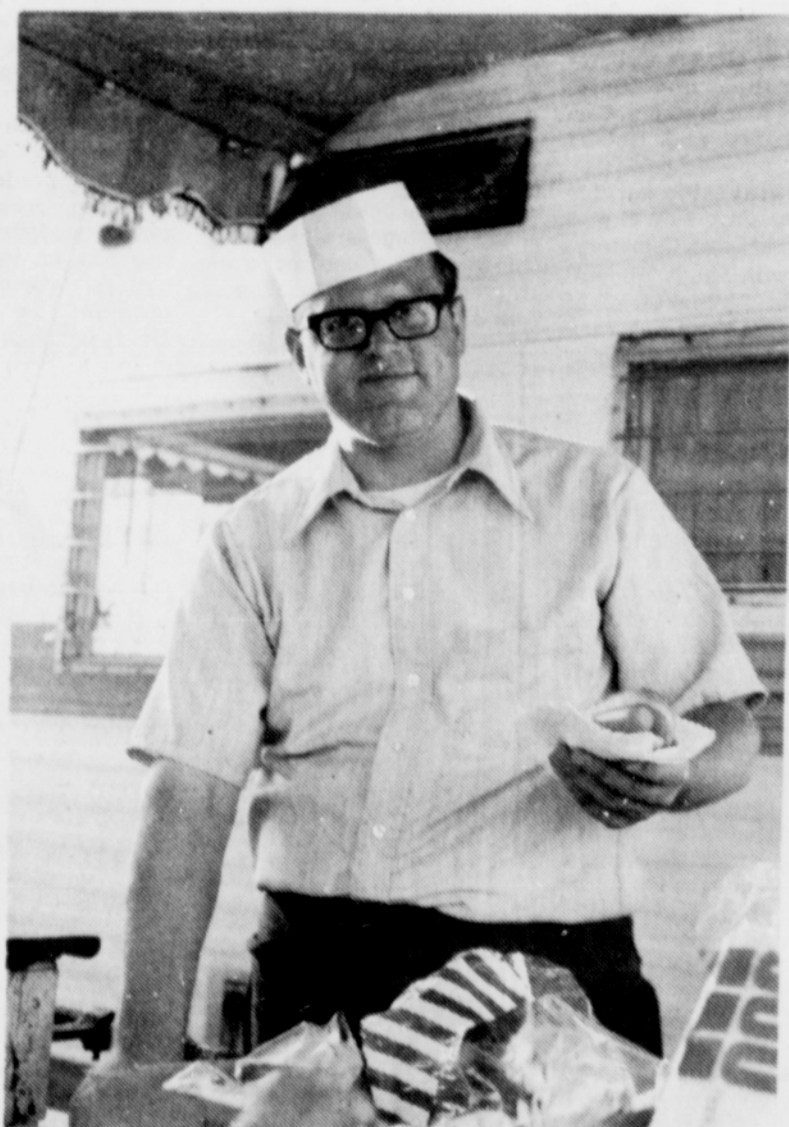

It was a hot July 4 celebration, but the show went off smoothly and was highlighted by an evening fireworks display.

The heat might have kept a few spectators away during the festivities during the day. An estimated 2500 persons attended the evening activities, according to Police Chief Fred Punzel, compared to over 4000 last year.

Punzel said the day was incident free. The day's events started with a swimming exhibition at the Sandy swim pool and was followed by a free show for children at the Sunset Theater.

Afternoon activities included two baseball games, waterball competition between the Sandy and Estacada fire departments, a greased pig chase, a nickel in the haystack hunt, a carnival,

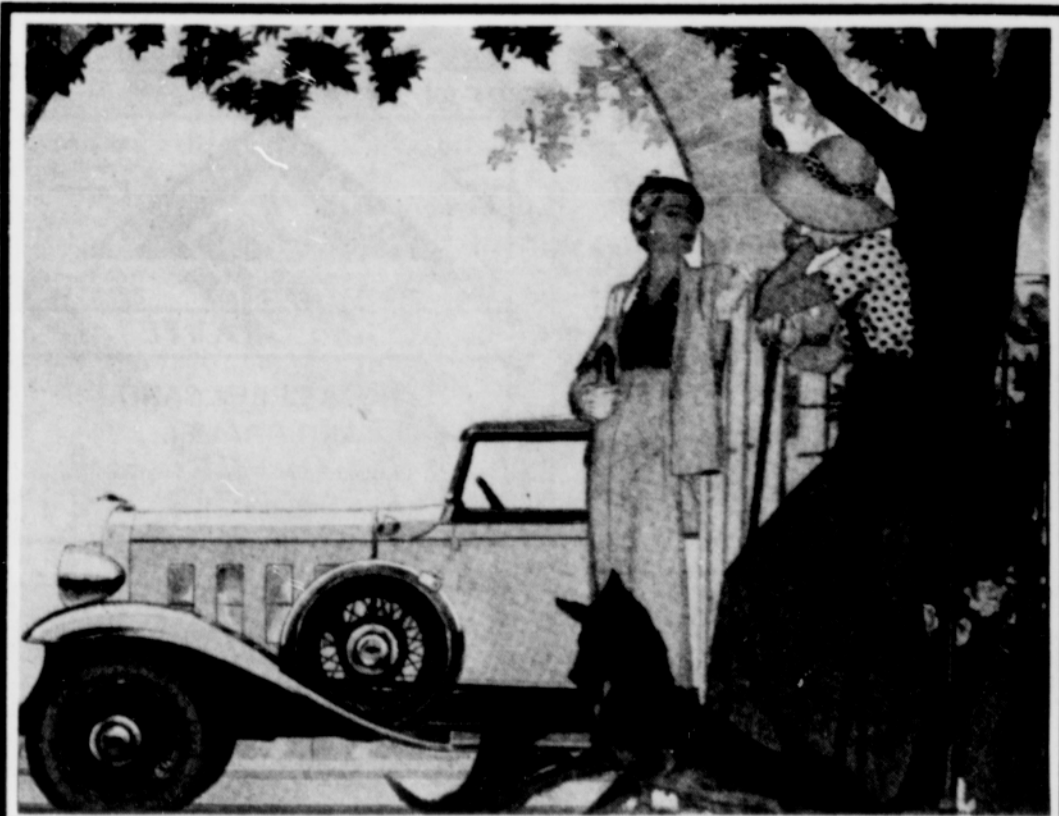
skydiving, a talent show, and of course the fireworks.

The program took place on the Sandy High School athletic field, with the evening activities held in front of the football bleachers.

The fireworks display was started with the national anthem and a fireworks flag which lit in the sky throughout most of the night.

The fireworks display cost over \$600. The money was raised by Sandy Civic Services.
