted, hand knitted, crochets, wovens, rugs, stitchery and tapestry and novelties, to mention a few.

Admission is 75c for adults 50c for children under 12 and MHCC Golden Age Card holders will be admitted free. Subjects include: Solar Eclipse-Shy July 10, 1972; and Jupiter-An Un-

finished Star.

—All-Corner track meets will be divided into two divisions this summer. High school age persons and above will compete Friday evenings beginning at 6:30. The first meet is July 7. Youngsters 8-14 will compete Saturday's at 9 a.m. starting July 8. Entry fee is 25c per contestant and awards will be given for the top six marks in each event.

—Community Recreation will run June 19 through August 18. Times are 7-9 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and no fee is

charged.

—Suzuki Violin classes begin June 26 and run through August 18. This is an exciting new approach to learning the violin, based on listening, game play imitation. The course is designed for youngsters age 5-9. Parental involvement is essential to the success of this

program. Parent orientation will be June 19-21 and 23. Violin rental information will be discussed at that time. The fee is \$25.

148th. Incorporators were Kenneth N. Hunter and Harry F. Kinble. Purpose is manufacture and sale of lighting fixtures.

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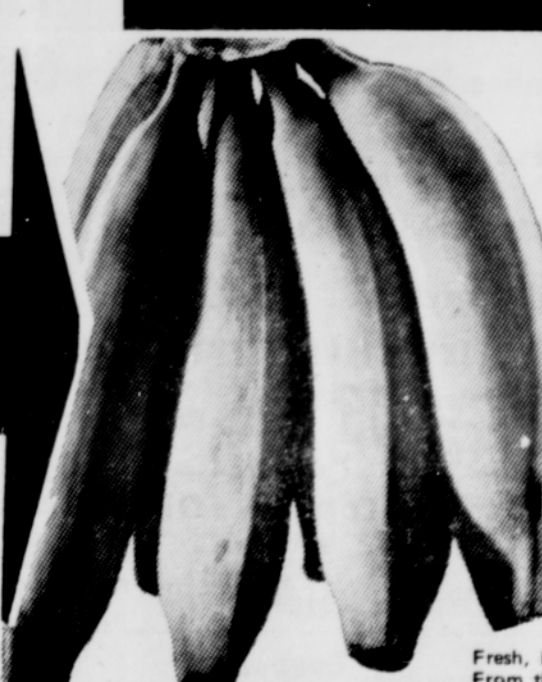
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
