What's Cooking?

EASY CHICKEN
Wash and dry cut-up frying chicken. Dip in melted margarine. Sprinkle with garlic salt. Pieces may be rolled in flour, or not, as desired. Bake in 325 degree oven an hour, then turn controls to broil and brown for 10 minutes.—From the files of Mrs. Wayne Johnson, Boring.

GOURMET CHICKEN

PORK CHOPS WITH MUSHROOM SAUCE

REFRIGERATOR SPICED PRUNES
1 lb. prunes
4 cups water
1-3 cup vinegar
1-3 cup dark brown sugar
3 sticks cinnamon
1 Tablespoon whole cloves
Combine ingredients in saucepan. Bring to boil and cook 7 minutes. Cool. Store in covered container in refrigerator at least 24 hours until flavors mingle.—From the files of Mrs. Phil Reese, Milwaukie.

SAVANNAH SPICED PEACHES
1 lb. 13 oz can peach halves
1 cup sugar
2 cinnamon sticks
1 Tablespoon whole cloves
1 Tablespoon whole allspice
Drain syrup from peaches into saucepan. Add sugar, vinegar, cinnamon, cloves and allspice. Boil 10 minutes. Add peaches; cook 5 minutes until peaches are thoroughly heated. Strain liquid to remove spices. Serve warm with whipped cream cheese on top.—From the files of Mrs. Phil Reese, Milwaukie.

Bennie Puckett, president, stated, "Under the new constitution teachers will be given more voice in their organization. Area chapters will be able to coordinate communications, workshops, services, etc. in a better way. The purpose of a Uniserve Unit is to provide guidelines whereby Uniserve units may be established, financed, and governed in an orderly fashion. It is possible that we might increase our professional staff at the local level to improve the service program and create equitable distribution of Association services regardless of geography or density of membership population."

County seeks balanced budget

The Clackamas County budget is to be presented on June 9 (Friday) with "no fluff" and it is to be balanced within the six per cent limitation.

This demand was made of the county officials by the lay committee working with county officials on the budget last week.

Added to this is the fact that the county may have as much as \$350,000 of this year's excess revenues to work with on the new budget for 1972-1973.

chairman of the county commissioners and a member of the budget committee, the amount is the difference between the county's 1971-1972 budget and revenues collected.

That figure, subtracted from the near \$700,000 over the six per cent limit of the coming fiscal year's budget will leave approximately \$350,000 to be cut from proposed future spending, noted Schumacher.

At the meeting last week the budget committee requested the commissioners to in-

dividually take copies of the present proposed budget with them and to shave the amounts requested by the county department heads according to what they considered needed priorities. The commissioners plan to come together today to hopefully equalize all the individual shaving of the budget they have considered.

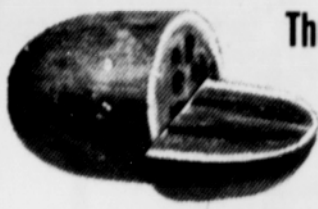
Schumacher said that the commission will deliberate at that time in hopes of collectively reaching a balanced budget the next day. The lay

members of the budget committee are Lee Stidd of Lake Oswego, Mrs. Anna Payne of Milwaukie, and Peter Schnell of Jennings Lodge.

The budget committee at last week's meeting heard from various groups in the county requesting financial support.

Among the organizations making a presentation for funds were the Office of Economic Opportunity, the Tri-City Youth Center, the County Senior Citizens Center, and the Citizen's Participation in Law.

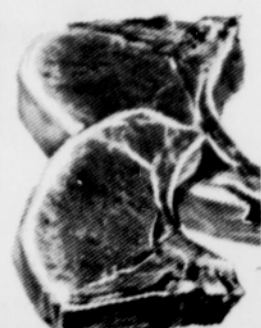
