Regner W. Kullberg

Dr. Regner William Kullberg, 73, Colton, died in Portland on June 19.

Kullberg was born in Sweden and moved to Idaho with his parents as a child. He was graduated from the University of Idaho and later was principal of Orofino High School.

In 1928 he was graduated from the U of O Medical School and was married that same year to Vendela L. Hill, who preceded him in death in 1964. After serving his internship at Chicago, he moved to Astoria where he had a private medical practice for 25 years. From 1963 to 1965 he served as assistant health officer with the Multnomah County Health Dept.

After retirement he moved to Colton. Kullberg was a member of Kiwanis International for over 40 years; served on the Emanuel Hospital Board over 20 years; and served as president and member of the board for Lutheran Homes and Hospitals from its inception until the time of his death.

He was one of the founders of Camp Colton, was active in its development, and was a member of the Colton Lutheran Church.

Kullberg was also active in the National Cancer Society and has published a number of articles on preventative medicine. During his years of practice in Astoria he was a member of the board of Columbia Hospital. During World War I he served in the Medical Corps.

He is survived by a son, William Kullberg, Colton, and four grandchildren.

Funeral services were held June 22 at the Colton Lutheran Church with burial at the Colton Lutheran cemetery. Sandy Funeral Home was in charge of the funeral arrangements.

Memorials may be given to the Colton Lutheran Memorial Fund or the Camp Colton Scholarship Fund.

Varnum Dell Butler, 86, of Oregon City, died June 15 in Oregon City.

Butler was born in Monmouth and was graduated from Oregon Normal School in 1907. He worked around the Monmouth, Independence and Dallas area doing house wiring and electric line work and came to Portland in 1910 to work for a predecessor company of Portland General Electric.

He worked for this company, except for a short period with the city of Eugene, for over 40 years. He retired from PGE in 1950 and continued to live in the Bull Run area until 1964 when he moved to Oregon City.

Butler was active in community affairs in the Bull Run area and in Sandy. He served on grade and high school

boards for nearly 30 years and was chairman of the Sandy High School board for over 20 years. He also served for a time on the state school board.

Butler was a member of the Odd Fellows Lodge for over 60 years and went through all of the offices up to the state level. He served for a time with the Sandy Chamber of Commerce and was president for a term, was a member of the Grange, County Historical Society, Oregon City Garden Club, and the Golden Age Club.

Survivors include two sons,

Charles H., of Oregon City and Robley A., San Francisco, Calif., and two grandchildren, Carol Ann and Craig Allen.

The funeral was held June 19 in the chapel of the Holman Hankins Funeral Home in Oregon City with interment at Fir Crest Cemetery in Monmouth.

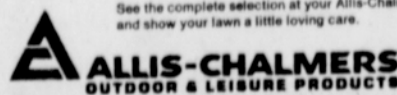
